- Health and Safety**—Learning good health habits, acquiring an intelligent understanding of safety rules;
- Relaxation**—Indoor and outdoor play, and rest.

The opening of the Silverton Public Schools on Labor Day has caused local businesses to be divided on closing for that holiday.

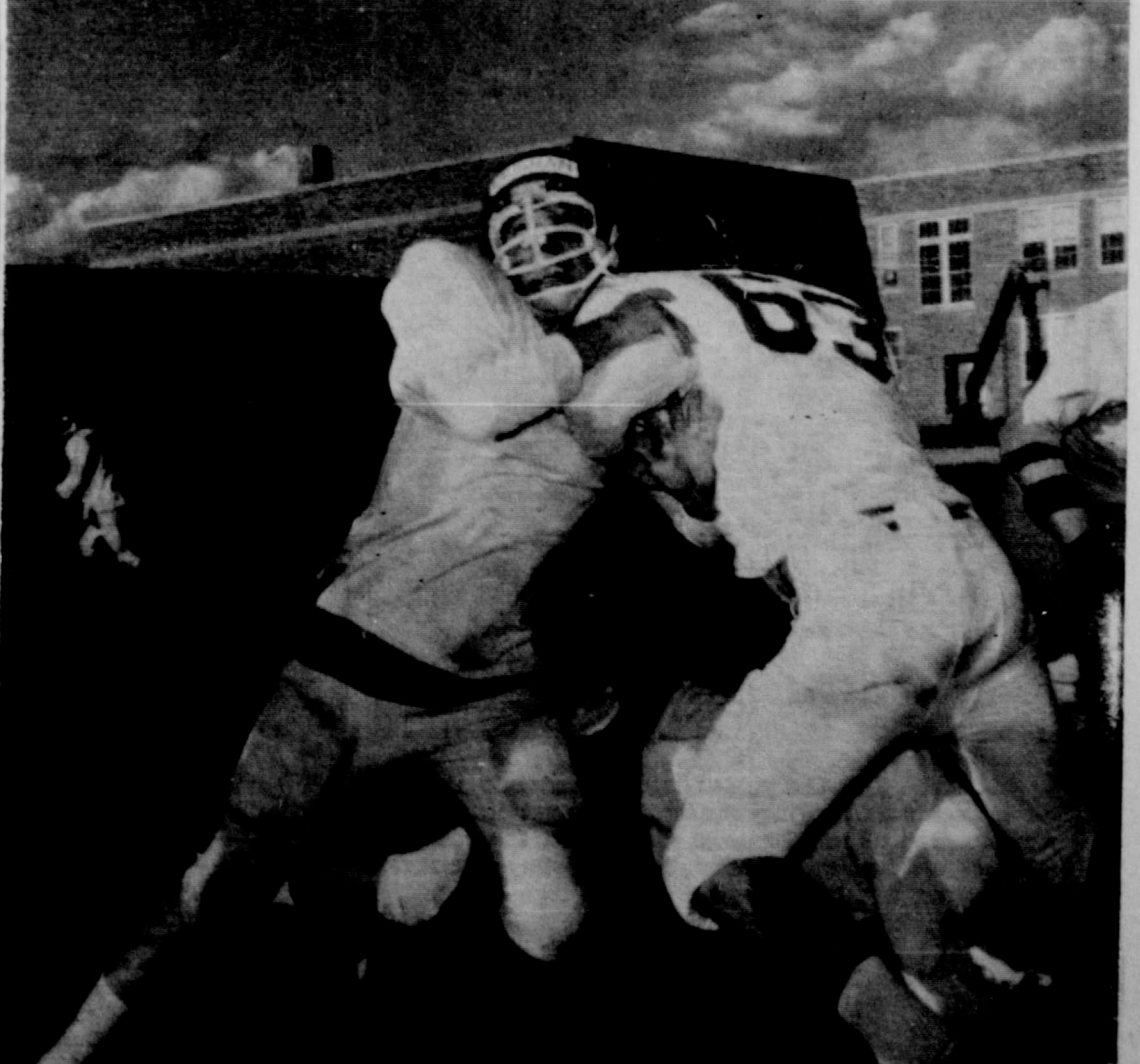

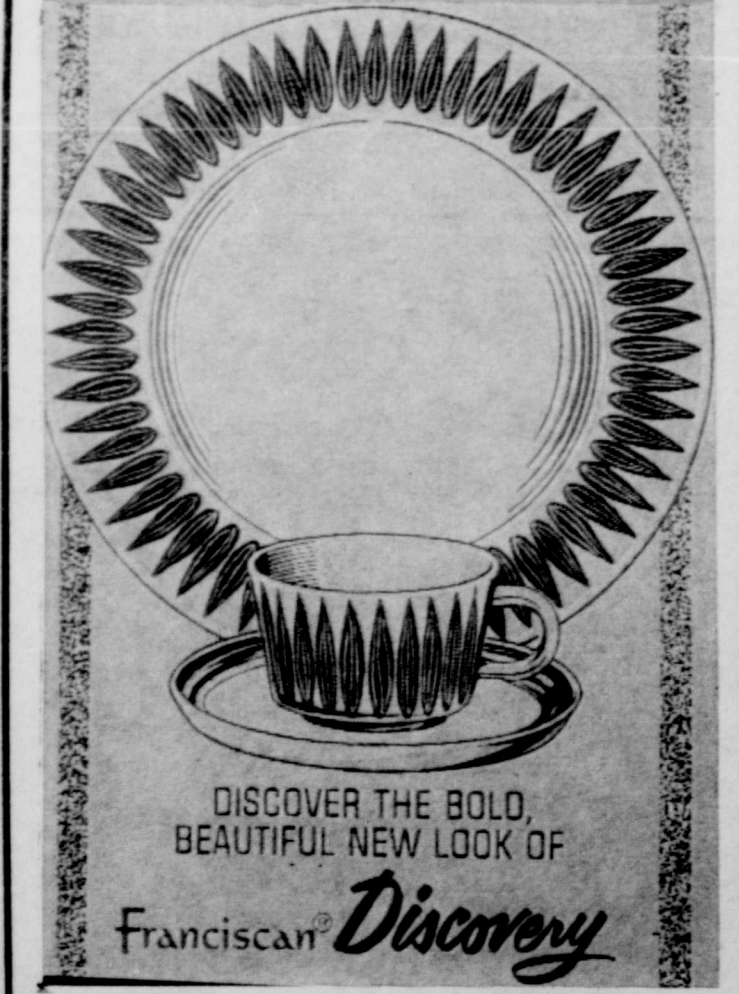

Grazing Associations Help Farmers Develop Income

Farmers and cattlemen are acquiring needed land resources by forming grazing associations and obtaining financial assistance from the Farmers Home Administration, the agency's Swisher and Briscoe county supervisor, Donald Cruce, said this week.

A grazing association is com-

posed of a group of family farmers and ranchers who join together to acquire and develop land to provide seasonal grazing livestock belonging to its members. The nonprofit association is owned, operated, and managed by its members.

"Small farmers," Cruce said, can increase their incomes, make better use of land and water resources, and develop larger equity in land through use of a grazing association. This program often provides small farmers with their only opportunity to remain in farming on a profitable basis."

Other advantages of an association include providing opportunities to improve livestock quality, gain bargaining power in the market place, build more stable operations and strengthen the rural community.

"Results benefit the entire community," Cruce said, "because associations accomplish better use

of land and water resources and provide expanded tax bases and more local buying power."

The grazing associations now in operation in Texas range in size from 4 to 43 members, depending on the number of livestock to be supported and dimensions and quality of the land.

Eligible to form associations are neighboring farmers and ranchers who operate family size units. Financial and technical assistance is provided by the Farmers Home Administration. Additional aid is often provided by the Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service.

Loans are available to qualified borrowers for periods up to 40 years at an interest rate of 5 percent. Interested individuals should contact Donald Cruce at 219 Northwest Second in Tullia, form a steering committee, and begin looking for suitable acreage.

The Farmers Home Administration office in Tullia has one loan in process for this type of assistance. 960 acres will be developed in native and permanent grass as part of this land will be irrigated with a sprinkler system. Corrals, scales and other improvements are included in the loan. This loan will enable these three family size operators to show a greater return from their investment by fully utilizing all of their resources.

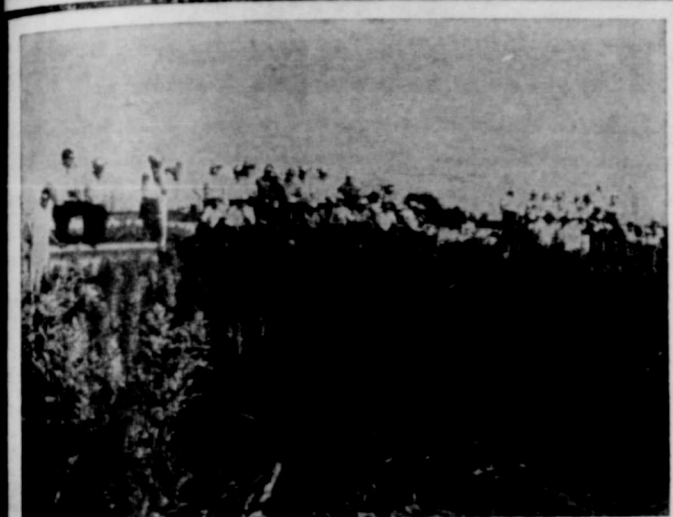


Ware Fogerson and H. M. Vaughn are pictured with an innovation in feeder pens. Thirty-five weaner pigs can be fed in this pen, the construction of which provides for a fine spray of water to cool the pigs in hot weather and panels to close the sides when the weather turns colder. The slat-bottom of the pen allows droppings to fall through,

and the pen can be moved from place to place to spread the droppings or to clean underneath. The feeder pen was constructed from a model which Fogerson saw displayed at Texas Tech recently, and this is said to be "the coming thing" in hog production.

HOUSEHOLD INSECTS

Household insects are munching, biting and possibly spreading disease at all hours of the day and night. Any home and its surroundings harbor some form of insect life. Some insects feed on fabrics, contaminate food and attack dwellings, while others annoy humans by "biting." Insects carry diseases and cause possible secondary infections and are general nuisances.

A new leaflet published by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service entitled "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects (L-3111)" gives recommendations for controlling every kind of insect from moth to mosquito and from tick to termite.

Sanitation and good housekeeping are important in controlling or keeping most pests away, but even well-kept homes sometimes become infested.

Certain pests may be found outside and controlled before they enter the home. However, some insects live entirely within the home where they must be controlled by applying insecticides as

DISABLED VETERANS MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR A TRAINING ALLOWANCE

Veterans with service-connected disabilities serious enough to qualify for vocational rehabilitation training through the Veterans Administration are now eligible for a part-time training allowance under a new law signed recently by President Johnson, according to an announcement by Jack Coker, manager of the Waco VA Regional Office.

Before the President signed Public Law 90-431, which went into effect July 26, 1968, only veterans taking fulltime vocational rehabilitation training were entitled to a training allowance, Coker explained.

He noted that President Johnson, in his special message to Congress on servicemen and veterans last January 30, called for enactment of the part-time vocational rehabilitation legislation.

At that time the President pointed out that a "disabled veteran can take Vocational Rehabilitation and receive a training allowance only if he trains full time. This restriction may present him with a hard choice: leave his job for training, or forego the training itself.

"Clearly, that choice is unfair," the President said. PL 90-431 continues the requirement that the veteran generally be rated at least 30 percent service-disabled in order to be eligible for vocational rehabilitation but establishes a pro-rata schedule of training allowances based upon three-quarters and half-time training, Coker said.

The VA Regional Office Manager explained that the full-time vocational rehabilitation training allowance remains at \$110 month-

ly for veterans with no dependents, \$150 for veterans with one dependent, and \$175 for veterans with two or more dependents.

Permitted for the first time under PL 90-431 are three-quarters time training allowances of \$80, \$110 and \$130 monthly, respectively, for veterans with no dependents, one dependent, and two or more dependents, Coker said.

The newly authorized half-time training allowances are \$55, \$75 and \$85 monthly.

Under the part-time vocational rehabilitation program, the VA will pay all tuition, fees and other training costs in addition to the training allowance, as it has done under the established full-time program, Coker said.

He emphasized that in addition to the training allowance and costs, the eligible service-disabled veteran, whether receiving full-time or part-time vocational rehabilitation training, is also paid a service-connected disability compensation from VA based on his degree of disability.

Veterans rated 50 percent or more disabled also receive an added dependents allowance as part of their compensation benefits.

Coker said that detailed information on the liberalized vocational rehabilitation training program can be obtained from the Waco VA Regional Office handling the claims for eligible disabled veterans in this area.

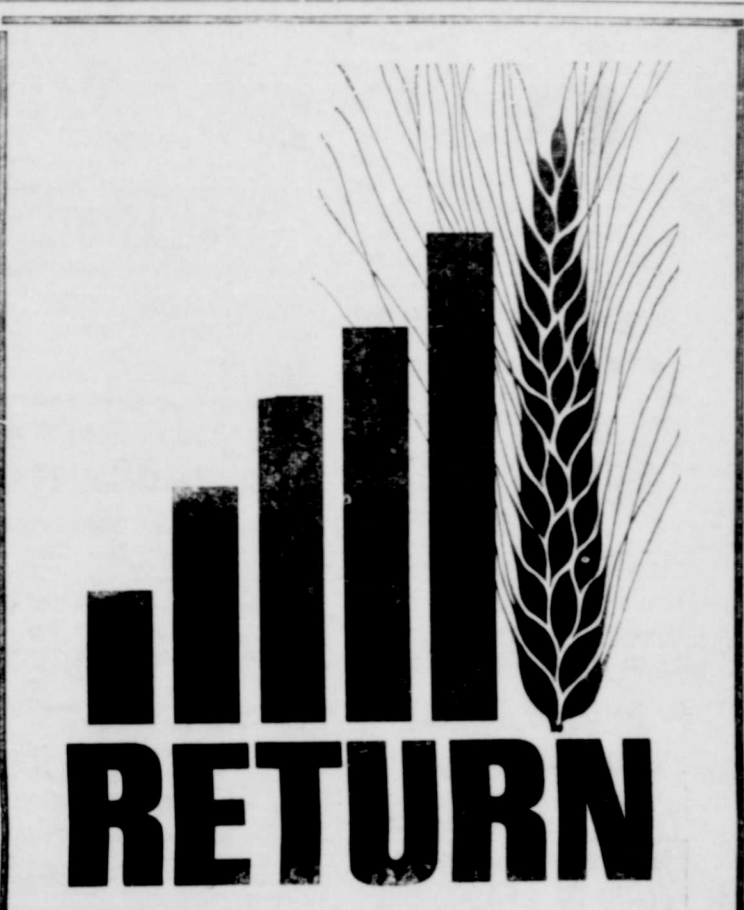
