Silverton Drops District Opener

Silverton's Owls dropped their conference opener to the Wheeler Mustangs here Friday night in a 16-8 battle.

The Owls came close to victory, beating Wheeler on statistics and penetrations. But these things don't count with a 16-8 score disadvantage in the game even though most fans agreed that they played hard and deserved to win.

Cletus Grady, jr. gained approximately 110 yards, 25 yards on passes; Bill Strange gained approximately 80 yards, 5 on pass; Mike Tate gained about 55 yards, all on passes and one pass interference call.

The total Owl offense was 137 yards in the first half and 173 yards in the second half as compared with 84 for Wheeler in the first half and 122 for Wheeler in the second half.

Quarterback Lannie Arnold had one of his best passing records, completing 10 of 21 for about 70 yards and eight points, and getting one intercepted. The Mustangs passed three times, completed none and Arnold intercepted one for the Owls.

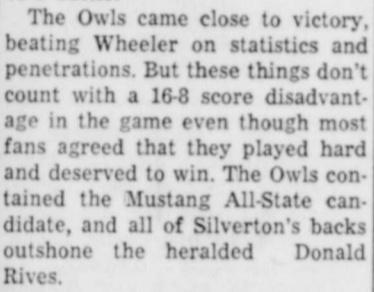
Wheeler was penalized 90 yards, and Owls received penalties for 10 yards.

The first points went up on the scoreboard in the third quarter, when Mustang Tackle Ronald Rives caught Arnold in the end zone for a safety as Silverton attempted a fourth down punt.

Wheeler scores were also recorded in the third quarter, on a 43-yard run by Fullback Dave Britt and on a five-yard run by Donald Rives. Tommy Cole kicked both extra points.

In the fourth quarter, Arnold passed to Tate for a touchdown from three yards out. Arnold passed to End Gary Whitfill for the extra points.

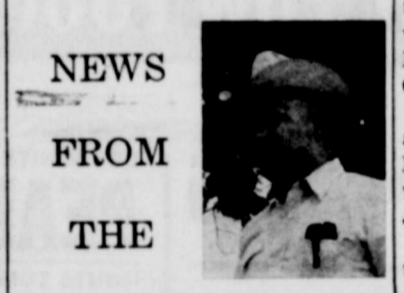
BRISCOE COUNTY TSTA UNIT ASKS PASSAGE OF AMENDMENT NO. 9

"This Amendment modernizes the Teacher Retirement System by eliminating the constitutional salary ceiling on which teachers can now contribute toward their retirement benefits," Mr. Evans continued.

"Eliminating the ceiling should lure new talent from among young people now considering the teaching profession, and should also be an incentive for veteran teachers who badly want to stay in Texas until they retire," Mr. Evans explained.

New Residents Must Vote In Clerk's Office

Voters in the coming general election who moved into the county on or after May 5, 1968, must vote in the county clerk's office by November 1, according to information received from County Clerk Bertha Pavlicek.

Formerly, persons who moved from one county to another could not vote during the first six months after the change of residence, but a new law enacted last year now permits them to vote on all statewide votes, including President and Vice President, and on proposed constitutional amendments, but not on local offices and issues.

However, instead of voting at a regular polling place on election day, they must vote during a special time period in the county clerk's office in the county of their new residence.

In order to vote, the person must be registered as a Texas voter for the 1968 voting year, and he should have his registration certificate with him when he applies for his ballot at the county clerk's office.

Election Ballot Change May Confuse Some Voters

Two factors may cause some balloting confusion in the November 5 general election, election officials in Texas forecast this week.

The two factors are:

1. A new State law has inserted a new top line on the paper ballots so that persons desiring to vote a "straight party ticket" may do so by making one mark. This new line is expected to confuse not only the "straight ticket" voters, but also the "split ticket" voters.
2. "Split ticket" voters are expected to be more numerous than ever before, especially since there is a third party, the American Party, and it has candidates for only President and Vice-President and no other offices.

Voters are cautioned to be certain that their ballots are properly marked so that their intentions will not be subject to interpretation by election officials.

The "scratch" method of voting, which some people prefer, is still permitted. However, voters using this method are cautioned to be certain to mark through all names in all three party columns for which they do not wish to vote.

There are 19 counties in Texas that use voting machines. As in the past, one lever can be pulled to vote a "straight ticket." To vote a "split ticket," individual levers should be pulled for each candidate of the voter's choice. Persons who are uncertain as to how to operate a machine should contact one of the election officials before entering the voting booth.

Voting machines are scheduled to be used in the following counties: Bell, Bexar, Brazoria, Cameron, Dallas, Ector, El Paso, Galveston, Gregg, Harris, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Midland, Nueces, Potter, Randall, Rusk, Smith and Tarrant.

Broad Scope Of 4-H Projects Keep Youths Busy

Heading the list of the top 10 projects undertaken by the nation's three million 4-H youths are animal science, clothing, foods and plant science. Recent figures released by the Cooperative Extension Service show that youngsters also are very much interested in health and physical fitness.

In addition to animal and plant sciences, the application of scientific principles is a part of nearly all 4-H projects, says the Extension Service.

Recreation, engineering and safety are three more areas in which large numbers of 4-H members excel. Projects involving management and furnishings for the home show high enrollment, as does conservation.

Community service and personal development are a prime concern of today's 4-H'ers as well, judging from the more than 300,000 participating.

Most 4-H boys and girls spend their time on more than one project, as the survey shows. Boys may be involved in plant and animal sciences and engineering projects.

A girl may study plant science to make her horticultural project more meaningful. Or food science to get the most from her foods and nutrition projects. Overlapping areas are safety and conservation. Both affect the individual, the home, community and nation.

Specific programs—or projects—carried on under the 10 main categories have definite objectives that help develop skills and stimulate young minds to "clearer thinking," 4-H leaders point out.

For example, a youngster

working on an entomology project (science) will gain new knowledge, improve his surroundings, and possibly "turn him on" sufficiently to seek a college degree and ultimately a career.

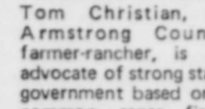

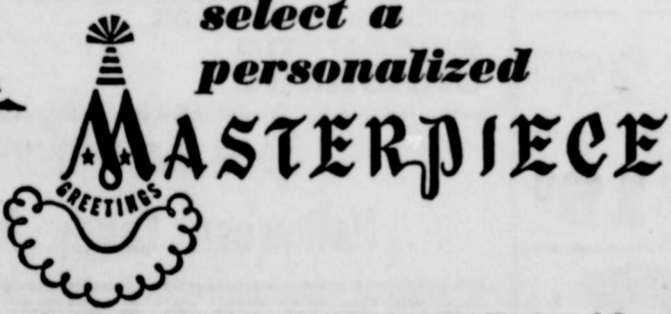
