High Plains Rodeo draws 680 entrants

With almost 680 runs in three marathon nights of rodeo, the Muleshoe Roping Club's High Plains Junior Rodeo Association junior rodeo ended its annual run early Sunday at Dusty Rhodes Arena.

Competitors from all over West Texas and Eastern New Mexico participated in the event, which filled Muleshoe with pickups, trailers, parents and competitors.

An annual fund raiser for the Roping Club and its Young Riders group, the HPJRA rodeo means dollars to the community and a week of short sleep for the organizers and workers. Performances ended between 1:30 and 2:30 a.m. each night.

The HPJRA caravan moves on to Lovington, NM, June 2-29. The season continues with rodeos in Colorado City July 4-6; in Earth July 11-13 and Big Spring July 18-20. The association will hold its finals July 24-2 in Clovis, NM.

Several area youth made their mark during the Muleshoe rodeo, including Jeffery Seaton and Josh Morris of Lazbuddie. The pair teamed up to place third in the 13-15 team roping and Seaton won the ribbon roping and was third in the calf roping in his age group. He also placed sixth in the team roping with Cody Lawrence.

Morris was second behind Seaton in the ribbon roping and was 10th in the calf roping. He was also second in the team roping with Clint McCloy, also of Lazbuddie.

Muleshoe's highest finish came from Clay Myers, who teamed with Clint Jones to place second in the 16-19 team roping.

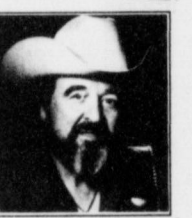

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MISD moving appraisal office

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees Monday accepted the resignations of two teachers, bringing the total number of resignations to eleven since the end of the school year.

"That's a pretty routine turnover," said MISD Superintendent Bill Moore of the 8.5 percent attrition rate. The MISD employs 128 teachers.

Trustees accepted resignations from Sandy Adair, Watson Junior High science teacher, and Brenda Black, Watson Resource math teacher.

Trustees hired Debbie Lovelady, first grade teacher at Dillman, Susan Bigham, Watson Resource math teacher, John Tuttle, Watson science teacher, and Billy Wall, high school special education instructor. Board members also hired Beth Mims, kinder-

garten teacher at Dillman, and Jesse Russell, high school teacher and coach.

In other action, board members approved a resolution to apply revenue from the sale of the current Bailey Central Appraisal District office toward the purchase of a new office.

The proposal includes the purchase of the new office, located in the vacant Bank of America building, for \$65,000. Moore said that three fourths approval by the voting entities in the appraisal district, including Three Way High School, MISD, the City of Muleshoe, and Bailey County is required for the proposal to pass.

Appraisal district employee Kay Elliott said that MISD will pay for approximately 46.5

Rains that began Monday afternoon and continued well into Tuesday morning offered hope for southern Bailey County farmers stripped of their cotton crops by drought early in the season.

"If we can continue to get a few showers on the dryland sorghum it will help to at least get a

cover," said Marvin McCall of Maple Coop Gin, which received three inches of rain overnight. "I don't know if its enough to make a crop, but it will at least get it up."

Areas surrounding Muleshoe received varied rainfall. Enochs received more than an inch, while Lariat and Lazbuddie received

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Cotton production drops in 1995

LUBBOCK — Final production figures from the 1995 High Plains crop indicate the 25-county area produced slightly over 2.6 million bales.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG) the main reasons for the production drop were early season drought, a mid-season flood (in some areas) and high insect pressure.

Compared to 1994, when producers chalked up their second 3 million-plus bale effort, the 1995 crop reflected a 14 percent drop in production.

Abandonment figures for 1995 indicate only 9.5 percent of the 3,621,900 acres initially planted went unharvested. This figure is slightly higher than the 6 percent lost in 1994.

A side by side comparison shows the true colors of last year's crop. What really stands out about 1995 is the fact that

area producers harvested 250,000 more acres than they did in 1994 and made 427,900 bales less. Average yields across the 25-county dropped from about one bale per acre to only 385 pounds per acre.

about .6". R.G. Bennett, an observer for the National Weather Service in Muleshoe, said 1.33" fell in the city, bringing the monthly total to 3.97". Normal precipitation for the month of June is 2.21".

Bill Hopkins, an employee of the Weather Service in Lubbock, said the rainfall was caused by an upper-level disturbance moving out of Mexico across southwest Texas. Hopkins said there is a chance

of thunderstorms through Thursday.

Bailey County Extension Agent Curtis Preston said that Monday's rain was beneficial, but additional rain is needed to ensure a good harvest.

"The rain was enough to give the dryland grain sorghum a start," Preston said. "At least it'll have a chance now, where before there wasn't even a chance."

Preston said that more sig-

nificant rains need to be followed by weather conditions that will prolong the effect of the moisture.

"You have less evaporation on a calm, humid day than you would on a dry, windy day," Preston said. "Those little 2/10 inch showers weren't helping anything," he continued. "If we can get more of the 1/2 to 1 inch rains where it's humid and calm the next day we'll get some good out of it."

Free Pepsi will be given away all four days and clowns Orange Jetter and Red Top will be on hand to entertain the children and give away free balloons.

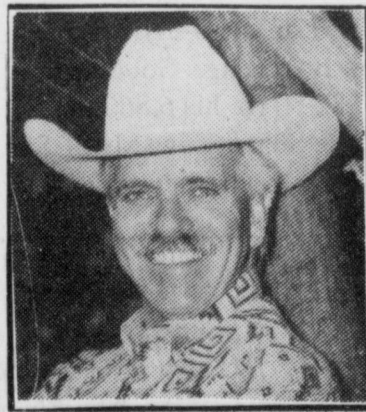

"If I had only one more run to make before I die, I'd want it to be with this yahoo because it would seem like a lifetime," Ralph cracked.

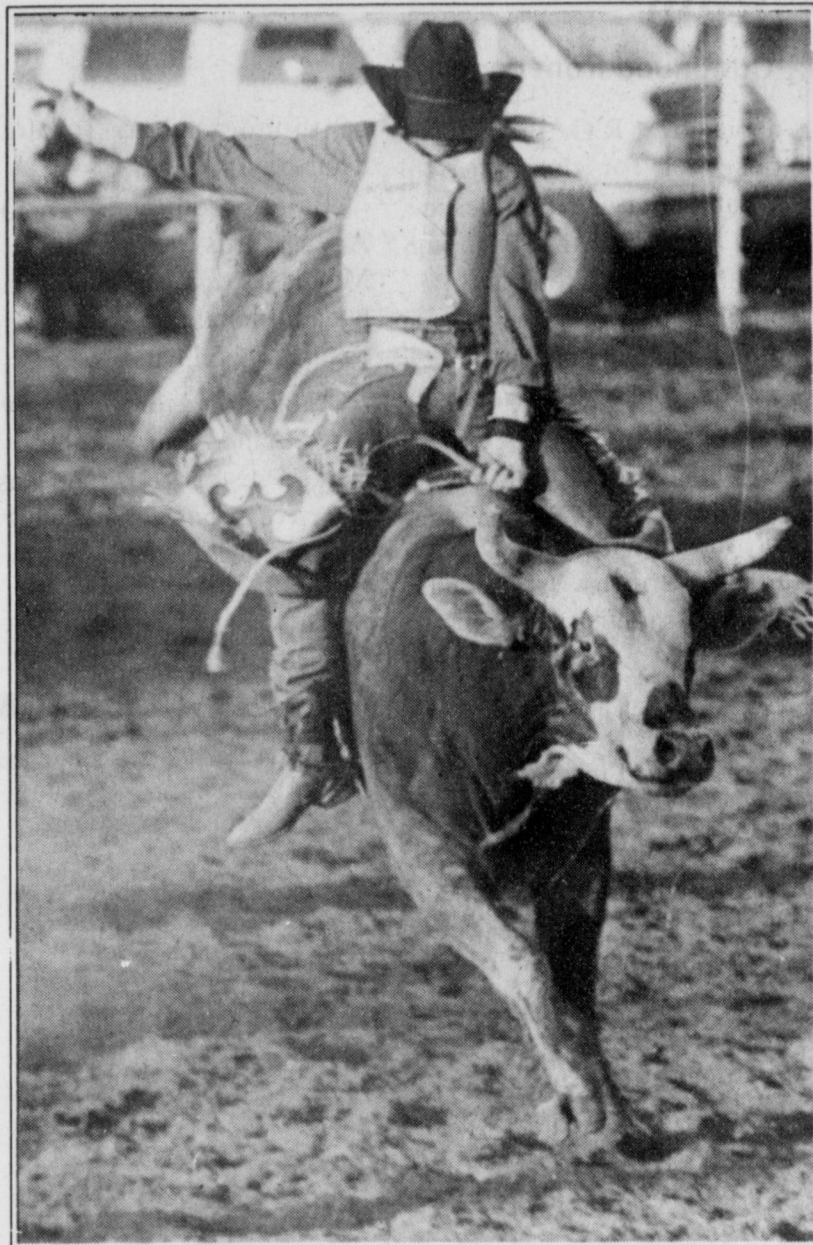
