

**All Around the Town**

Due to circumstances—the kind that no one really needs to explain these days—it has become necessary to announce an increase in the local subscription rate of the Briscoe County News. After February 1, 1970, the Briscoe County News annual subscription rate will be \$3.50 in this county and elsewhere. Nine-month student subscriptions will be \$3.00 each.

This increase is due to our ever-increasing overhead: the price of newsprint and postage continue upward every year. The subscription rate of the Briscoe County News is not among the things that have increased by leaps and bounds in past years, and it is with regret that this is done now because we, the publishers, prefer that every family here be a by-mail subscriber.

It will still pay local families to be by-mail subscribers. At the over-the-counter rate of 10¢ per copy, the year's 52 issues cost \$5.20.

**1929**

In 1929, the Briscoe County News subscription rate was \$2.00 a year, and was offered on special for \$1.50. That year the Dallas Morning News was offered on fall special for \$7.45 and for a Christmas rate of \$5.95, reduced from the regular rate of \$10.00.

The Silvertown Schools had 17 teachers on its faculty that year, and all seven of the high school teachers had degrees.

The Chevrolet Six Coach was advertised by Patton Motor Company for \$565.00, and the Roadster went for \$435.00. A 1927 Coach was advertised for \$275.00—“I think a 1927 Chevrolet would sell for more than that today!”

Castleberry Dry Goods offered ladies shoes for \$3.45 to \$5.95.

Dr. Green of Plainview advertised in the Briscoe County News false teeth for \$17.50 up, gold crowns for \$5.00, bridgework for \$5.00, fillings \$1.00 up, and extractions for \$1.00.

Whiteside and Co. advertised Nashua blankets for \$3.95 and cotton blankets for \$1.95; boys suits for \$6.95 to \$15.00; mens suits for \$15.00 to \$42.50.

Bonar Drug had console model radios for \$109.00. Cowart and Son advertised three pounds of coffee and five pounds of sugar for \$1.31 and Kellogg's Corn Flakes for 9¢.

Tull and Crass Implement offered good - as - new McCormick-Deering tractors for \$375.00 and \$400.00.

The Fort Worth and Denver Railway offered a get-acquainted tour to the Tunnels for \$1.10 round trip. The tour left Silvertown at 1:00 p.m.; left Whiteley at 1:35 p.m.; left Sterley at 2:00 p.m., and arrived at the Gravel Pits at 2:50 p.m. It was estimated that the tour would arrive back in Silvertown at 7:00 p.m. (Wonder how many would pay \$1.10 for a round-trip tour by train to the Gravel Pits today?)

**1939**

In 1939, the local school system employed only 14 teachers, and one of them was Lem Weaver!

For \$2.50, a \$4.75-value package containing 52 issues each of the Briscoe County News and Pathfinder, 12 issues each of McCall's, Good Stories, Farm Journal, Farmer's Wife and Progressive Farmer could be purchased.

Wood Drug Store offered colored glasses for 25¢ to 39¢; two boxes of Kleenex for 25¢; Eastman Kodak (priced as low as aulton durham), \$2.50; and projectors for \$14.95. (The bit about Aulton Durham, undoubtedly, was a private joke formulated by Roy Hahn.)

Bacon was advertised for 19¢ a pound and four pounds of pinto beans was 25¢. Salad dressing was 25¢ a quart.

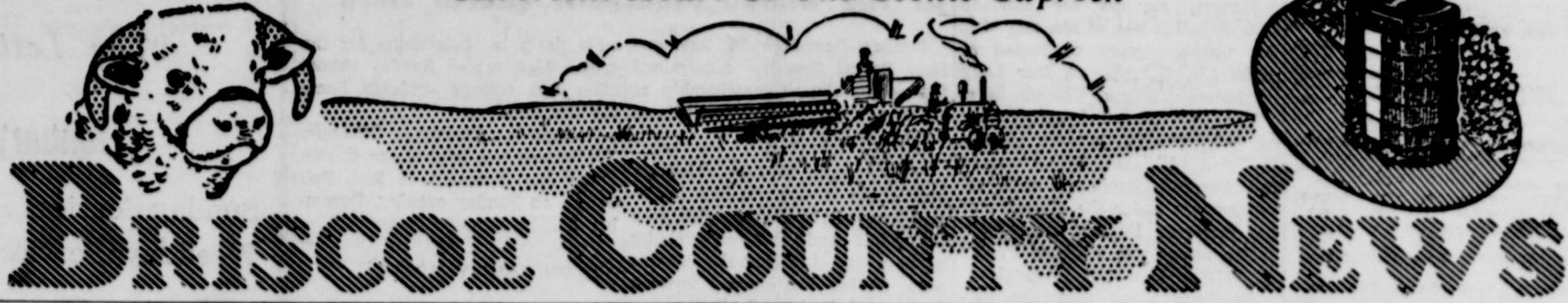
Whiteside's offered Curlee suits from \$15.50 to \$24.50, with extra pants free; six pairs socks for \$1.50; mens dress shoes for \$1.95 up.

The Amarillo Daily News was advertised on special for \$5.50; Star Telegram for \$7.45; Wichita Falls Record-News for \$5.50, and the Briscoe County News for \$1.00. In combination with any one of the papers listed, the Briscoe County News sold for 50¢ a year.

Kings Beauty Shop had permanent sets for \$1.00.

Roy Holtzclaw Jeweler in Tulla advertised complete sets of 1947 Rogers for \$16.25 up; Bulova watches for \$24.75; diamond rings for \$17.50, and birthstone rings for \$2.25 up.

# Aoudad Season To Open Here Saturday

Hunting season on the wary and rugged Aoudads, or Barbary sheep, will open in the Palo Duro Basin Saturday and will continue for five days through January 7, with hunting by special permit

only, say Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission members in Austin. Special permits for hunting the Aoudads have been issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

ment to landowners, who may then issue the permits to the stalkers of the wily exotics, usually on a hunting fee basis. Some landowners not only sell the permits to hunt but also include guide service for the hunt.

From the 44 sheep released in the Palo Duro, Tule and Caprock area in 1957 and 1958, their population was estimated last March at 600 sheep by Will Ray Long of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices in San Angelo.



The number of permits for hunting this season is 116, raised in number from the 97 issued for the January 1969 hunt. In 1969, 97 hunters saw 278 sheep and brought 33 to bag. The hunters who were successful used an average of 18½ hours each in the quest of the Aoudads.

In the last five years from an issuance of 330 hunting permits, 78 of the Aoudads have been killed. Rough terrain, occasional inclement weather, the speed and elusiveness of the Barbary sheep, their ability to “freeze” into immobility, and their light brown coat’s blending into the rocky terrain all assist the sheep in clinging to life in the brief five-day hunting seasons.

The Aoudads are found in only two areas in the wild state on the North American continent, in the mountains of northern New Mexico and in the Palo Duro Basin, including the counties of Armstrong, Briscoe, Floyd and Randall.

The Aoudads, originally from the Atlas Mountains of North Africa, are the only wild sheep on that continent. Hunters of this area say the sure-footed animals can travel at near full speed in two directions—straight up and straight down—on the rocky canyon walls.

The animals are hardy, prolific, are said to be tasty when properly prepared for the table, and they apparently have found the Palo Duro Basin much to their liking. Although there are many coyotes and bobcats in the canyons also, no sheep have been slain by predators in any case known to wildlife biologists of the Panhandle region.

Hunting of the bearded Aoudads has attracted trophy seekers from far distances to this area but in the 1969 season, Matt Mills of Pampa, 18, killed an Aoudad with record size horns, 32 inches in length, on an Armstrong County ranch.

In that same county in the 1964 hunt, an Aoudad ram which field dressed at 270 pounds likely sets a Texas record for weight. In spite of these statistics, year after year, the largest numbers of Aoudad killed have been from Briscoe County ranches.

Hunters are required to check out their kills of the Barbary sheep at check stations maintained by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel.

## New System Devised For 1970 Motor Vehicle Registration

Texas drivers will find registering their motor vehicles for 1970 easier than ever before, thanks to a new registration system devised by the Texas Highway Department.

The Department expects more than seven million vehicles to be registered during the year and there will be several new wrinkles.

First, license plates will have a new color scheme—light blue on a reflective white background.

Second, for the first time, motor vehicle registration renewal applications will be mailed to every vehicle owner in Texas during January. The registration period begins February 1.

The renewal application will arrive in the mail in a slender envelope marked “IMPORTANT THIS IS YOUR LICENSE PLATE RENEWAL APPLICATION.”

The application itself has instructions printed on it. It is a three-part form which should not be torn apart.

When the registration period begins, the vehicle owner need only take the application—and the fee—to the county tax office. Or he can order his plates by mail.

With the application, he will no longer need to present his certificate of title or the last year's registration receipt.

If he decides to go to the county tax office or a substitution, he will find shorter waiting lines. With the application, the clerk will need only to receive the fee, affix to the application a sticker showing the registration number and other data and hand over the 1970 plates.

Some vehicle owners may find it even more convenient to go through the registration process by mail.

Although owners can register their vehicles in person until April 1, there is a March 1 cutoff date for mail registration. This allows 30 days for delivery before 1970 plates must be displayed on vehicles.

If the vehicle owner wants his plates mailed to him, he should send his registration application to his county tax collector, with the registration fee plus \$1, which is the statutory charge for handling and postage.

If the address on the renewal application is incorrect, the vehicle owner should print his correct residence address on all three parts of the application.

The new registration renewal system is the product of an extensive computerization of the Highway Department's motor vehicle registration records.

Initiation of the new system means Texas now has one of the most efficient systems in the nation for filing and registering motor vehicle registrations. Motorist convenience will be one of the greatest dividends of the new system.

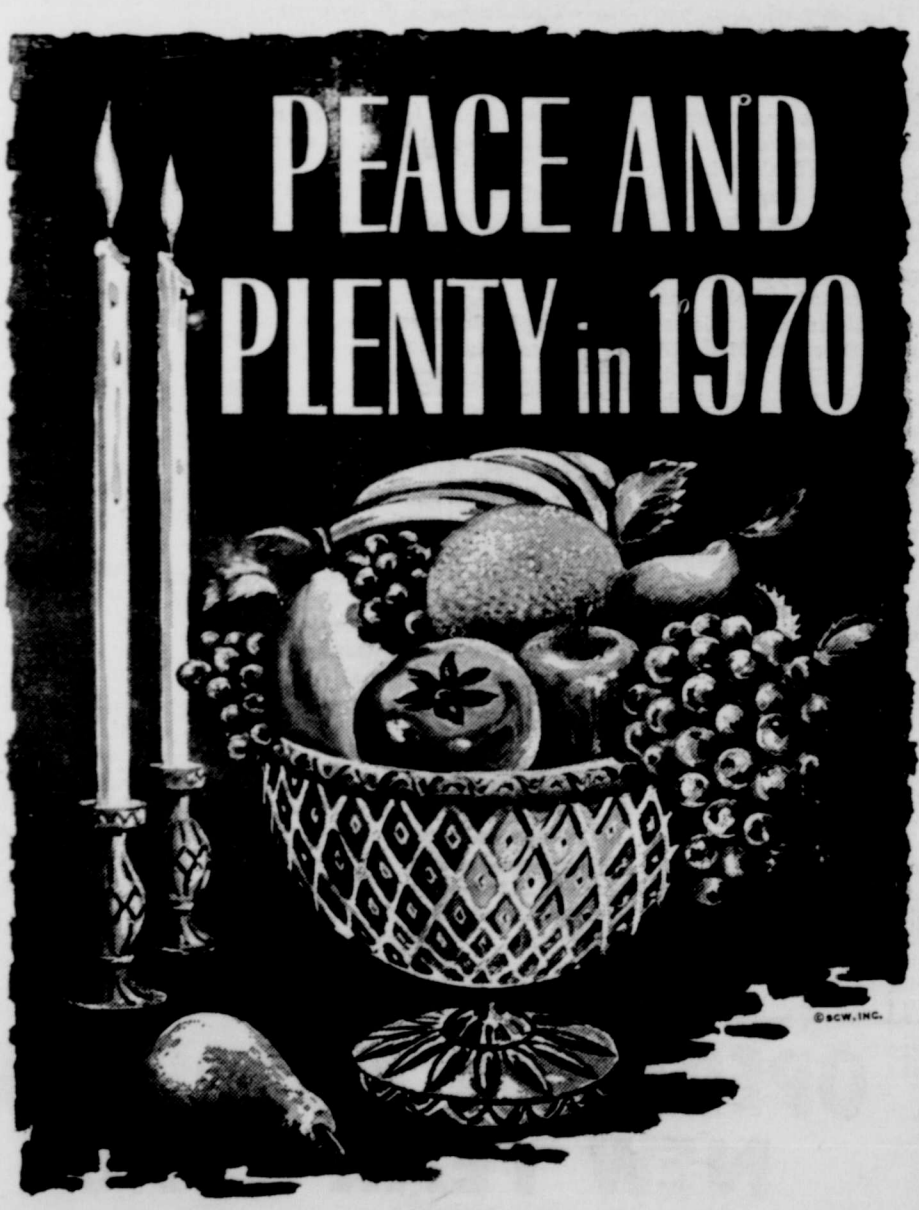

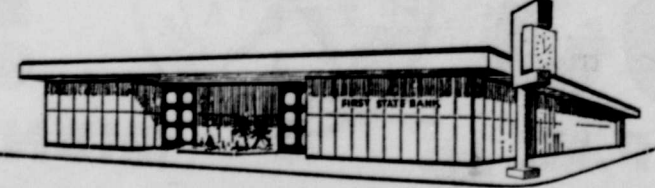

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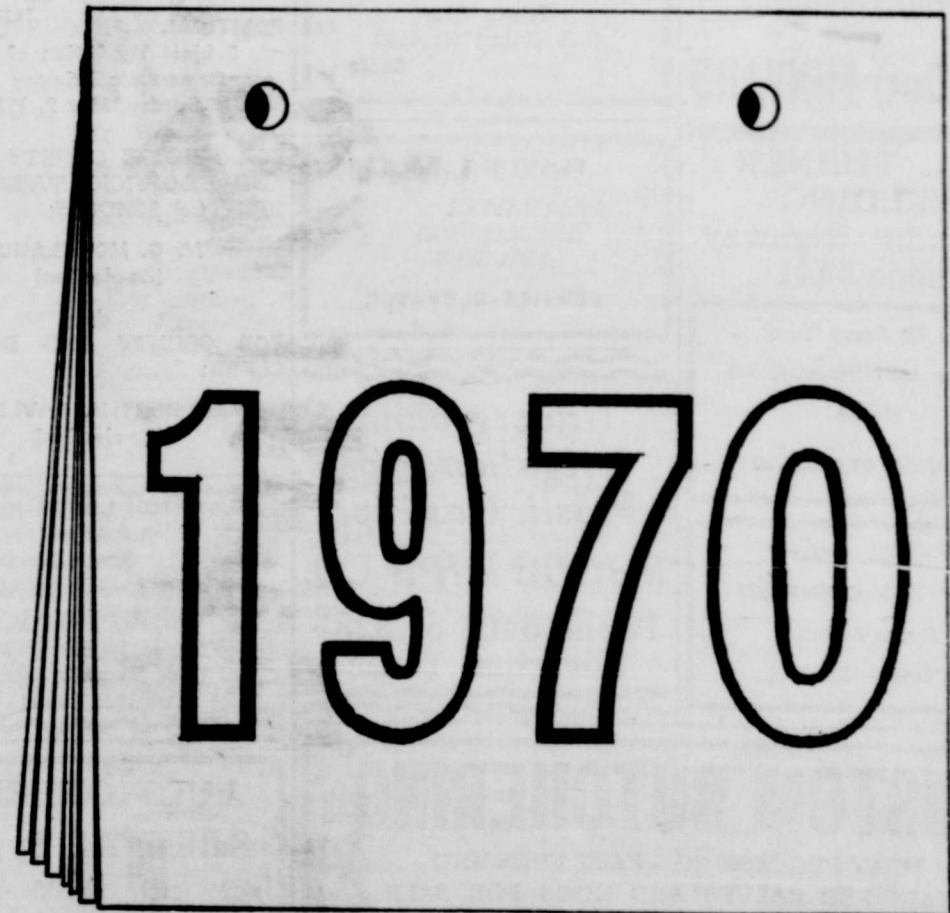
