Home Notes

Mrs. Gordon Lowrey and I attended the "Beef-a-Rama" in Plainview last week. The program was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Products (TAP) and the Hale County Farm Bureau. Here are highlights of the informative program.

To save money, buy economy cuts and cook properly to make them tender. Buy thicker pieces of meat—they will be more juicy because of less dehydration of the juice—and you will have more meat for your money.

It was demonstrated how to take a blade chuck roast, cut steaks from the large muscle, then use the remainder for roasting.

In shopping for meat, look for:
 1. Cherry red muscle color
 2. Fine even grain in the muscle
 3. Marbling (small bits of fat distributed among the muscle fibers). This contributes to tenderness.

4. Check the bone—a young animal will have a porous bone with a lot of red in it. The bone of an older animal will be white and flinty.

5. Don't buy more fat on the cut of meat than you need for flavor. ¼" of fat is not excessive.

There are two methods of cooking meat: dry heat and moist heat. The parts of the animal which the sun shines on can be cooked with dry heat. These muscles receive very little exercise and are used just to sustain the animal.

One dry heat method is broiling. Here are some tips on broiling:

Preheat broiler
 Broil with door open

Determine the distance to place the meat from the flame this way:

Multiply the thickness by two and add one inch (a 2" steak x 2 plus 1"=5". Place meat 5" from flame).

Turn meat with tongs instead of a fork. A fork punctures and lets out juices. Season meat after broiling.

The muscles from the parts of the animal which the sun does not shine on need to be cooked with moist heat methods. These are the muscles used by the animal in walking and eating.

One moist heat method is pot roasting. Some type of liquid is used, and this liquid helps make the meat more tender. Any type of liquid can be used such as fruit or vegetable juice or soft drinks. Here are some tips on roasting:

Brown a roast before cooking. This seals in the juices.

Use a meat thermometer into the center of the thickest part of the lean meat so that it does not rest in fat or on bone which will give a false reading.

Season after broiling as salt will draw out the juices.

Cook all meat LOW and SLOW to avoid excess shrinkage.

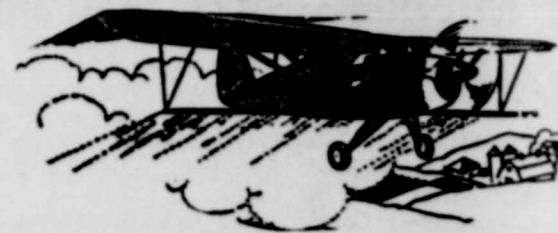

Locals Win Places In Judo Tourney

(Delayed From Last Week)
Last Friday James Alexander and Herb Stephens journeyed to Bossier, Louisiana for a Judo Tournament. Mr. Alexander placed second and Mr. Stephens won fourth place in their respective divisions.

BOSSIER MAY BE U.S. JUDO CENTER

Rick Mertens, executive secretary of the United States Judo Association and a long-time resident of Bossier City has announced that his Louisiana city may become the Judo Capital of the United States, and, in time, the World Judo Center.

Mertens said, "The Central goal of the U. S. Judo Association is to enroll in the immediate future over 1,000,000 boys and girls in the judo program. If these youngsters are active in a sporting event two to five afternoons a week, they won't be investigating dope or other childlike activities."

The eight men who comprise the Board of Governors of the United States Judo Association are to discuss the feasibility of the USJA being located in Bossier City. The board will also schedule activities for the U. S. Judo Association for the coming year.

When asked about the importance of building the U. S. National Judo Institute in the Bossier-Shreveport area (there are two chapters in Bossier, three in Shreveport, and one in Houghton, at present) it was pointed out that weekend judo competition will bring from 150 to 500 out-of-town guests into Bossier City motels, restaurants and shopping centers; the institute will provide a training center and dormitory facilities where young women and men may live while studying the art of Judo and attending one of the local colleges; the institute will

train men and women for national and international competition with the world's best instructors; employment of office personnel a lone will involve more than 12 persons plus the instructional staff; the United States Registration Center of Judo will be centered in Bossier City, and the town will continue to be the world's largest importer of judo uniforms and national dues; this would be expanded to include the sale of books, pamphlets and equipment which could exceed a total of more than a million dollars by 1975.

When asked to sight the advantages of learning judo, Mertens said, "Judo was introduced in the U. S. in 1902 by Mr. Yamashita who first gave lessons to President Roosevelt. Judo is neither mystic nor dangerous nor painful, for it is the safest contact competitive sport known. It is a sport to be enjoyed fully even by women, elderly men, boys and girls . . . in fact, the age span of the USJA membership is 3 to 83 years . . . judo can be performed not only as a sport but as a physical culture . . . it develops self-confidence . . . it is relaxing . . . it can afford you the valuable art of a self-defense . . . it is one of the least expensive competitive sports known to man."

Mertens ended his interview by saying that he hoped the United States Judo Association Board of Governors will select Bossier City as the home of the U. S. Judo Institute. The institute will not only provide Bossier City with an added industry, but will also provide an additional recreation center for the youth and adults of this area and the nation.

Soon gave her to know she had nothing to dread.

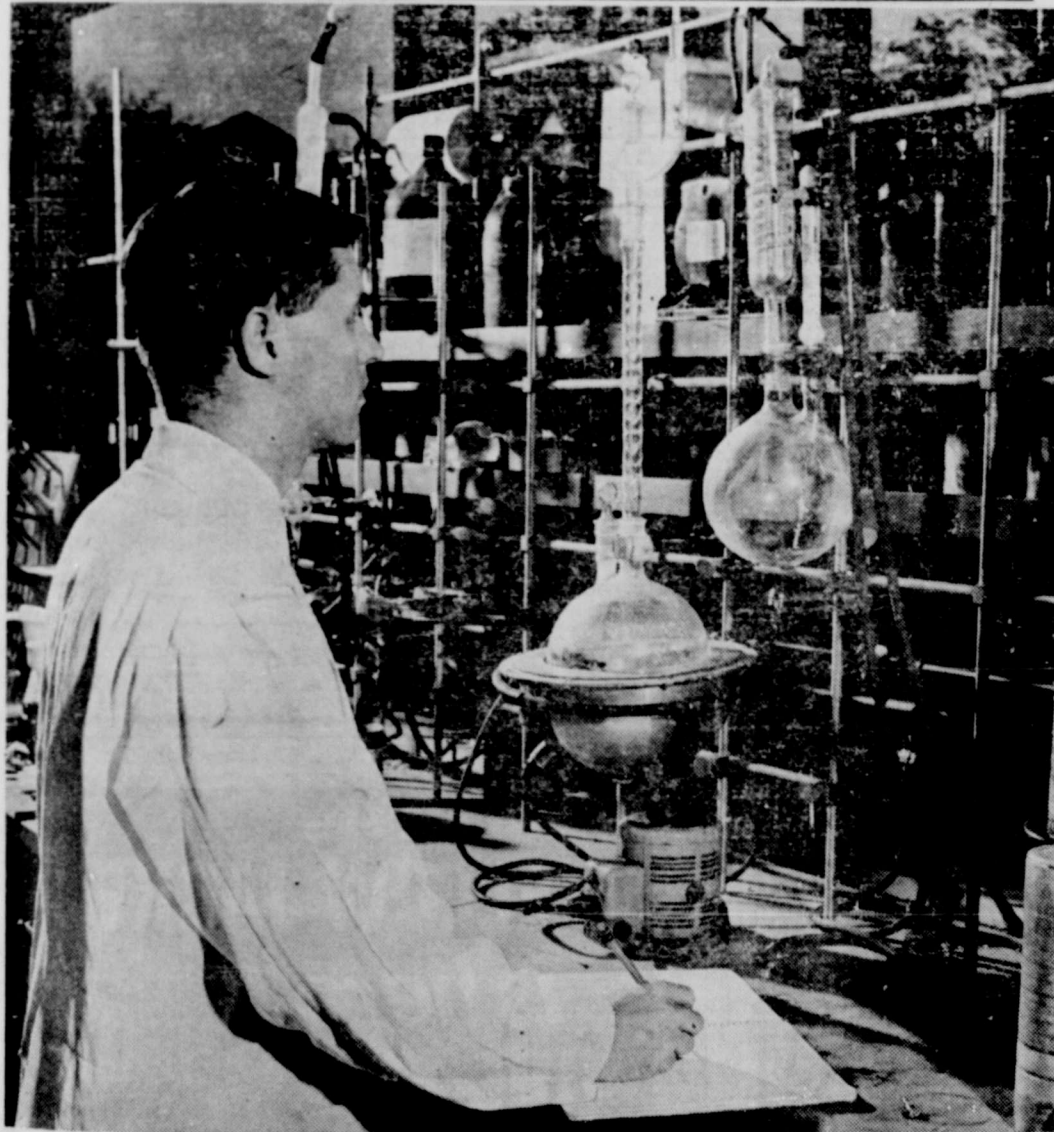
