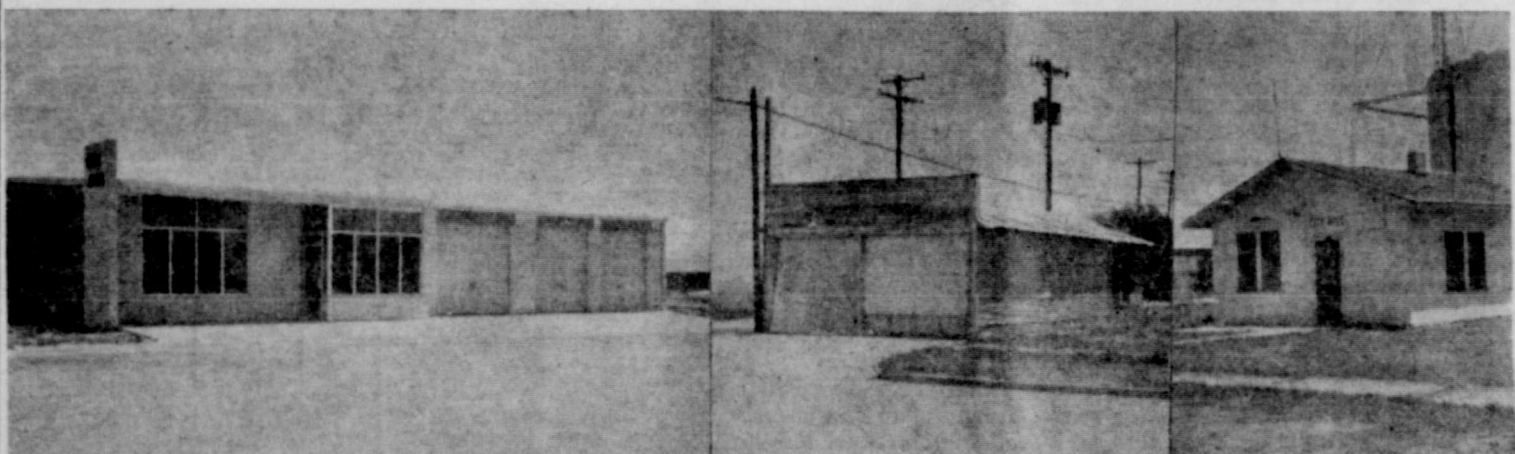

Recovery Operations Continue On Around-The-Clock Basis In Lubbock

In a "first-time-ever" operation, the federal government is establishing a one-stop referral system for Lubbock-area tornado victims. George Hastings, chief of the 600-man federal relief force now operating in the 10 West Texas counties declared a major disaster area by President Nixon, said that two such centers are being established in the City of Lubbock, where the need seems to be apparent. Slated to begin operations Monday, the information and service units are located at Mi Casita, the Northeast Community Center at 2420 E. Erskine Street, and the Guadalupe Center at First Street and Avenue P.

Applications have resulted in 20 applications for agriculture recovery loans. (All of the counties struck by tornadoes on April 17, April 18 and May 11 were included in the President's designation of the national disaster area.) The Food and Nutrition Service has supplied an initial 70,000 pounds of USDA-donated foods to the City-County Welfare Department for the new St. Vincent Pallotti Mission food distribution center. The center reports that over 300 persons were given a two-week emergency supply of food Saturday.

Hastings said the President's Office of Emergency Preparedness is sponsoring the centers, staffed with Spanish- and English-speaking recovery experts. Included are representatives from the following levels of government and agencies to give advice and assist in preparing necessary paperwork: State of Texas, City of Lubbock, Salvation Army, Red Cross, Office of Economic Opportunity, Small Business Administration, Federal Housing Administration and the Office of Emergency Preparedness.

The Small Business Administration has issued over 500 disaster loan applications to date and 19 loan checks were presented Saturday. Loan specialists from all over the nation are staffing SBA offices seven days a week. Additional assistance is being rendered by Texas Tech students acting as counselors, and by area banks. Reese Air Force Base is supplying some 100 volunteers, six trucks and vans to assist the City in transportation of food and clothing to the Guadalupe Center, the Red Cross, Salvation Army, and Warehouse 41. A 2 1/2-ton truck also has been loaned to the Guadalupe Center for food distribution. In addition, the base is supplying photo support to the Office of Emergency Preparedness and the Corps of Engineers with aerial reconnaissance photographs of the damaged areas.

The Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service has completed a survey of Lubbock County to determine the density and location of debris. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is initiating action in Lubbock and Cochran counties for removal of debris from private property. The Farmers Home Administration reports that, while no major damages were sustained in Lubbock County farm operations, earlier tornadoes in Cochran, Hockley, Lamb, Hale, Briscoe and Don-

The preliminary population figure for Briscoe County has been announced by District Manager Robert L. Butler, who supervised the taking of the 1970 Census of Population and Housing in this area.

Were you counted in Census '70? With the 1970 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Manager R. L. Butler announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

"Were You Counted?" forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures giving the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the District Manager is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued from Washington later this year after returns have been tabulated by the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the District Manager. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next Federal census.

"Representation in the U. S. Congress and the State Legislature is determined by the population count as ascertained in the census. Federal funds are allotted to States and State funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means under representation in the Federal and State law-making bodies and under allotment in government funds. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed to reach this goal," he said.

BAGWORM CONTROL

Bagworms, damaging insect pests of evergreens and occasionally of broadleaf plants, are beginning to make their springtime appearance.

Evergreens should be examined closely and if newly-hatched bagworms are found, control measures should be applied.

The worms immediately spin a

bag of silk around themselves and attach bits of foliage to the outside of the bag as they feed. The larvae carry these bags wherever they go with only the front part of their bodies protruding for feeding and movement. The bags enlarge as the bagworm grows. A heavy infestation can completely strip the plant of its foliage. When this happens, the plant can be lost.

The effective "camouflage" presented by the bags make the insects hard to detect and damage may be extensive before they are noticed. They are much easier to control while they are still young.

If bagworms were present on a particular plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an application of insecticides will soon be needed.

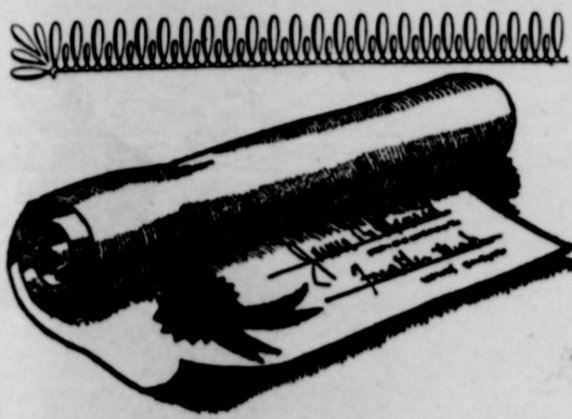

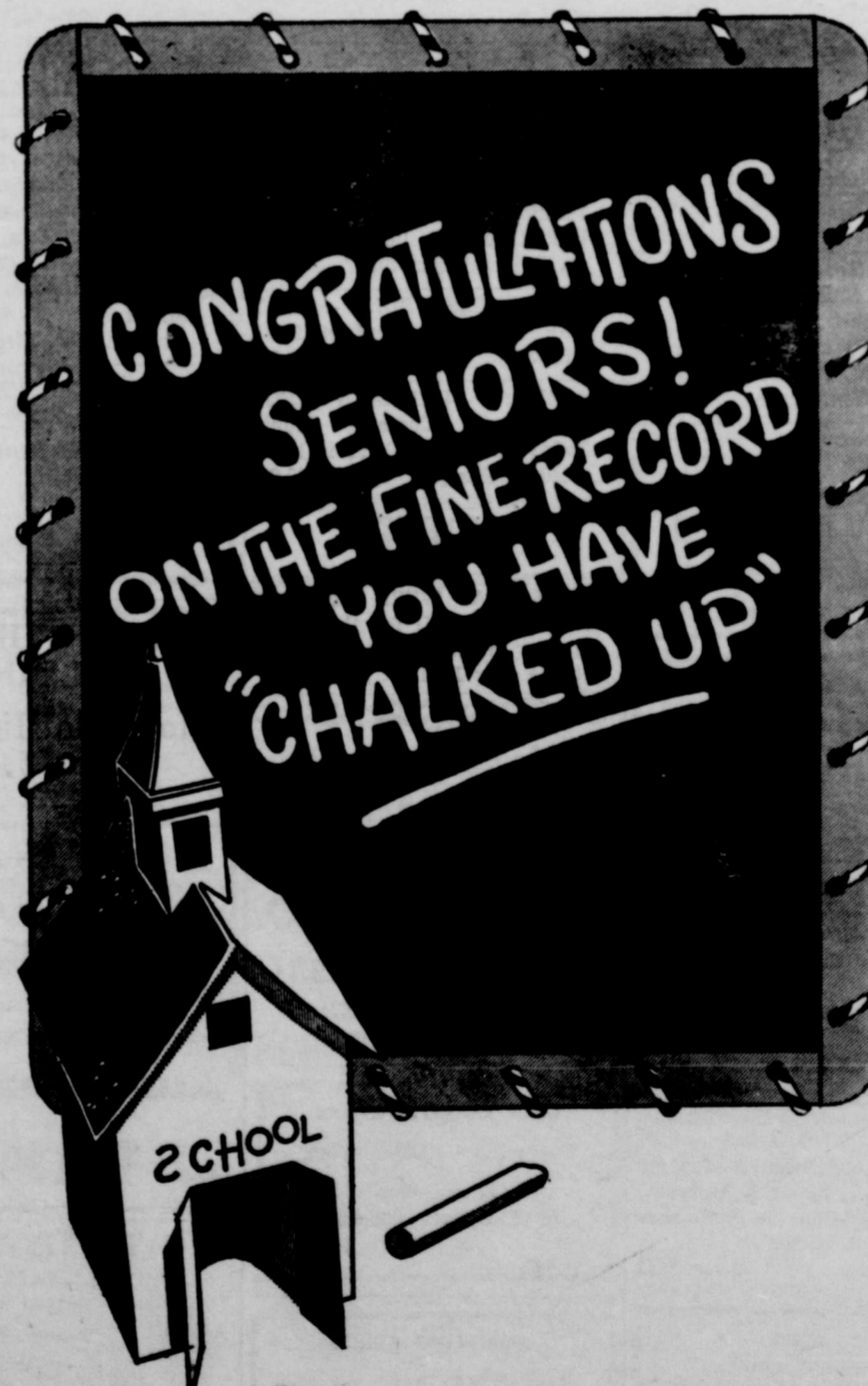
