

Internal Revenue Agents To Conduct Meeting Here

J. Sloan and Ansel Callaway, Internal Revenue Agents from the Lubbock office, will conduct a meeting here at 8:00 p.m. Thursday, June 11 in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank. It is very important that everyone who suffered a loss of any kind in the tornado here April 17 attend the meeting and receive the information that these agents will present regarding income tax deductions of losses suffered.

The agents will give detailed information on what must be done now in regard to the preparation of 1970 income tax returns next year.

HOW TO CLAIM A TAX LOSS ON TORNADO DAMAGE

Many taxpayers in the ten-county disaster area will be able to claim a tax benefit on their 1970 income tax returns as a result of the recent tornadoes and storms, according to the Internal Revenue Service. President Nixon designated Briscoe, Cochran, Donley, Gray, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Farmer and Swisher counties as a disaster area due to the storms and tornadoes occurring between April 17 and May 12, 1970.

Taxpayers who suffered a disaster loss due to the storms and tornadoes should get a copy of IRS Publication 547, "Tax Information on Disasters, Casualty Losses and Theft." This free publication gives full details on what records the taxpayer needs to claim his loss and how to claim the loss.

These taxpayers should also make plans to attend the special meeting to be conducted here at 8:00 p.m. Thursday, June 11, in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank when Internal Revenue Service agents from the Lubbock office will be available to give further details and answer questions regarding casualty losses.

It has been pointed out that a large number of Plains area taxpayers may be able to claim an immediate benefit by decreasing the amount of tax withheld from their salaries or wages. Taxpayers who will be eligible to claim a substantial increase in their itemized deductions on their Form 1040 for 1970 can decrease their withholding tax by completing a new Form W-4 and a W-4 Schedule A at their employer's payroll office. The Forms W-4 Schedule A, "Determination of Withholding Allowances for Itemized Deductions," are available at any IRS office. Taxpayers who file a 1040ES Estimated Tax form and pay quarterly can adjust their estimated tax payments for quarterly payment due June 15.

A few taxpayers who file fiscal year tax returns may also claim the disaster loss on their 1970 return. Qualifying fiscal year taxpayers who have already filed their 1970 returns may claim their losses by filing an amended return Form 1040X or claim form 843 within three months from the due date of their return.

Internal Revenue points out that some taxpayers who received insurance payments to reimburse them for living expenses incurred for the taxpayer and members of his household resulting from the loss or use of occupancy of his residence destroyed by the storm can exclude the living expense payments from income. This additional tax benefit came in the tax law change of 1968. Additional information concerning excluding insurance benefits covering living expenses will be presented at the meeting.

Taxpayers who have suffered a storm loss are advised to keep complete and accurate records. Appraisals made before and after the damage, records showing the cost of properties, depreciation sustained, and insurance and disaster relief recoveries, are some of the important records that are necessary to establish losses. Photographs of property as it existed before it was damaged will be helpful in showing the condition and value of the property prior to the casualty. Photographs taken after the damage which show the extent of the damage will be helpful in establishing the condition and value of the property after it was damaged. Photographs showing the condition of the property after it was repaired, restored or replaced may also be helpful.

Rain, Hail Destroy Crops Southwest Of Silverton

Crops were completely destroyed by heavy rain and hail about 5:00 p.m. Sunday. The strip hit was from just west of the Rock Creek Store and south.

J. E. Patton and his father-in-law, J. L. West, said that more than three inches of rain and hail up to golfball size wiped out crops on their farm, and Loyd

May also said that his crops were destroyed by the rain and hail. One observer said that so much water went across the highway near the Patton mailbox that he thought "a car would have been washed off the road by it."

Patton said that the floodwater was still "going around" their tank at noon Monday, and the

hogs were having a field day eating the fish and minnows washed out on the grass pasture just like "the bears fishing for salmon."

Hail drifted up like snow in that area. Other rainfall reports included 3.6 inches from the Marvin Montague place eight miles southwest of town and small hail; 1.7 inches at the James Davis farm five miles south; one inch at the D. T. Northcutt place three miles northwest; 1.5 inches at the Roy Mayfield's seven miles northwest. Elton Cantwell and Bill Boling reported 4.3 inches from seven miles southwest of town, while residents nine miles east of Silverton reported only .15 of an inch.

The official measurement in the city was .40 of an inch. The U. S. Weather Bureau radar indicated a "hook type" formation in the cloud system which advanced across the countryside southwest of town, and numerous funnels or potential funnels were reported to the Weather Bureau as the system moved from north-west to southeast.

Pioneer Resident Buried Memorial Day

Funeral services for A. L. (Roy) McMurtry, 82, were conducted on Saturday, May 30, at the First Baptist Church in Silverton, with Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. C. H. Murphy, Jr., pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were nephews: Lee Helvey McMurtry of Texline, Merle McMurtry of Vigo Park, Hoyse McMurtry and Dr. Jim Carpenter, both of Lubbock, Charlie McMurtry of Archer City, and W. E. Burleson of Matador.

Mr. McMurtry died at 4:30 a.m. Friday in Swisher Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient since fracturing his hip about three weeks ago.

Albert Leroy McMurtry was born September 27, 1887, in Denton County, and was one of the twelve children of William and Louisa Francis McMurtry. He moved with his family to Tax Springs in Archer County in 1888, and it was there that he grew to young manhood.

Roy McMurtry came west to Clarendon in 1906 and was employed by the J. A. Ranch. There he worked his way up from wrangler to wagon boss by breaking horses, etc. He stayed with the J. A. until 1915, when he entered the cattle business for himself.

On May 20, 1915, he and Miss Anna Dorn Burleson were united in marriage in Silverton, and to this union were born three children. He engaged in ranching near Vigo Park in 1915 and 1916, and in 1917 moved to the Friona-Muleshoe area where he was engaged in extensive cattle ranching.

When the family moved back to Briscoe County, they settled north of Silverton on the home ranch where they resided until moving to town. He had been a member of the Cattlemen's Association since 1918 and pioneered many things in the cattle industry which are common practices today.

He had served on the Silverton School Board for 20 years, and was a member of the Methodist Church at Archer City. He was confined to Swisher Memorial Hospital for about three weeks with a broken hip prior to his death.

stock—but never again in the real pioneer sense of the word will we see the days and difficulties peculiar to his day.

"Translating the above history into the Parlance of the Plains we have the three points of his life in the cowboy vernacular which has contributed so many descriptive expressions that add a bit of romance even to Death itself, such as: riding into the sunset, crossing the divide, going over the river, joining the riders in the sky.

"May I, then, try this field of parallel? On September 27, 1887, while a wee bit of a fellow, Roy climbed on the bronc called 'Life' and though his very first saddle was a tiny cradle, here began a riding contest which was destined to continue for nearly 83 years. In short, this boy was born into a rancher's world.

"So he rode with the encouraging shout of 'Ride 'em, Cowboy!' from his parents and friends. "His name might have lent itself to any of these nicknames: Al, Bert, or Lee, but somewhere along the way he was branded Roy by tois, teens and oldsters. My mistake in calling him 'Mr. McMurtry' was quickly corrected and resulted in my calling him 'Roy' from then on.

"He made his ride straight up, honestly and with diligence, although I am sure at times, because of the pressures of life, he was forced to 'pull leather' to stay a-broad.

"Though cattle played a great role in his life, I believe that people filled a greater place in his arena. The beneficence of this man could be made known only by a parade of people testifying to his kindness. In the terrible blizzard of '18 at Friona, he came through very well, and helped the other ranchers in the area by dividing his feed with them. One oldtimer said 'He (Roy) kept several from going under.'

"Go, as I did yesterday, to the baseball park and sit awhile. There stands a monument to his concern for the youth and willingness and liberality in providing for their needs. His name on the fence advertises only his great heart.

"Add to this such random testimony from individuals as 'he was the kindest man,' 'he helped many get started,' 'he helped lots of folks others didn't know about,' 'he was good to me.'

A 1910 original modeled by Nancy Long of Silverton was selected for first-place honors during a style show of authentic early-day fashions and copies during the annual Floyd County Pioneer Reunion in Floydada last Thursday. The revue of models was held on a platform south of the courthouse.

Peggy Jarrett and Judy Probasco placed second and third respectively in the group of 1910 fashions.

It was discovered that the 1970 mid-dress looked very much like a copy of some of the older fashions.

The dress worn by Miss Long in the revue belonged to the great-grandmother of Mrs. Marvin Montague, and is 60 years old. The umbrella she carried belongs to her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Eugene Long, and is 75 years old. Miss Long's black satin tie pumps were borrowed from Mrs. Carl Crow, and are 50 years old.

Miss Long, a student at Texas Technological University, is the granddaughter of A. E. Frizzell of Lockney, and is a descendant of Floyd County pioneer settlers.

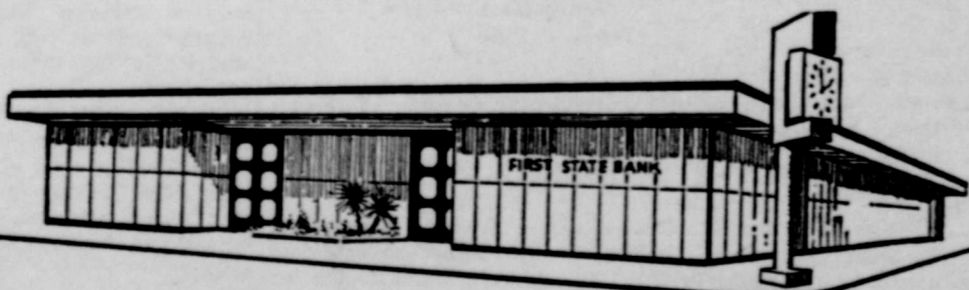

Silverton recently was a financial success, according to Alexander. It was a self-supporting tournament in that the judo club paid for all the trophies out of the proceeds, and the only donation requested was that of sandwiches for the concession stand.

Jay Long won second and Bill Strange won third in the senior division in their respective weight classes. Steve Brown placed fourth in his weight class.

"Even though no more of our boys won trophies, we can still be very proud of them," Alexander said. "A lot of them were in their first tournament and were competing against boys who have advanced to the top rankings, but they stayed in there and did a good job. A lot of the boys have had only 11 or 12 lessons."

Referees for the tournament were Dale Lehman of Odessa, a third degree black belt player who won second place in the heavy-weight division at the Nationals and was voted Judo All-American (one of five in the United States) for 1970, and Frank Fullerton of El Paso, a third degree black belt player who is a past president of the Texas Judo Black Belt Association. Tim Joe of Amarillo, a second degree black belt player, assisted with the operation of the tournament.

Men and boys participated in the matches from Odessa, Dallas, Fort Worth, El Paso, Amarillo, Abilene and Silverton.

"The number of black belts that we had here for our tournament was almost overwhelming," said Alexander, who himself has achieved the first degree black belt rank. "I've been to a lot of tournaments where there would be only three or four first and second degree black belts. We had a fourth degree black belt, two second degree and five first degree black belts as contestants in our tournament. It was quite an honor and made our tournament a
