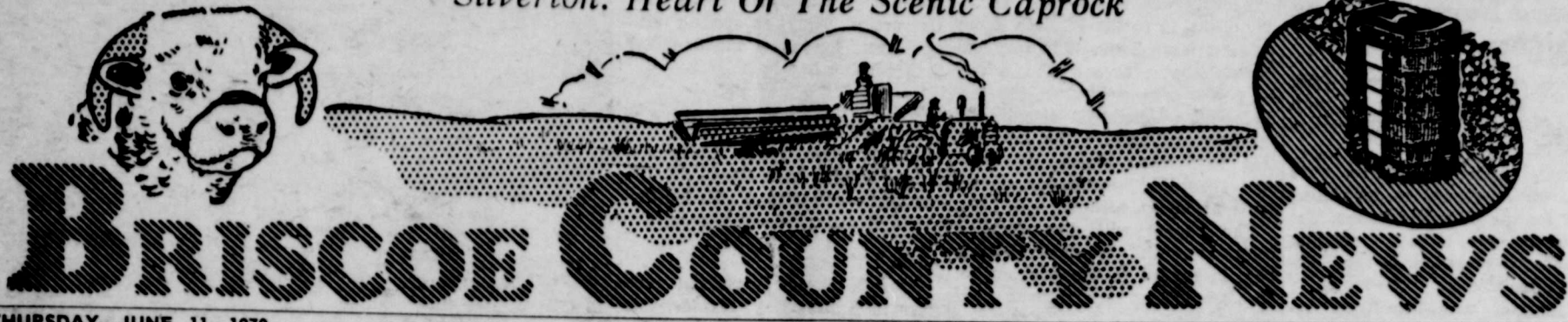
She says she has antiqued everything in her house except Fred, and I'm not so sure she isn't thinking about doing that! Better sleep with one eye open, Fred!

Ken Cook Named To Swisher County Post

Kenneth D. Cook, Briscoe County agricultural agent for the past three years, will take the reins of county agricultural agent for Swisher County August 1.

The joint announcement was made by the Swisher County Commissioners Court and Billy C. Gunter of Lubbock, district agricultural agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Cook will replace Chile Smith, who is resigning from the position on July 31. Smith plans to return to Texas A&M University to do graduate work toward a master's degree in agriculture.

Cook is a native of Seminole and received both a B.S. and M.S. degree in animal science from East Texas State University. He served as assistant county agricultural agent for Lubbock County for two years prior to coming to Briscoe County, and was a training assistant in Hale County for several months prior to his assignment in Lubbock County.

At East Texas State, Cook served on the Student Senate and was president of the Rodeo Association. He was also a member of the livestock-dairy judging team.

The newly-appointed agent was active in 4-H Club work and FFA in Gaines County during his youth. Cook is married to the former Miss Brenda Roberts of Throckmorton. She has been the teacher of home economics in Silverton High School for two years. The Cooks are parents of a daughter, Kendra.

Cook told the Briscoe County News early this week: "It is with regret that we will leave Silverton because we have enjoyed living here; this was, however, a job opportunity that I just couldn't pass up. Brenda plans at this time to teach here another year and will commute."

The manner in which the sirens and horns will be used to warn local residents to be on the alert in the event of storms was defined by the City Council this week.

When a tornado alert is issued for the Silverton area by the weather bureau, four or more blasts of the fire alarm system will be sounded. At the same time, the tornado warning air horn will be sounded at short intervals and the new warning devices will be operated on their siren sound. This warning should alert residents to watch the clouds and be prepared to move to a place of safety.

Citizens were asked to note that the fire alarm is sounded three times when there is a fire call, and one time for fire practice on Thursday nights.

If hooks, funnels or tornadoes are sighted which are considered by the weather bureau, department of public safety and/or private citizens to be potentially dangerous to the City of Silverton, the fire alarm, air horn and "yelpers" will be sounded simultaneously in a continuous blast. This will warn residents not only to watch the clouds but also to move to a place of safety. In a nutshell, if residents hear the "yelpers," they should go to the cellar.

No "all clear" signal was devised because no one on the City Council felt anyone should be responsible for making the decision as to when the danger had passed. Residents will be responsible themselves for making the decision to return to their homes.

WARNING SYSTEM TO BE TESTED HERE FRIDAY

Weather permitting the warning and take-over alert systems will be tested and demonstrated Friday afternoon. The warning (alerting citizens to watch the clouds and listen to weather reports) will be demonstrated at 2:30 p.m. The take-over warning will be demonstrated at 2:45 p.m.

If severe weather is present in the area, the system will not be demonstrated because the Council does not want to cause an unnecessary trip to the cellar if this can be avoided.
