Farmers Receive Early Program Payments

Farmers who have contributed to stabilizing markets for food and fiber and to the conservation of soil and water resources by taking part in the 1970 wheat, feed grain, and cotton programs are receiving their program payments earlier this year than ever before, according to Louie Kitchens, chairman of the Briscoe County ASC Committee.

The first payments were made

beginning July 1, 1970. Additional payments will continue to be made as rapidly as farmers certify program requirements and as fast as individual farm records can be processed and checks returned to ASCS county offices for distribution to farmers.

"Because of the excellent cooperation of farmers, about 10% of the participating producers in Briscoe County will receive their payments on or about July 7, 1970," Mr. Kitchens said.

Most payments should be completed by mid-August, if farmers who signed up will complete the necessary certification indicating that they have complied with all of the program provisions.

Farm program payments help maintain a balance between supply and demand, the chairman

explained. He pointed out that both farmers and consumers benefit from this balance.

"Agricultural productivity almost doubled in the past 20 years, but farmers' markets take only about a third of this increase. This means we need new markets.

Farm programs help us hold down farm production and maintain farm income until new markets are developed and old ones expanded.

Huge surpluses must be avoided. They are costly in tax dollars and are wasteful of food and fiber.

Farm programs help farmers make adjustments in their individual farming operations that in the long run will result in more farm income from the marketplace and less from the public treasury.

Since farmers are \$50-billion-a-year purchasers of goods and services produced in our cities and rural towns, the workers and business firms in cities and towns benefit from farm programs, too. Farm programs also make important contributions to conservation of natural resources and help fight pollution. Acres that are diverted out of crop production under farm programs are put to

The camp is sponsored annually by Southwestern Public Service Company, according to Billy C. Gunter and Mrs. Aubrey W. Russell, district agents with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which conducts the 4-H Club Program.

Company representatives will give instructions on electric safety, artificial resuscitation, power plants and lighting. Instructional material presented at these group sessions will be aimed toward developing method demonstrations on electricity and its use.

Organized recreation is scheduled throughout the week and a vesper service will conclude each day's activities.

This year the planning committee for the electric camp includes the 4-H Councils from Swisher, Briscoe, Hale and Floyd counties. Debbie Terrell of Hale County is serving as committee chairman.

Traffic Accident Toll Predicted For Holiday

Past experience and the present trend of traffic deaths indicate that 46 persons will lose their lives in traffic accidents during the 78-hour period of the July 4 weekend, according to an announcement by Major C. W. Bell of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Major Bell stated that "Operation Motorcade," a special emphasis program designed to focus attention on the added dangers of holiday travel, will be placed in effect from 6:00 p.m. Thursday, July 2, to midnight Sunday, July 5. All deaths resulting from traffic accidents will be tabulated by the Texas Department of Public Safety throughout the period, and the totals will be announced daily as a means of keeping safety foremost in the minds of the motoring public.

"It is a known fact that July 4 traffic is more hazardous due to crowded conditions on the highways. Add driver misbehavior, misjudgment, negligence, and the drinking of intoxicating beverages while driving, and the result can be compared with a giant exploding fire cracker," Bell said.

"In an all out effort to keep this estimated toll down, the Texas Department of Public Safety will utilize additional personnel from its other services to augment the Highway Patrol force during the holiday period," Bell added. "However, the most important effort in reducing traffic accidents must come from the individual drivers," Major Bell concluded.

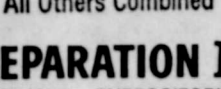
