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

What do you know about echoes? An echo is a sound that bounces back-a sound that is reflected back. Probably you have heard your voice echo down a corridor or across a valley. The echo occurred when the sound waves of your voice struck a hard surface and bounced back off it. To make an echo, sound

waves must hit a hard, fairly smooth surface at the correct angle. (If they hit a rough surface, the sound waves break up. Either there is no echo at all or the sound is completely changed.) Timing and distance must also be right. If the sound returns too quickly, it becomes mixed with sound waves still being sent out.



Do you know why the right and left sides of a ship are called port and starboard?

Ancient ships had their rudders, or steering boards, on the right side of the stern of the ship. This gave rise to the Anglo-Saxon word steor-bord, or "steer side." When ships came into port to load and unload, they were tied up with their left sides closest to the dock to prevent damage to the rudder. Thus the left side

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
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



means the watermelon is overripe or old. Once in a while you may notice a hard, white streak running lengthwise through the flesh -this condition is known as a "white heart." If you see this, pick another melon. Seeds, too,

are a good clue to ripeness. Usually they're dark brown or black intact. in a fully mature watermelon. When buying a whole watermelon, the surest way to deter-

mine its ripeness is the traditional method of cutting a "plug" out so you can see the flesh and test the taste. Of course, this is not

always practical. Even from the outside, there are some indications of the ripeness within. Ripe melons, for instance, have symmetrical shape and a velvety bloom-a dull rather than shiny surface. Also, the underside of a ripe melon is apt to be running from white or pale green to a
