

REVIEWING LAST WEEK

A good crowd was on hand for the game at Groom even though the weather was very disagreeable due to the low temperature and high wind.

The Owls ran 84 plays (with every play written down in black and white, it is still unbelievable when counting-up time comes)will go to the Rodeo Arena Fund. plays as the Owls ran in their games last year. We thought this might have been a freakish "happen-so" at first, but now we learn that this is something that Coach Bill Stovall has been working to achieve through his team. Groom ran 75 plays and got only six first downs, the first of which wasn't recorded until the second quarter after Silverton's second touchdown. (This doesn't make the first half sound so close, does it?) The Owls made 22 first downs.

Three players shared the scoring honors, with Bill Strange getting three touchdowns, David Holt carrying a touchdown and a twopoint conversion, and Dana Martin adding a score. Strange gained about 200 yards rushing, while Holt had over 100, Thomas Self had 50+ and Martin rushed for 20+ yards. Strange appears to be picking up speed on offense as the season goes along, and now owns a high school career scoring record of 150 points.

Other career scoring totals for the Owl backs are: Marvin Self, 42 points; David Holt, 26; Roger Younger and Thomas Self, 18 points each; Dana Martin, 12, and Alvin May, 6 points.



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

The above title is one of the foundation rocks of modern sectarianism. It is a very pleasing doctrine to people and preachers that do not want to work diligently for the Lord. If a person cannot so sin as to be lost then Jesus wasted words in Revelation 2:10, "Fear none of those things which thou shalt suffer; behold the devil shall cast some of you into pr son that ye shall have tribulation ten days: BE THOU FAITHFU UNTO DEATH, AND I WILL GIVE THEE A CROWN OF LIFE" The crown of life is given if one is faithful unto death. Let us further notice what John has to say about the subject of not falling. "My little children, these things I write unto you, THAT YE SIN NOT. And if any sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous."

(I John 2:1) Notice what a child of God is to do if they sin, "IF WE CONFESS OUR SINS, He is faithful and just to FORGIVE US OUR SINS, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."
