

Dr. Kay then traveled to Thailand, and he showed pictures of the Thai people and their way of life. A picture was shown of a base where there is a soldier guarding planes 24 hours a day. At Okinawa, second logistical command, the tour was hosted by the Japanese defense society.

A slide was shown of the Bridge of No Return over which the Pueblo crew crossed following their release from prison camp.

The point was made that one reason Americans are having so much trouble at home now is the lack of support from the American people. A real sense of patriotism needs to be instilled in children.





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
