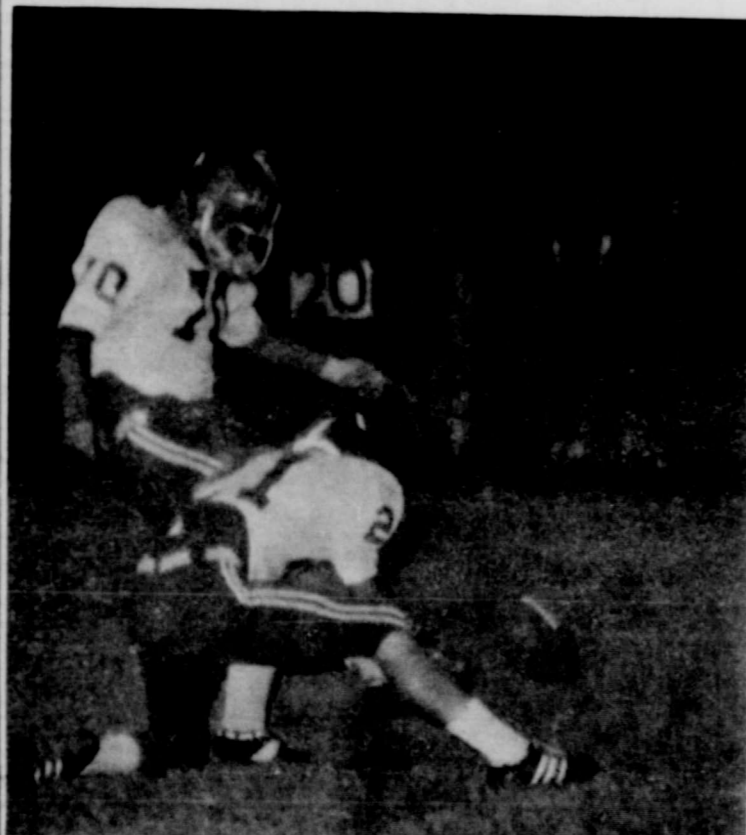

Silverton's Owls are tied with Clarendon this week for first place in the District 2-A football race. The four-way tie was narrowed last Friday night when Clarendon beat McLean and the Owls defeated Wheeler.

Should Clarendon and Silverton both win Friday night, they will be co-champions. Should Clarendon lose and Silverton win, the Owls would claim the crown; any other combination of situations will likely either give the Bronchos the championship or throw the whole thing back into a multi-team tie.

Clarendon and Silverton own identical 3-1 district records; McLean, Wheeler and Claude have 2-2 district records. Memphis is 0-4 in district play.

The Owls handed the Wheeler Mustangs a 16-13 defeat here Friday night in the most courageous show of will-power and determination that the Silverton team has ever put on. An earthy description would be to say: the boys won it on guts alone.

Marvin Self was a hero of the game. His kickoffs and punts have been outstanding this year, and accounts of the games in the newspapers in the towns of the Owl opponents have sung his praise all season. Last Friday night his 35-yard field goal won the game with nine seconds remaining on the clock. If that weren't enough, he rushed through the line to throw the Wheeler quarterback for a loss on the last play of the game when the passer was winding up to throw "the bomb."

The Mustangs kicked off to the Owls to open the game, but after making two first downs, the Owls stalled out on the Wheeler side of the midfield stripe, and the ball went over. The Owls got an offside penalty, the Mustangs made a first down; the Owls got another offside penalty, and the Mustangs got another first down. After allowing Wheeler to gain to about their six-yard line, the Owls almost recovered a Mustang fumble. Wheeler made three yards next down, and were thrown for an eight-yard loss on their next play. On fourth down, Wheeler threw a touchdown pass that went right through the hands of the receiver in the endzone, and the ball went over to the Owls on their own 11.

On the first play from scrimmage, David Holt ran all the way—89 yards—for a Silverton score and Marvin Self kicked the extra point with 4:44 remaining to be played in the first quarter.

Following the score, Silverton kicked off to Wheeler, and allowed the Mustangs eight or nine yards before Marvin Self recovered a Wheeler fumble.

This time, the Owls went straight for the goal, making four first downs enroute. On the third play of the second quarter Bill Strange carried the touchdown from two yards out. Marvin Self's kick was no good, and the Owls held a 13-0 lead.

The Owls and Mustangs exchanged punts, then it appeared the Mustangs had mounted a scoring offensive. They made three first downs, to the Owl-35, before the Silverton defense rose to the occasion. After a one-yard gain and an incomplete pass, Marvin Self set the ball carrier for a two-yard loss. The ball went over on downs on the Silverton-35 after outstanding defense by Roger Younger, Strange and other Owls.

Silverton came back to make a

first down on a run by Strange to Wheeler's 40. Holt carried twice, the Owls got a 15-yard penalty and Strange carried back to the Mustang-49. After an incomplete pass, Marvin Self dropped back to punt, got away a nice one, but was smeared on the play. The Owls retained possession on the 15-yard penalty that followed, and next play Strange carried to the Wheeler-15. Strange picked up three next down, and Silverton

 Silverton's Junior High Owls finished out their football season as undefeated champions of District 2-A with a 24-20 non-conference win over Matador here last Thursday night.

The Junior Matadors were a tough opponent, as predicted, having defeated Turkey Junior High the week before last 28-6 at Turkey. The Junior Owls played Turkey to a 0-0 tie and then defeated them 8-0 in their first two games

of the season, and this comparison of scores indicates that Matador has a good little team and that the Owls improved as the season went along.

The game didn't really seem so close to fans, who watched as two Scott Hutsell touchdowns were called back during the second quarter. If it had not been for infractions on these plays, the Junior Owls would have probably won by a bigger margin.

Matador shocked the Junior Owls by running the opening kickoff back 85 yards for a touchdown. Their extra point try failed, and the Owls trailed 0-6.

Carl Gallington carried the first score for the Owls, but Quarterback Ken Wood failed on his try for two extra points. The score

Both were beautiful long runs. The Owls came back in the third quarter with a 50-yard scoring run by Scott Hutsell. Gallington failed on the PAT try, and again the score was tied, this time at 12-12.

Matador ran a 40-yard touchdown and made their extra points count, to lead by 12-20.

Gallington scored another touchdown before the end of the third period, but Hutsell failed on the extra point run and the Owls still trailed 18-20.

In the fourth quarter, Harland Vaughn recovered a Matador fumble on the Matador-15, and Scott Hutsell carried the touchdown. Wood failed on the PAT run and the Owls had their winning 24-20 margin.

The Junior Owls closed out the season with a record of 194 points scored, having allowed 82 points by their opponents. Scott Hutsell has led the offensive for the Junior Owls by scoring 68 points; Gallington has scored 60; Wood, 18; David Seif, 42; and Russ Hubbard, 6.

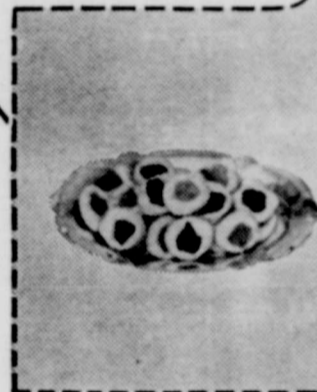

 baking powder 2 eggs, beaten  
 2 tablespoons sugar 2 jellies  
 Preserves or jelly

Sift together dry ingredients. Beat butter and cream cheese until fluffy. Add beaten eggs and beat well. Blend into sifted dry ingredients. Chill dough one hour. On lightly floured board, roll dough ¼ inch thick. Cut individual rounds with floured biscuit cutter. Make an impression in center of each round with thumb. Fill imprint with preserves or jelly (about 1 teaspoon). Bake on an ungreased baking sheet in moderate gas oven (375 degrees) for 15 minutes or until delicately browned. Serve warm. Makes about 24.

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# FOUR FACES

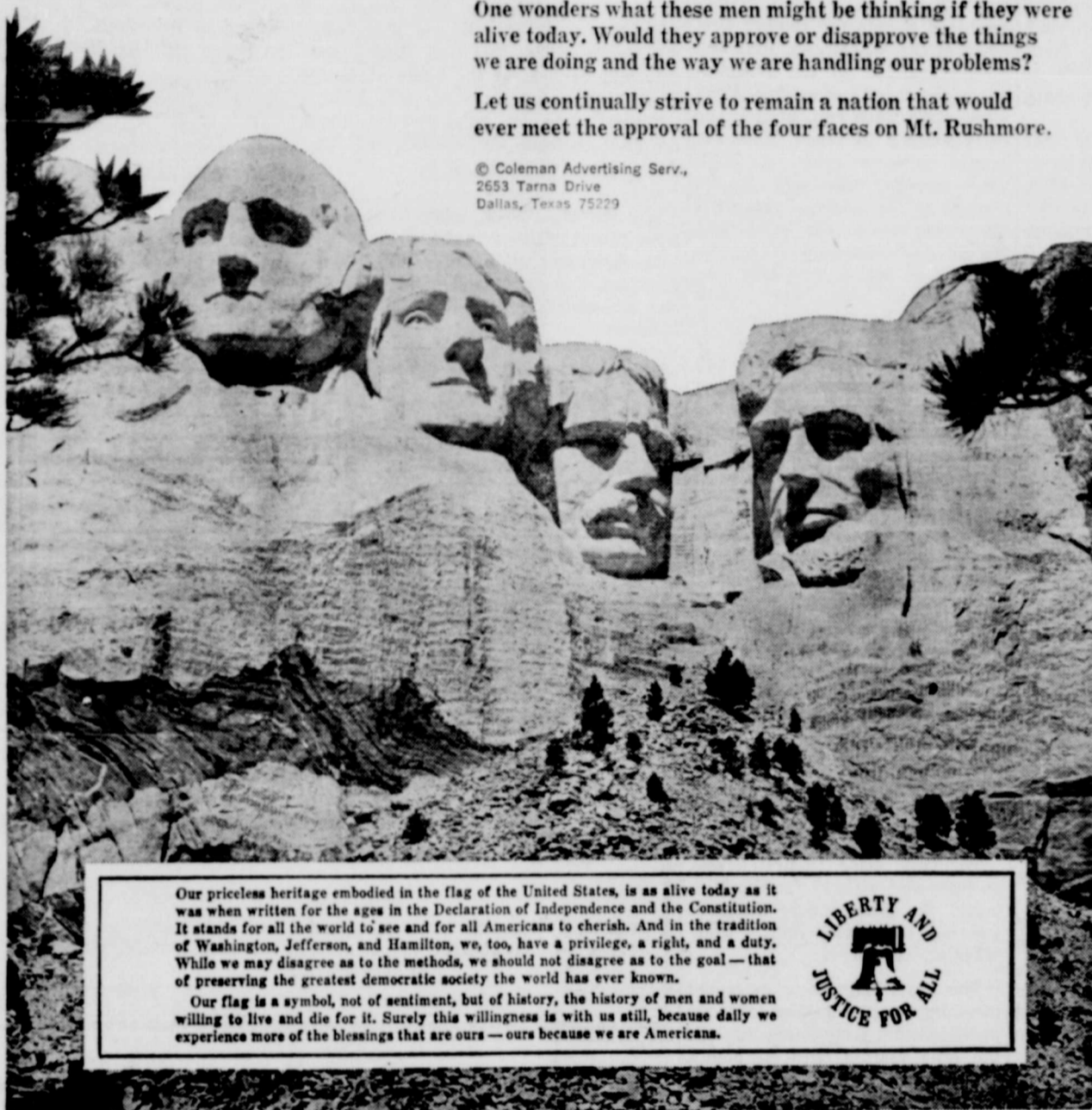

a run by Roy Don Chick. Dale Stevens kicked the extra point, and the Owl lead was slimmed to 13-7.

Taking the after-touchdown kick at their own 32, the Owls marched down to the Wheeler-24 before running into trouble and getting a 5-yard penalty. Quarterback Martin went back for a pass next play and was dropped at the Wheeler-47, but Martin and Strange gained back to the Mustang-35 where on fourth down the Owls fumbled and Wheeler recovered.

That was the first play of the fourth period, and the Mustangs drove straight to the goal line. Chick carried the score from three yards out. With Alvin May, Strange, the Self boys and other Owls ready to charge in on them, the Wheeler center gave a bad snap which was fumbled by the place-kick holder, and the kicker wasn't able to get the kick off. The score remained tied at 13-13.

Fans became alarmed when seconds kept ticking by and still the player had not been revived. He was carried to the dressing room and was examined by a Plainview physician, who was present at the game, and was then taken to the Tulia hospital by ambulance for further examination. Doctors advised the boy not to participate in the game this week.

The Owls made 18 first downs, as compared with 17 for the Mustangs. On penetrations, Silverton was out front with four, while Wheeler had three.

The Owls have now outscored their opponents 193 points to 98 points. Strange continues to lead the area scoring with 80 points. Holt has scored 38 points; Marvin Self, 15; Younger, 12; Dana Martin, 24; Thomas Self, 18; and May, 6.

Tomorrow night the Owls will host the Claude Mustangs in the last game of the season. The Owls can be the champs if they take this win. **Baggary Is Guest Speaker For Junior Club**

H. M. Baggary, editor and publisher of The Tulia Herald, was guest speaker for the Americanism Day meeting of L. O. A. Junior Study Club at 7:30 p.m. Monday, November 9, in the fellowship hall of the United Methodist Church.

Mr. Baggary pointed out to those assembled that patriotism is not merely revering the flag, which is a symbol of the United States, but involves caring for and protecting the government itself. He added that in his opinion it was far less unpatriotic to use an old, worn out flag as a window washing cloth than it was not to take an interest in government and supporting candidates for office and voting in elections.

The welcome was given by Mrs. Fred Edwards, and the devotional prayer, "Our Beloved Country," was given by Mrs. Bud Couch.

The Federation news, which spotlighted the observance of Veterans Day, November 11, was given by Mrs. Randall Eddleman, who also called attention to the "West Texas Prisoner of War Week," November 9-15. To add emphasis to this report, she presented Mrs. J. W. Reid, jr., whose nephew is among those Americans who are missing in action.

Members were encouraged to support the POW-MIA Week by writing personal letters to the North Vietnamese delegation at the Paris peace talks. The guest speaker, Mr. Baggary, also added his comments and explained some of the differences in attitudes toward prisoners of war of the American and Asian peoples.

All of the letters are to be sent to P. O. Box 100,000, Lubbock, Texas, where they will be placed in parcels to be sent (in the envelope you mailed it in). It is very important that each person writing a letter follow these instructions, and that they not mention any specific prisoner or aircraft and include nothing in the envelope except a letter begging for humane treatment of the prisoners. You do not have to write the sample letter word for word,

but try to convey this message: Mr. Xuan Thuy  
 Delegation of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam  
 Paris, France  
 Dear Sir:

The purpose of this letter is to express concern for the American servicemen listed as prisoners of war and those missing in action in Southeast Asia.

Please do not be misled into thinking that the American people do not care about the plight of these men. We do care and are appealing to you to honor the basic code of humane decency and release these men immediately.

Sincerely,  
 and sign your own name.

By taking part in the special week, members can be active humanitarians. All the families of the POWs and MIAs are asking is that the North Vietnamese:

1. Publish the names and physical conditions of all POWs they now hold;
2. Furnish proper medical care and adequate food for all prisoners;
3. Release the seriously ill and wounded POWs;
4. Submit to regular and impartial inspection of POW facilities by international humanitarian organizations;
5. Allow a free flow of mail between prisoners and their families and the receipt of packages;
6. Cease the public abuse and degradation heaped on American POWs being used for political propaganda.

"I Am The Nation," a patriotic reading, was given by Mrs. Charles Sarchet with appropriate background music played by Mrs. Marvin Montague at the piano. This was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Mrs. Couch, hostess, served red, white and blue thumb print cookies, Cokes and coffee from a table covered with a white linen cloth with lace edging. Her centerpiece was an arrangement of miniature American flags. Napkins were also decorated with the national colors.

"COME UNTO ME . . . AND I WILL GIVE YOU REST"

The supreme gift of heaven stands in front of man with arms ever open saying, "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). Why? There must be a reason for this being expressed by the Son of God; and, there is. The reason is that man stands before God in a L-O-S-T state because of his sin. "There is none righteous, no, not one" (Romans 3:10). "For all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). It is a tragic thing to think of one being physically lost and unable to find his way back to safety but it is even sadder when one is spiritually lost and DOESN'T KNOW THE WAY TO SAFETY !!! Sin separates us from the fact of God (Isaiah 59:1-2) and every man needs to be reconciled to Him. This is the reason Jesus came to this earth; to seek and save man from his lost condition (Luke 19:10). He is the way to God (John 14:6).

In Ephesians 2, Paul tells us that before Christ made us alive we were DEAD in our trespasses and were walking according to the course of this world. And John exhorts us by telling us that we are not to love this world or the things in it (1 John 2:15-17). Then in Romans the 7th chapter Paul shows us the man who is controlled by sin. He tries to do the things that are right but ends up doing that which is wrong and when he does that which is wrong he knows within himself that he shouldn't be doing that very thing he states, "So now it is no more I that do it, but sin which dwelleth in me . . ." (v. 17). This continues until he cries "WRETCHED MAN THAT I AM! Who shall deliver me out of the body of this death?" (Romans 7:24). Sin brought death and Paul wanted deliverance. Deliverance so bad that he considered that dead state that he was in a WRETCHED state !!! But where is the answer to his question, "Who shall deliver me?" Is there anyone able to do so? Emphatically YES !!! Verse 25, "I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord." There is the answer, Jesus Christ. He is the Saviour of His people, (Matthew 1:21). He came to save sinners (1 Timothy 1:15). That's beautiful, and you know why? Because that's us . . . you and me ! Remember our reference earlier to Romans 3:10,23. No one says that he does not sin because ALL sin. John says that we cannot say that we do not sin or that we have not sinned, read 1 John 1:8-10.

But, as Paul continues in Ephesians 2 he tells that Christ saved both Jew and Gentile by his death on the cross. The middle wall of partition has been broken down and one new man has been created in Christ Jesus (Galatians 3:26-29). Paul ends with this lovely thought, "so then ye are no more strangers and sojourners, but ye are fellow-citizens with the saints and of the household of God" (Ephesians 2:19). Then he proceeds to tell us that we are all of one building.

But Paul also answers himself in the context of the same book of Romans when he says, "There is therefore now no condemnation to them that are IN Christ Jesus." No wretched condition, no condemnation, no lost state, but ALIVE; yes, alive in Christ Jesus! For when we begin the new life in Christ Jesus we rise to walk in a newness of life or a new state of life (Romans 6:1-6; 2 Corinthians 5:17).

QUESTION? Are you in a lost, wretched, condemned state? The Bible says, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). Won't you render obedience lest you be found lost? Think about it, the wages of eternity are too high a price to pay for your soul.

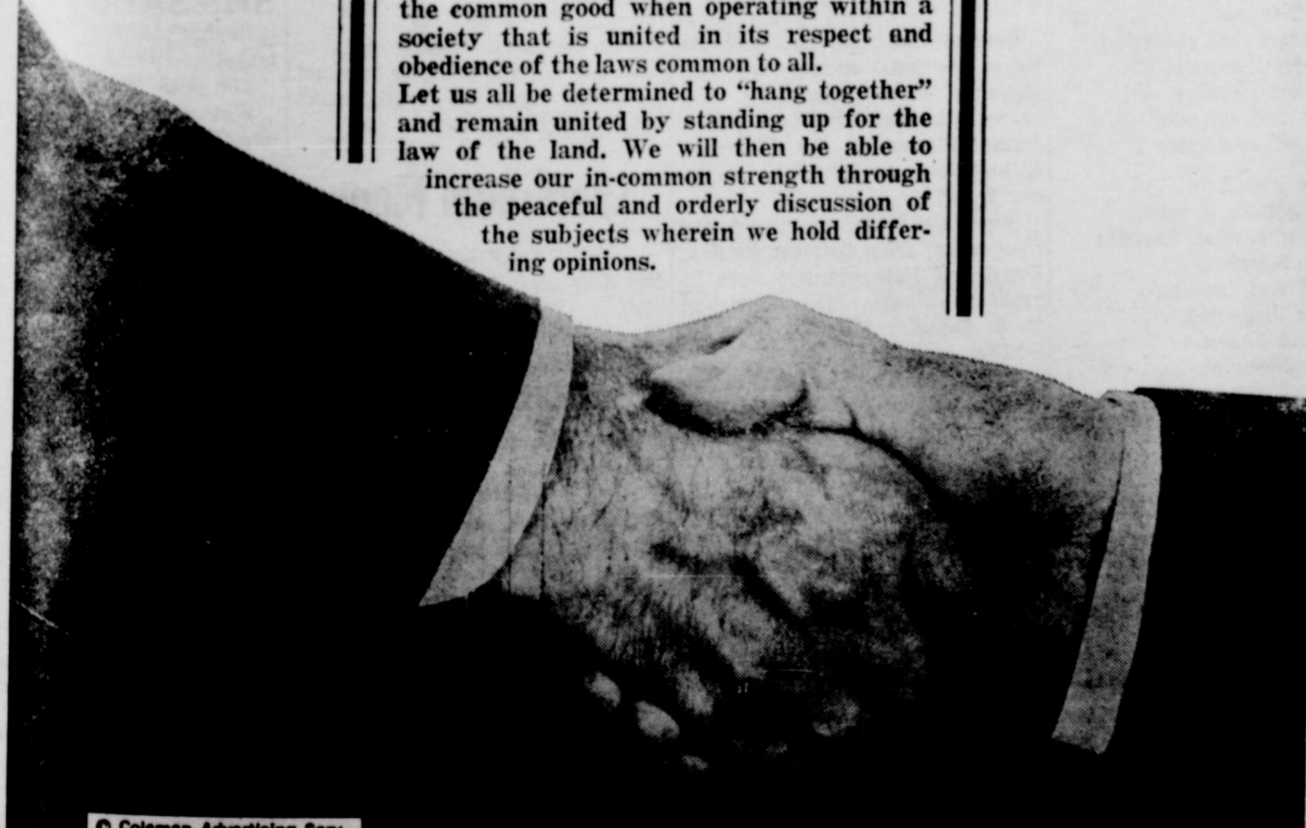

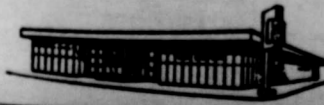

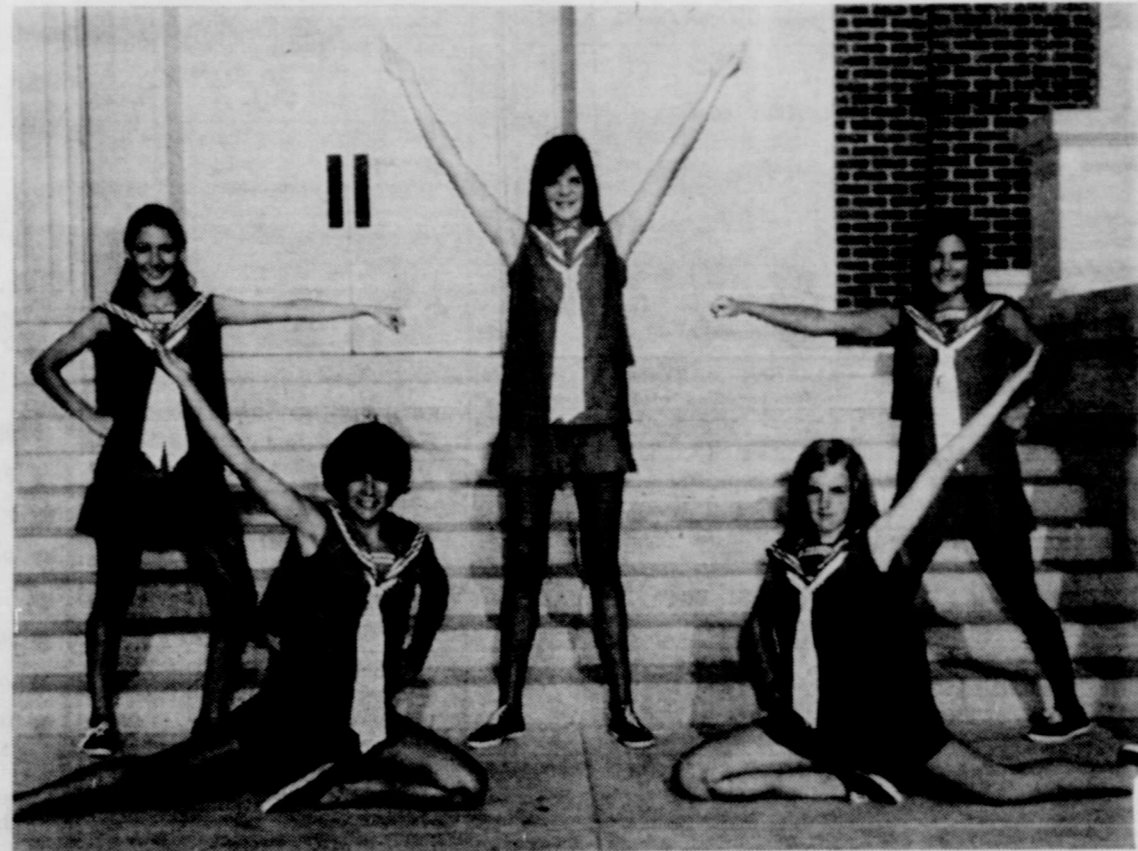
