

These drawings showed Whalin. An example of where each stadium light had to be aimed to achieve the maximum amount of light for every part of the football field. Now that we were re-lamping all the light poles (not just the new ones), someone had to tell the electrician where to aim the new light

Sam was on the field the football stadium, and over. He did this for marking the spots as the electrician in the bucket truck at the top of the light pole aimed the lights on that exact spot.
