





FOR LICE IN THE FALL by Jackie D. Johnson Briscoe County Agricultural Agent Tarmers and ranchers should spray their cattle for lice in the fall instead of waiting until the cattle are noticeably infected. Treating cattle for lice now is effective because of mild weather, shorter hair on cattle, and the lice population is small. The low popu- lation found now is the source of this winter's population. Louse control should not be put off until cattle are infested. By winter the cattle have suffered population of the heavy population of lice is more difficult to control than a light one. Here are some pointers for effective lice control. Make thorough applications. If one animal, even a part of an animal, is not treated, the lice could be a source of reinfestation for the herd. Dipping is the most thorough way to treat cattle, but sprays are effective if applied with special attention to the brisket and flanks. The entire body should be wet to a coarse stream is best for pene- tration the hair. All hunters should become fa- miliar with the ten command- ments of safety before starting on the first hunt and make sure they are observed while in the field. The commandments are: treat every gun with respect due a load- ed gun. This is the cardinal rule of gun safety. Always be sure that the barrel and action are clear of obstruc- tions. Carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muz- ite, even if you should stumble. Keep the safety on until you are ready to fire. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger. Never point a gun at anything you do not intend to shoot. Place in oblong pan. In butter left in pan add ½ cup red wine, ½ can tomato paste (3 oz.), 2 cups water, 1 tablespoon celery flakes, 2 cloves garlic. Bring to boil. Pour over chicken. Sprinkle about 2½ teaspoons oregano over chicken. Bake covered for one hour at 350 degrees; uncover last 10 minutes for browning.

Meat and Rice Dressing

Saute 2 onions, chopped, in $\frac{1}{2}$ stick butter, add 1 cup uncooked rice; saute together until golden. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. ground round and brown. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon comino, pepper to taste, $2\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons salt, add $\frac{1}{3}$ cup sliced mushrooms. $2\frac{1}{2}$ cups water and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup red wine. Cook until done about 20 minutes. When cooked toss in toasted pecans and almonds, if desired. Serve sauce from chicken over all.
