C. C. Garrison Buried In Plainview Monday

C. C. Garrison, a former Briscoe County Sheriff and pioneer resident of the area, was buried in Plainview Memorial Park Monday afternoon.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Monday in the First Baptist Church in Plainview, with the pastor, Rev. Carlos McLeod officiating, assisted by Dr. Roy McClung, president of Wayland Baptist College.

Mr. Garrison died about 5:00 a.m. Sunday in a Plainview convalescent home. He had been ill for several years.

Born May 8, 1883, in Jack County, Texas, Charles Claburn Garrison moved to Motley County in 1886. He worked on the Matador Ranch shortly after coming to the South Plains.

He and the former Dollie Keltz were married January 29, 1913 at White Flat and moved to Silverton in 1917. He was sheriff here from 1922 until 1930, and also served on the school board here for more than 20 years.

He moved to Plainview from Silverton in 1956.

Mr. Garrison, whose home was at 1315 Lexington in Plainview, was in the wholesale oil business and held farming interests.

He was a life member of the Masonic Lodge in Silverton and had served the First Baptist Churches in both Silverton and Plainview as a deacon.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Jim Pipkin of Wichita Falls, and Mrs. Carl Bruce of Lubbock; four sons, C. B. Garrison of Amarillo, Keltz and Fred Garrison, both of Plainview, and Coleman Garrison of Silverton; one brother, Gabe Garrison of Silverton; two sisters, Mrs. Lillie Seay and Mrs. Lena Fisher, both of Matador; 12 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Serving as pallbearers were three grandsons, Ray, Chipper and Garner Garrison, and three nephews, Don and C. D. Garrison and Ben Keltz.

Mr. and Mrs. Stovall and their children, Leisa, Greg and Lance, moved to Silverton from Coleman in August 1969. After posting a 2-8 season record last year, Coach Stovall's Owl football team won seven games and lost three this season to tie for the District 2-A championship and win the first football trophy that Silverton High has had in more than 20 years.

This earned for the Silverton Owls Honorable Mention as "the Most Surprising Team" of 1970, as selected by the Amarillo Daily News.

Silverton Halfback Bill Strange, who rushed for 1,391 yards and scored 88 points this season, headed the Honorable Mention list for "Back of the Year" honors. His teammate and another of the Owl Tri-captains, Alvin May, was an Honorable Mention for "Lineman of the Year." Both players were described as "vital cogs in the Owls' unexpected drive to a share of the 2-A title under Bill Stovall."

Cotton Harvest Continuing In Area

Cotton harvest in the Memphis territory moved along favorably this past week according to W. E. Cain at the USDA, C&MS Cotton Classing Office in Memphis.

"Ideal harvesting weather has prevailed and by working seven days a week, we have been able to class as much as we have received this week," Cain said.

We are about five classing days behind at present. The Memphis office classed 20,900 samples this week to bring the season total to 59,800.

Grades remained about the same this week. Light spots accounted for 78 percent of the grades. Middling Light Spotted was 42 percent and SLM Light Spot accounted for 34 percent of the samples classed.

Staples classed showed 6 percent 29/32, 61 percent 15/16, and 30 percent 31/32.

Micronaire readings this week showed 81 percent in the 3.5 to 4.9 range and 16 percent miked 3.4 and below.

Pressley readings are good at 85 percent read in the 80,000 to 99,000 psi range.

Markets for Greenbelt cotton gained another 10 to 75 points this week. The market is active and demand is strong. Offerings increased as farmers complete harvest. The most active qualities traded this week and average prices received by the farmers were Mid Lt Sp 15/16, 20.10 and SLM Lt Sp 15/16, 19.75.

Average price paid for cottonseed at the gin was \$59.00 per ton.

Gamble Receives Army Commendation Medal For Valor In Vietnam Action

Specialist Four Timothy R. Gamble, of the United States Army Troop D, First Squadron (Airmobile), Ninth Cavalry, was awarded the Army Commendation Medal with "V" Device recently by direction of the Secretary of the Army.

Sp.4 Gamble is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gamble of Silverton.

The award was made "for heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam. Specialist Four Gamble distinguished himself by valorous action on July 18, 1970. Disregarding his own safety, he courageously exposed himself to the dangers inherent in the combat environment as he directed his efforts toward neutralizing the enemy threat. His heroic and valiant actions were characterized by a great concern for the welfare of his comrades and contributed materially to the successful accomplishment of the United States mission in the Republic of Vietnam. His loyalty, diligence and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service, and reflects great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army."

Six Accidents Investigated In Briscoe County During November

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of November, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in an estimated property damage of \$3,200.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1970 shows a total of 39 accidents resulting in no one killed, 14 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$43,820.00.

Traffic-wise, the month of December has proven to be the most destructive month to the life of mankind—"Death by a Motor Vehicle." In order to help reduce the traffic accidents and make this a happy holiday season, the patrol supervisor lists some safe-driving rules:

Farmers Union Has Regular Meeting

Silverton Local, Texas Farmers Union, met in regular session on Tuesday, December 8, 1970, at 7:30 p.m. in the community room of the P. C. A. building.

Harold Edwards presided and called the meeting to order for the reading of the minutes by Mrs. Albert Mallow.

Highlights of the recent state convention held December 3-5 in Amarillo were cited by Briscoe County President Fred Mercer; Silverton Local President Harold Edwards; and Delegate Mrs. Beryl Long. Mrs. Mallow reported on the Farmers Union Insurance Agent's meeting.

As policies and results of the state convention, the targets for cotton, wheat and feed grain are as follows:

Loan levels of \$1.50 bushel for wheat; \$1.80 cwt. for grain sorghum; and \$1.05 bushel corn as well as P. S. payments equalling full parity on the entire allotment and bases.

ASCS yields should reflect average weather conditions and the producers' potential.

Secretary of Agriculture should allow only non-price supported crops for harvest on set-aside acreage.

We recommend diversion at sign-up periods should be set at the latest date possible. Tenant protection should be rigidly enforced.

Secretary of Agriculture should use the disaster conditions provision in the law to the maximum extent necessary to assure retention of allotment and base history when not planted.

Any normal skip-row pattern should qualify as set-aside or diverted acreage.

Allotment reduction for non-planting should not exceed the percent actually underplanted.

Set-aside acreage without payment should be set at the minimum.

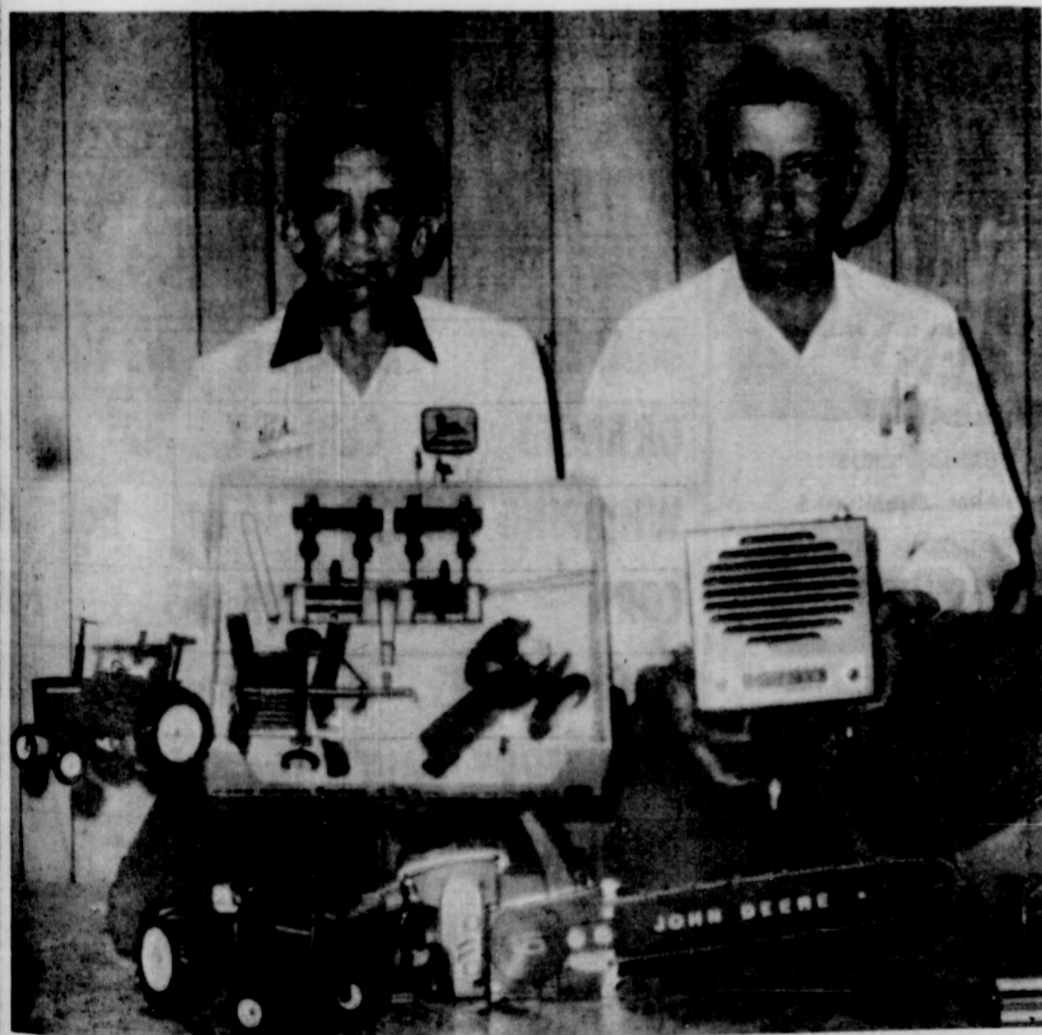

Sprinkle grated cheese on top of mixture and bake in a large baking dish for 30 minutes in a hot, gas oven (400 degrees). Serves 10 to 12.
