IMPORTANT MAIL COMING YOUR WAY IF YOU OWN A MOTOR VEHICLE

If you own one or more of the more than seven million motor vehicles in Texas, there is some important mail coming your way early in January.

It is your registration renewal application.

This is the second year of operation for the new, easy computerized registration procedure devised by the Texas Highway Department.

Last year, the system greatly reduced bothersome waits and long lines which plagued vehicle owners at county tax offices and substations in years past.

Prospects are that the system will work even better this year.

Also, it is not necessary to pre-

sent last year's registration receipt or the certificate of title. The renewal application you will receive in the mail is all you will need.

Registration begins February 1 and continues through April 1.

The renewal application will arrive in the mail in a slender envelope marked "Important—This is Your License Plate Renewal Application."

The application is a three-part form with instructions printed on it. One important thing to remember is THE CARD SHOULD NOT BE TORN APART.

After the registration period begins February 1, each vehicle owner can take the renewal application and the fee to his county tax office, or he can order his plates by mail.

If the owner wishes to register his vehicle by mail, he should send the entire three-part renewal application, the fee and an additional \$1 to the local county tax office as early as January with the understanding that his license plates may not be mailed until February 1.

The additional \$1 charge covers

cost of handling and postage.

If owners are to receive their plates by mail before the April 1 deadline, then they must send the renewal form, fee and \$ for each vehicle to be registered to the local county tax office by March 1. This allows 30 days for delivery of the plates before the April 1 registration deadline.

If the owner decides to go to the county tax office or substation, he will find shorter waiting lines.

All he needs to take with him is the renewal application and the fee. He will then receive his new plates and part of the form as his receipt.

Another part of the form is retained by the county and the third is sent to the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

However the owner may decide to register his vehicle, by mail or in person, use of the renewal form will be more convenient and time-saving.

The current registration system is the product of much work and planning. The system began to take shape in 1967 with the installation of the first computer equipment by the Motor Vehicle Division of the Highway Department.

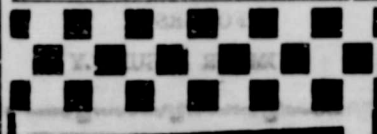

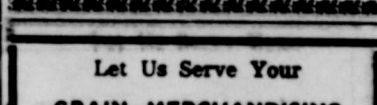

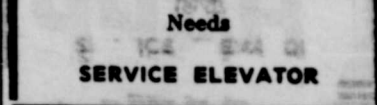

TREMENDOUS TRIFLES
 THE SINGLE VOTE THAT CHANGED THE WORLD'S HISTORY

Europe might have become part of the Persian empire and the course of history been completely changed had not the Greeks defeated the Persians at the famous battle of Marathon. Before the battle, the Greeks were undecided whether or not to resist, and a single vote decided the issue!

In 490 B.C. the Persian empire was vast and powerful. For years it had been expanding, gobbling up its neighbors one by one in the manner in which Adolf Hitler was so successful. Darius, the Persian king, ruled vast territories in Asia and Africa. In Europe and the Near East, Babylonia, Assyria, Asia Minor, the Aegean Islands, Thrace and Macedonia had fallen to the Persians. Greece, tiny in area and apparently weak in strength compared to the vast extent of Persian power, was next on the list.

One hundred thousand Persians, with vast stores of supplies and military equipment, had marched into Greece and assembled on the plain of Marathon, ready to crush all before them like a steamroller. On the hills above the plain, the Greek army, pitifully weak, was camped. The Greeks numbered only eleven thousand: ten thousand Athenians and one thousand of their allies, the Plataeans. Sparta had promised aid, but as yet it had not appeared. The Persians were guided by a deposed Athenian tyrant who had gone over to the enemy.

Eleven thousand against one hundred thousand! The odds seemed impossible, and many a Greek, no matter how patriotic, might well doubt the outcome of such an engagement. When the issue of battle was put to the vote of the ten commanders of the ten Athenian tribes, they were equally divided as to whether or not they should resist the Persians. Callimachus, the war leader, was called upon. He voted to fight, and thereby changed the history of the world!

The decision made, the Greeks did not wait for the Persians to attack. They charged the Persian ranks. The unbelievable result of that day was the complete defeat of the Persians! One vote saved Greece and Europe from Persian domination!

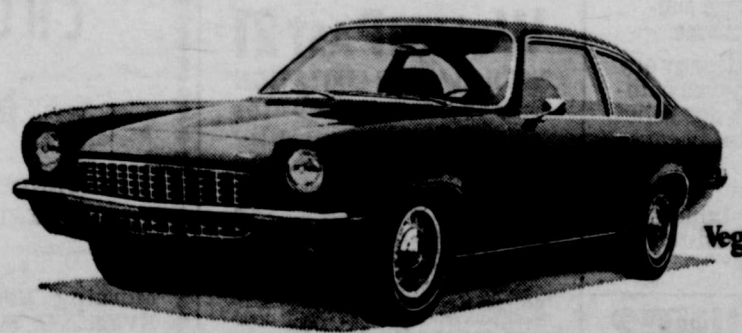

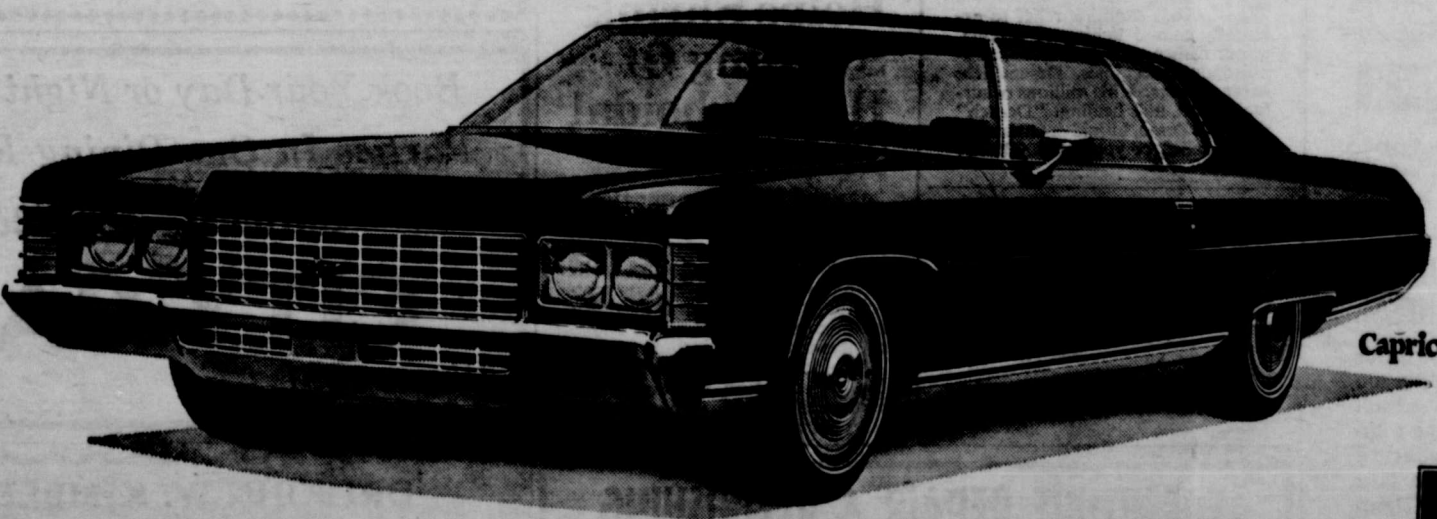

6. That the Word is to be defended publicly and privately, I Peter 3:15; Jude verse 3.
7. That you must study and know the word of God to be pleasing to Him, 2 Timothy 2:15.
