It was a big weekend at the Amarillo Stock Show for several Briscoe County 4-H members who earned coveted placings in several divisions of the show.

Mike Cornett was exhibitor of a crossbred barrow that placed first in its class, was chosen as breed champion, and went on to be selected as the reserve champion of the Swine Show. Breeders of the reserve champion barrow were West and Patton of Silvertown.

The reserve champion barrow sold to Connally Implement Company of Amarillo for \$1.00 a pound.

West and Patton were also the breeders of a Chester White barrow exhibited by Lydia Younger which placed second in its class.

Lydia's second-place barrow was purchased by Acco Seed Company of Amarillo for 45c a pound.

Brent Brannon showed a second-place Duroc barrow, which was purchased for the High Plains Childrens Home for 40c a pound. Brent also showed a lightweight Poland China barrow that placed eleventh in its class.

Interest Rate Reduced On Variable Rate Loans

Jake B. Watson, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Floydada, received word today that the Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8%.

"This reduction affects more than 90 million dollars of variable rate loans to more than 2800 farmers and ranchers throughout Texas," Watson stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969 lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in prices which the Bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans. Mr. Watson pointed out that this action is in line with the Bank's policy in providing farmers and ranchers credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. On January 1 of this year, the Bank had over \$529 million in volume of loans outstanding.

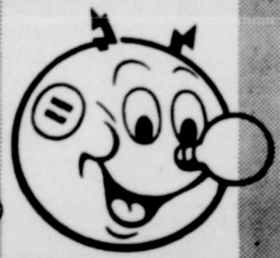

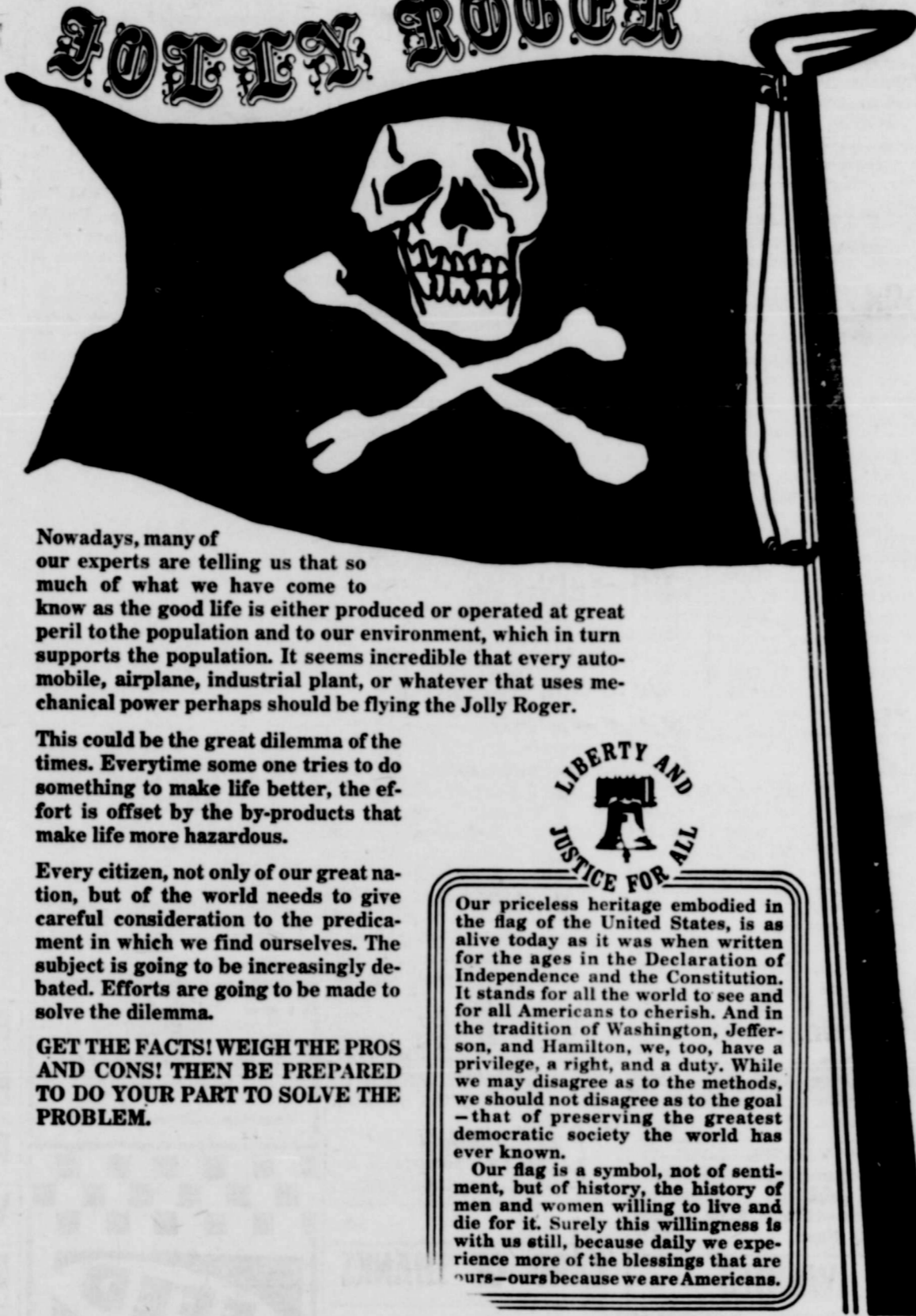
