





Insects and diseases often appear unnoticed in flower beds. I avoid this by spraying both flowers and vegetables regularly, about once every 10 days to two

weeks.
Spectracide and Phaltan do a good job for me. These broad spectrum pesticides control the major pests in flower and vegetable gardens.
To simplify things, I mix the two together and spray everything at one time — saving time and money needed for mixing individual chemicals for each plant. Regular sprayings keep plant. Regular sprayings keep my gardens healthy, and the entire job takes only minutes out of my weekend.

Slugs are a problem in many flower and vegetable gardens. The snail-like creatures feed on plant foliage at night, leaving a ragged, shredded appearance. Since late afternoon waterings provide damp, shady conditions ideal for slug activity, it is best to water your plants during morning hours.

Regular insecticide sprayings normally keep this pest under control. However, heavy infestations may call for special snail baits in addition to the regular sprayings.
