The Eighth Annual Memorial Day Steer Roping will be staged by Swisher County Activities Association at 2:00 p.m. Sunday, May 30 at Cobb - Wheeler - Mote Arena two miles east and one mile north

This year's roping will feature 23 of the top ropers in the nation, including several former world champion steer ropers. Shout Webster from Lenapah, Oklahoma has held the title four times and was runner up many times. Sonny Davis of Kenna, New Mexico and Clark McEntire of Kiowa, Oklahoma have also held this honored position more than once, along with Jim Bob Altizer of Del Rio. Don McLaughlin of Fort Collins, Colorado will be back to rope this year after having missed being a contestant last year. He, too, is a former holder of the world champion record.

Swisher County's own Tuffy Thompson will return to give them a tough go for their money, hav-

ing won the Tullia roping in 1968, 1969 and 1970. Jim Prather of Post will be contending for top honors after having placed second in the Tullia event in 1970 and having won the event in 1966. He also won the Cheyenne Frontier Days in 1967.

Tim Prather of Chico will also return to vie for honors, having roped in Tullia many times.

Bud Upton, San Angelo, is a top contender, having placed first in the final go round of last year's roping. Returning will be James Allen of Santa Anna, who placed in two go rounds last year, and usually shows up at the pay window wherever he goes. Troy Fort of Lovington, New Mexico has been a champion calf roper for many years and also gives the steer ropers a good run everywhere he ropes. He has been a faithful contender in this Memorial Day roping. Billy Frank Good of Caprock, New Mexico will return, having placed second in the second go round last year. Also returning will be Charles Good of Elida, New Mexico and Dr. T. K. Hardy, jr. of Denton, to lend a strong hand of competition. Walt Arnold of Silverton has been one of the top steer ropers in many places, having been in the National Finals and won the Memorial steer roping at Tullia in 1967. Returning also will be Ab Deakins of Oklahoma City, and he too will offer strong competition for a championship title as will Randy Burchett of Pryor, Oklahoma and Hugh Posey, jr. of Wagoner, Oklahoma. They will strive to show Texas cowboys what Oklahoma cowboys can do and joining them will be John Miller of Pawhuska, Oklahoma, who is entering this roping for the first time.

Marvin Cantrell of Nara Visa, New Mexico will return again this year, having improved his skills since participating in Tullia and will be contending for a top placing, while Allen Keller of Olathe, Colorado will be making his first appearance in this Memorial roping contest of 1971. F. C. Stanger from over Las Vegas, Nevada way will be heading for Tullia over the Memorial Day weekend to see what his rope can do with a Texas steer as Wade Lewis from the neighboring city of Hereford tries his hand for the first time in this Memorial Day Steer Roping. Lewis has won the respect and recog-

niton he so well deserves as a young cowboy. He has lassoed his way to fame and fortune and plans to pursue the rodeo game a long way. Not only will Lewis compete in the Steer Roping, but will compete with Tuffy Thompson of Tu-

lia and Happy in a matched roping at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, May 29, at Cobb - Wheeler - Mote Arena. Following this matched roping, a Jack Pot roping will be staged; any persons interested in entering the calf roping the 29th should contact Ken Cook, County Agent,

in Tullia, or Corky Berry, Roping chairman. A concession stand will be in operation at the arena both Saturday and Sunday. Saturday night, May 29, a western dance will be held in the barn by the arena, with Tiny Lynn of Clovis, New Mexico furnishing the music.

The Swisher County Activities Association would like to extend a very special invitation to everyone who enjoys good calf roping, western music and dancing and good steer roping to come and spend the Memorial Day Weekend in Tullia. Tim Tucker is co-chairman of the roping events. Boyd Young and Wendell Simpson are chairmen of the western dance.

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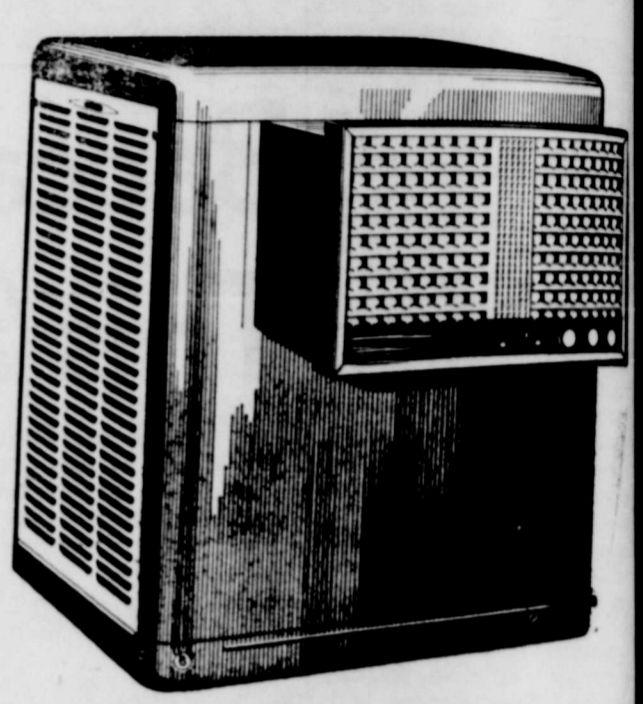
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# Notes Home

licious pound cake.

### CHOCOLATE POUND CAKE

- 1 6-oz. chocolate bar
- 1 teaspoon water
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 sticks margarine
- 4 eggs
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons vanilla  
1 cup milk, soured with 1 teaspoon lemon juice or vinegar  
Melt chocolate with water. Cream sugar and margarine, add eggs, one at a time and beat after each addition, add chocolate mixture and beat well. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Add alternately with mixture of buttermilk and vanilla. Pour into greased and floured 10" tube pan. Bake one hour in 325° oven. Let cool in pan about 10 minutes. Needs no frosting. This cake freezes exceptionally well.

INSIDE THE LEGISLATURE

with Rep. Tom Christian

**PRINTING CONTROVERSY**  
One of the more interesting experiences of the 62nd Session of the Legislature has come from the confrontation with the House Printing Office in regard to the printing of our Newsletter.

The response we have had from the citizens in our area in helping us defray the expense of this Newsletter has been most gratifying. It reaffirms our belief that no citizen wants to be governed by a system that attempts to justify censorship.

I have always questioned the validity of the state printing of congratulatory certificates, Christmas cards, business letterheads, etc. as has been the custom. These items have little to do with the business of the State.

The business of informing your constituency about the condition of the State seems to be very much in the interest of the State and good government.

However, as long as the House Printing Office is controlled by the office of the Speaker, it would seem wise for the office-holder to be held responsible for such materials. The Newsletter should continue to be printed out of his contingency expense fund with the legislator to be subject to the laws of libel in such matters. This should satisfy any who challenge the content on the basis of "name calling" or other real or imagined slights.

SPEAKER'S DAY

I fulfilled my obligation to the long-standing tradition of honoring the Office of the Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives by adding my signature to the scroll which proclaims Speaker's Day each session in honor of whoever is holding the office.

I did not attend the festivities in Washington-on-the-Brazos which honored Speaker Gus Mutscher specifically.

TOGETHERNESS (?)

At the beginning of this Session I felt that the Speaker would have many problems in regard to keeping the House together. In spite of the hit and run tactics of the "Dirty Thirty," the great bulk of the House membership has functioned without major rifts due to the fact that the Speaker has promised almost everybody a run with his pet legislation without interference from the leadership.

Ordinarily the worst legislation is sifted out by the leadership through a process of sending bills to unfavorable committees which will fail to report out, or will refer to a subcommittee to be appointed at a later date, (a much later date) by the Chairman of the Committees.

This year everything is coming out and this bunch which has been battered by the stock deal, is being badgered by the membership and the lobby and the folks back home because of votes they have been forced to make on legislation that should never have appeared on the floor of the House.

Skins are wearing thin and it will be interesting to see how well the House carries its legislative wounds in the closing days of this session.

NIXON, AGNEW

President Nixon and Vice-President Agnew will be in Austin for the formal dedication of the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library the weekend of May 22.

On Monday I will be introducing Resolutions inviting the President and the Vice-President to address joint sessions of the Legislature while they are in the Capitol city.

HB 463

House Bill 463 passed the House on Consent Calendar on Thursday afternoon.

This bill, which pertains basically to Randall County, will allow the County Commissioner's Court to set the salaries of all county elected officials, deputies and employees. It places a limitation of \$20,000 on salaries for elected officials and a limitation of \$12,500 on salaries for deputies and employees.

By giving the Commissioners leeway in their salary scale, it is hoped they will have a better chance of hiring persons with the necessary background to perform the duties that the ever-growing county of Randall needs to meet future expansion.
