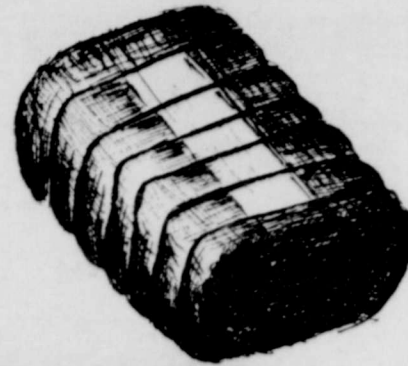

Fred Mercer Is Caprock District Conservation Farmer of The Year

The Cap Rock Soil Conservation District named Fred Mercer of Silverton as its outstanding conservation farmer of the year in a meeting of the Silverton Lions Club last Thursday. The club presented a plaque to Mr. Mercer in recognition of an outstanding job of conservation on farms that he owns and on farms that he operates.

Several of these farms had steep areas that were very difficult con-

Civil Anti-Trust Suit Filed In Federal Court

The National Farmers Organization has announced the filing in Federal Court at Kansas City, Missouri, of a civil anti-trust action against Mid-America Dairymen, Inc., Associated Milk Producers, Inc., and Associated Reserve Standby Pool, three milk marketing associations. The action took the form of a counter-claim in a suit brought against NFO by Mid-America and certain of its members. NFO's action seeks treble damages amounting to \$125,052,000 and in addition the dissolution of the cooperatives in question.

Beatrice Foods Company and its subsidiary, Boswell Dairy Company, were also named as defendants to these charges as were certain individuals in the Mid-America and AMPI organizations.

Oren Lee Staley, President of NFO, said that NFO's Executive Committee had unanimously authorized this action and had pledged all of the organization's resources to it. Counsel has been specially retained to press the case, and have been directed to proceed with all vigor.

The NFO action charges the defendants with conspiring to fix the price and control the supply of raw milk in midwestern markets and to exclude NFO and all persons from those markets. The case also challenges mergers, acquisitions and consolidations of AMPI and Mid-America.

It also charges that pursuant to a conspiracy the defendant organizations have utilized their economic power by means of threats, boycotts and coercion to induce NFO customers to refrain from purchasing milk from it. NFO also charges that these organizations have sought to influence and in certain instances have influenced the decisions of government officials to the detriment of NFO and NFO producers. Allegedly the defendants induced and compelled producers to contribute to political slush funds controlled by AMPI and Mid-America which have utilized these contributions to advance monopolistic interests.

Because all parties to this proceeding are under a court order which prohibits them from discussing the litigation, Mr. Staley declined further comment on it.



Bob Rauch, of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District, presented an award to Fred Mercer, named the District's Outstanding Conservation Farmer of the Year, during the regular noonday meeting of the Silverton Lions Club last Thursday at the City Cafe.

Over a period of years Mr. Mercer has taken 246 acres of steep cropland out of irrigation. One hundred and sixty-one acres of land were planted to permanent grass. Another 285 acres were protected by diversions and terraces.

Merced uses a very good conservation crop rotation. He does an excellent job of stubble mulching.

Mr. Mercer has also been very concerned about water conservation. He has installed irrigation pipelines to eliminate water loss in temporary ditches. He also installed an automatic tailwater recovery system to prevent waste of irrigation water. He drilled test holes to locate a new source of irrigation water in a deeper formation than is now used.

At present, Mr. Mercer is a member of the Texas Commission of the Upper Red River Flood Control and Irrigation District and serves on the High Plains Research Foundation Board of Trustees. He is a member of the Briscoe County Veterans Land Board Committee, the National Farm Organization and the Briscoe County Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Merced has been active in the Lions Club since 1949 and has served as Boss Lion, Zone Chairman and Deputy Governor.

He has also served as a member of the Briscoe County ASCS committee for 17 years, as a member of the Silverton School Board for six years, was active in Boy and Girl Scout work, and served as local president and county president of the Texas Farmers Union.

This award is presented annually during Soil Stewardship Week.

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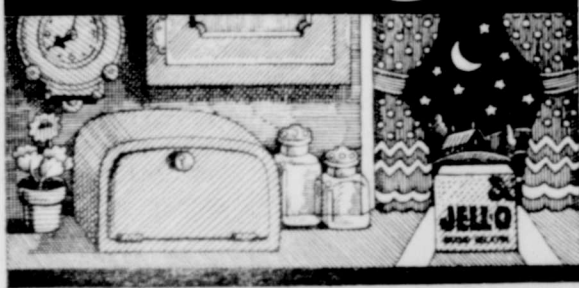
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RECEIVES DEGREE AT TARLETON STATE

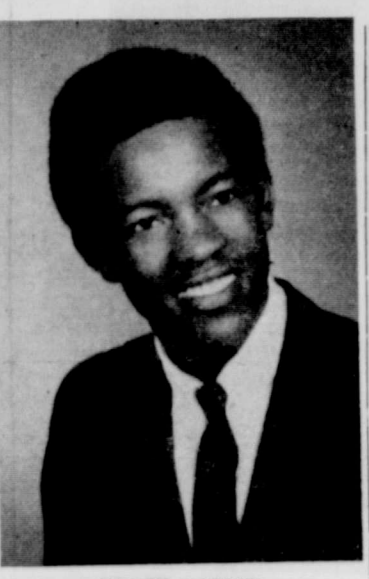

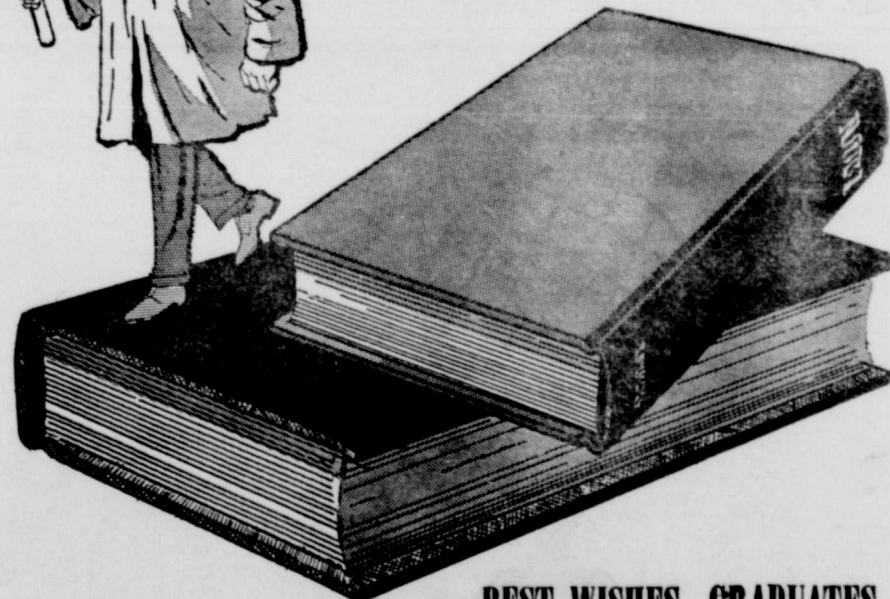

A grave marker commemorating the life of Confederate soldier and early-day Texas Ranger, William Moten Vaughan, will be placed at his grave in the Silverton Cemetery this weekend. An unveiling ceremony will be held at the graveside at 3:00 p.m. Sunday, May 30—Memorial Day—when all the descendants of the Vaughan family have been invited to gather for a brief public memorial service for which Rev. Cecil Vaughan will be master of ceremonies.

Prior to the unveiling, the descendants of the Vaughan family have been invited to spread a basket lunch together at 1:00 p.m. in the Silverton School Cafeteria.

William Moten Vaughan was born in Randolph County, Missouri, on October 15, 1841. He married Margaret Ann (Maggie) Kemper on November 28, 1869, and to this union were born the following children:

Emma Francis Vaughan, born May 31, 1871; Mrs. Emma Vaughan Flowers, if living, would have been 100 years old May 31, 1971;

Moten Vaughan, born December 31, 1871; died June 1, 1957 at Weatherford, Texas;

Johnnie Vaughan, born February 12, 1874; died November 1, 1955, at Silverton;

William Vaughan, born April 29, 1876; died December 22, 1940 at Happy;

Simuel Vaughan, born November 28, 1877; died February 1 at Silverton;

Edward Vaughan, born November 28, 1880;

Lenora Vaughan, born June 19, 1883; died August 26, 1946, in Pearl, Texas;

Margaret Ann Vaughan, first wife of William Moten Vaughan, died June 10, 1884. Mr. Vaughan married Eleanora Jane Spencer September 8, 1886, and to this union were born the following children:

Margaret Annie Vaughan, born May 11, 1888;

Cornelius Ray Vaughan, born on December 21, 1889; the only surviving son of William Moten Vaughan, "Uncle Nealy," as he is known to his family, is planning to take part in the unveiling ceremony Sunday afternoon;

Robert Abraham Vaughan, born April 20, 1892; died April 20, 1897;

Phelian Eleanor Vaughan, born August 25, 1896; died May 13, 1920.

William Moten Vaughan came to Texas from Missouri in 1859 and stopped at Waco. It was there early in 1860 that he joined Captain Sul Ross' company of Texas Rangers, serving in that organization for a term of six months. The route taken by the company from Waco was by way of Fort Belknap, across to the northern border of Texas passing near where Vernon is now located, and stopping for a time on Otter Creek in the Wichita mountains in Oklahoma. At that time, Fort Sill had not been established.

It was after Mr. Vaughan was

Mrs. Welch moved here from Erick, Oklahoma with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Vaughan, in 1907, at the age of three. Her parents filed on a quarter-section of land and lived on the homestead before moving here.

discharged from ranger service that Ross and his band fought Pete Nocona and captured Cynthia Ann Parker, mother of Chief Quanah Parker, and reputed wife of Nocona.

In 1861 Mr. Vaughan returned to Missouri and joined the regiment of General Sterling Price, serving in the command of Francis Cockrell, afterwards United States Senator from Missouri. He fought at Shiloh and around Corinth and luka, and was one of the many who were in front of Sherman on the march to Atlanta.

In 1926, Mr. Vaughan attended a meeting of Texas Rangers, at which he opposed the motion to ask for a raise from \$20 to \$30 in the amount of pension allowed old rangers, leaving it open to allow the Legislature to increase

the sum to the amount they saw fit. Mr. Vaughan was quoted in the Breckenridge Daily as saying that this was the first time that his wife had not been with him at a meeting of the rangers. At that time, they had four boys residing in the Silverton area, one of them having lived here for 19 years. None of them, he reportedly said, had ever failed to grow plenty to carry them through here, although at times crops had been shorter than during other years. Mr. Vaughan appeared hale and hearty, though a bit deaf and not so spry in his limbs as when on the chase of redskins in an early day. Even though he was never in an actual battle with Indians, he was ever ready when the call came and had a brush occurred, he would have accounted for one or more of the slain Coman-

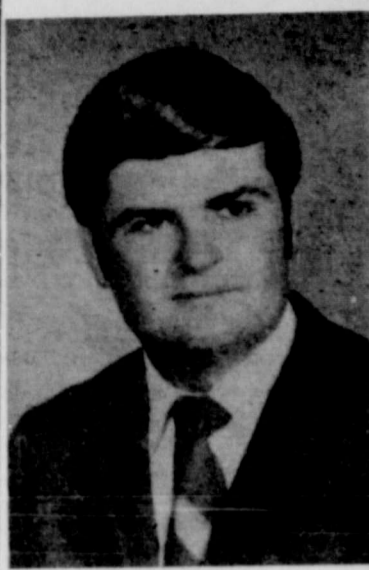

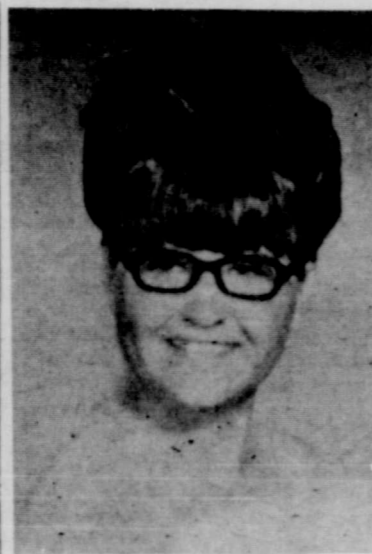

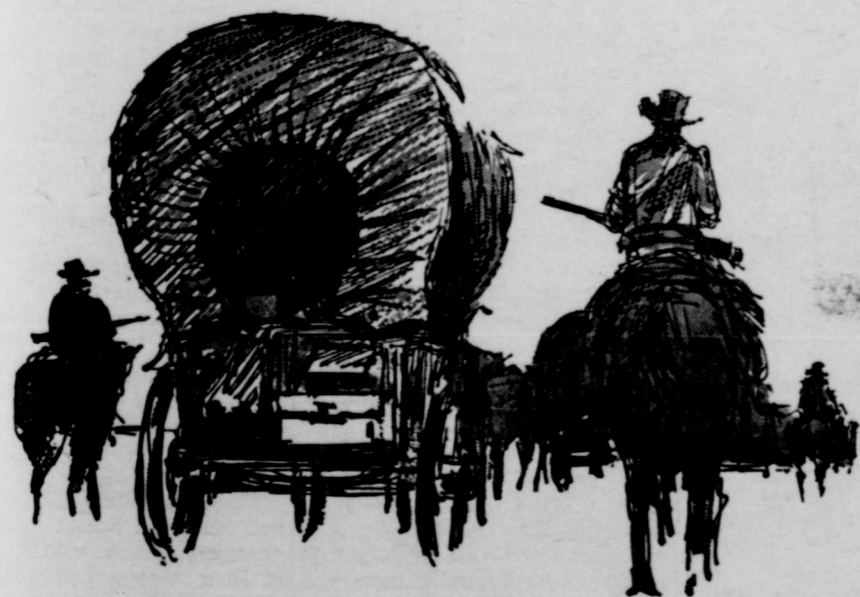

Health Bulletin Issued To Parents

A new state law (5.B.27) was signed by Governor Preston Smith on April 26 and became effective immediately. This new law requires that children NOT be admitted to elementary and secondary schools (or institutions of higher education) unless they have been immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, rubeola (measles), rubella (three day measles), poliomyelitis and smallpox.

The purpose is to bring statewide uniformity into requirements for immunization of school children.

This year all first grade students must have a doctor's certificate or one from an approved health department, stating your child has had the above immunizations.
