# **Civil Anti-Trust Suit Filed In Federal Court**

The National Farmers Organiation has announced the filing in Federal Court at Kansas City, Missouri, of a civil anti-trust action against Mid - America Dairymen, Inc., Assocated Milk Producers. Inc., and Associated Reserve Standby Pool, three milk marketing associations. The action took the form of a counter-claim in a suit brought against NFO by Mid-America and certain of its members. NFO's action seeks treble damages amounting to \$125,052,-000 and in addition the dissolution of the cooperatives in question.

Beatrice Foods Company and its subsidiary, Boswell Dairy Company, were also named as defendants to these charges as were certain individuals in the Mid-America and AMPI organizations.
