

Vacation Bible School Planned July 26-30

Silverton Church of Christ will conduct its annual Vacation Bible School July 26 through July 30, from 9:00 until 11:00 o'clock each morning, from the nursery through the fifth grade. The teenagers class will be held each evening at 7:30 o'clock.

The theme for this study will be "The Christian Family." Ambulance Service Being Discontinued

Ervin Boyd of Lockney, an owner of the Silverton Funeral Home, told the Briscoe County News this week that ambulance service in Silverton will be discontinued as of August 1. Mr. Boyd previously had asked the City of Silverton and Briscoe County for a \$200 monthly subsidy in order to keep his ambulance service in operation here. The City agreed to contribute \$100 monthly, but the County Commissioners would agree to pay only \$50 monthly.

Freight Rates Are Lowered for Briscoe

Nine additional drought-plagued counties in Texas are now eligible for lower freight rates on incoming hay following a request filed by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng and approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

These counties are Briscoe, Concho, Deaf Smith, Falls, Limestone, McLennan, Moore, Runnels and Sutton.

Because of the drought in the Southwest, hay and other forage crops are in extremely short supply. In response to previous requests by USDA, the ICC has taken action permitting railroads to lower rates on hay on one day's notice in 11 counties in Arizona, 23 in New Mexico, 13 in Oklahoma and 155 in Texas. A request for relief to three counties in New Mexico is still pending at the ICC.

After the ICC approves a request, USDA notifies state officials who may then begin negotiating with the railroads for lower rates in the drought areas. The ICC action does not require the railroads to lower rates.

In his request to the ICC, Lyng pointed out that the counties had been made eligible for a wide range of relief measures through USDA and that the ICC action would compliment these programs.

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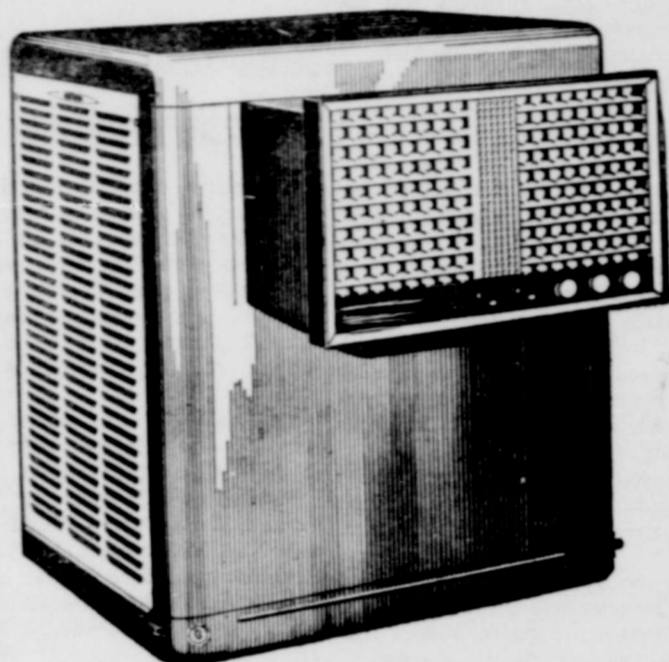
