Four Food Distribution Centers To Combine Buying Power

DALLAS, Tex.—Four of the largest food distribution centers in the Southwest have announced that they are combining their buying power in order to lower their prices to their customers. Their new total sales will elevate them to a position of one of the leading retail food distributors in the world. The four distribution centers are Affiliated Food Stores, Inc. of Dallas, Affiliated Food Stores, Inc. of Tulsa, Affiliated Food Stores, Inc. of Amarillo and Affiliated Food Stores, Inc. of Little Rock. The Arkansas center was formerly known as Associated Grocers. The combined retail marketing area served by the four distribution centers covers portions of seven states: Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Texas.

"There is no merger of the four distribution centers," said Charles McBeath, general manager of Affiliated, Amarillo. "What we are doing is combining our buying power to increase savings for our customers," he said. In a simultaneous announcement made by the heads of the four distribution centers in their respective cities, it was revealed that their combined retail sales of groceries annually reaches the one-billion dollar mark. Nearly 20 million people reside in the area served by the four centers. Over two thousand member stores, independently owned by leaders in their respective communities, will be affected by the new policy.

The independent grocer will thus be enabled to contribute even further to the nation's economy. 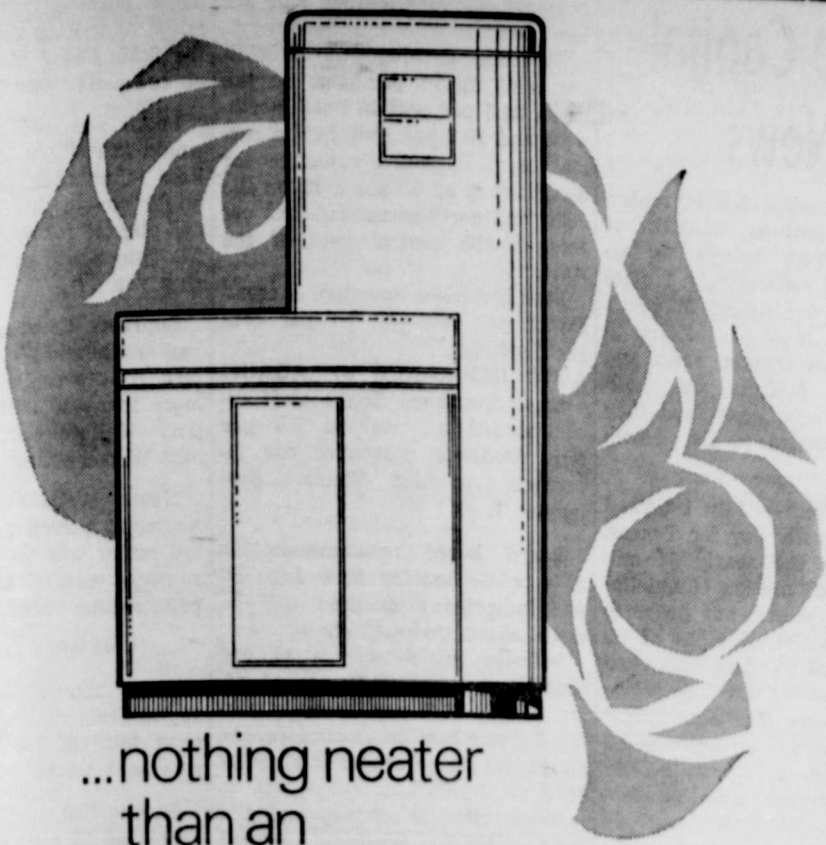

State Capital News

AUSTIN, Tex. — Investigations of stock-loan scandals which have rocked the state for nearly seven months moved forward on three fronts during the past week.

*Travis County District Attorney Robert O. Smith announced plans to present to the grand jury here evidence compiled by Texas Attorney General Crawford C. Martin's staff.

Martin said evidence includes material pertaining to federal Securities and Exchange Commission allegations that large bank loans were extended to high state officials by the Sharpstown State Bank in 1969. Money went to stock purchases by officials at the time Sharpstown bank head Frank Sharp was trying to get deposit insurance legislation passed.

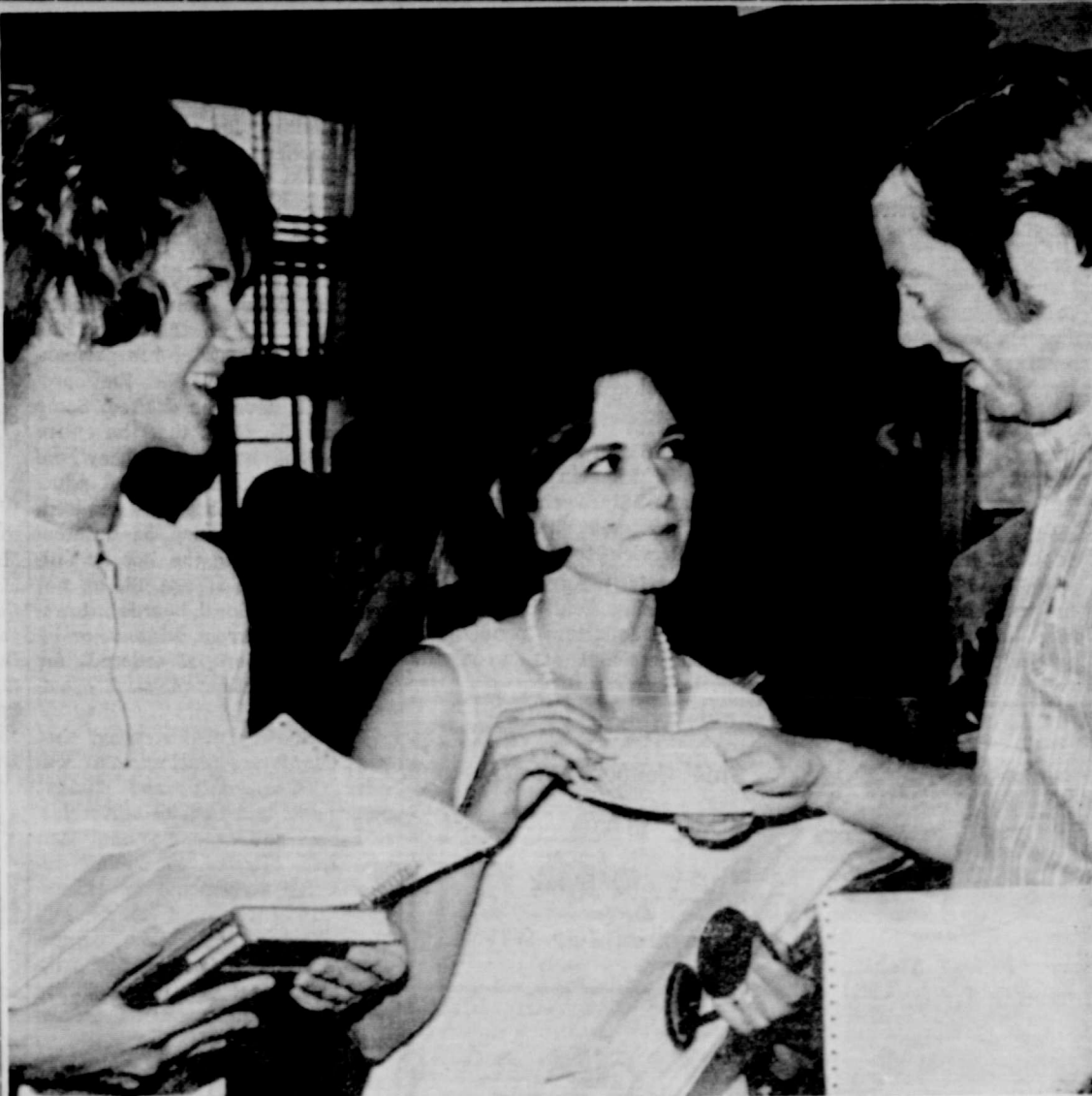
*Sharp was invited to testify within the next three weeks before a House General Investigating Committee.

Committee asked Sharp to talk about bills in which he was interested in 1969 "and other matters that may be pertinent concerning Sharpstown State Bank, the National Bankers Life Insurance Company and any relationship with public officials."

*Meanwhile, State Insurance Commissioner Clay Cotten turned over to district attorneys in Houston, Dallas and Austin results of his investigation of NBL.

Cotten said he feels insurance, embezzlement and conspiracy laws may have been overstepped but preferred to leave it up to prosecuting attorneys to decide if violations occurred. He offered names of five one-time NBL officers and directors prominently involved in his report.

Federal court at Houston set hearing this week to determine if a June 14 immunity order protecting Sharp from further prosecution or summons should be modified. Martin and Smith want to force him to testify before the

COURTS SPEAK

An Austin federal district judge upheld the local school district's desegregation plan calling for a minimum of crosstown pupil busing, holding against a federal government proposal for massive busing. Judge scored the federal government for its uncooperative attitude toward a compromise.

an appeal of A & M University

State Supreme Court rejected employees who had paychecks stopped when it was discovered they were serving on the College Station city council.

In other decisions, High Court: *Stuck by its original decision holding former president of the Sharpstown State Bank was not negligent in failing to investigate bonds offered as security on a \$470,000 loan.

*Turned down the appeal of a Dallas oilman's widow in a law suit over his estate brought by the man's five daughters by an earlier marriage.

*Upheld the will of multi-millionaire Robert A. Welch's sister leaving \$300,000 in Texas oil and gas property to the Welch Foundation.

*Held against an Alice woman seeking damages from drug companies which manufactured the anesthetic she claims partially paralyzed her following 1963 surgery.

*Reversed a lower court judgment and concluded the foreclosure of mortgage on the home of a Dallas couple who had paid \$420 more than their schedule called for was void.

*Rejected disputed evidence of a remarriage in Mexico and backed a Nueces County trial court finding that a Corpus Christi man owes nearly \$24,000 in alimony to his former wife in Nevada.

LIVESTOCK DISEASE SPREAD

As sleeping-sickness-like Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis continued to strike horses and some humans, threat of a new livestock malady loomed.

Outbreak of African hog fever in Cuba alarmed swine owners. Latter is almost invariably fatal, and there is no known vaccine. Ailment does not affect people, as does VEE (which is usually mild in humans).

More than 1,100 Texas horses are believed to have been killed by VEE and 1,500 others stricken. More than 6.6 million acres have been sprayed to kill disease-carrying mosquitoes.

AG OPINIONS

Texans under 21 may not serve on juries in Texas despite recently-lowered voting age to 18, Attorney General Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

*Texas Industrial Commission can open an extension office in Mexico City and pay salaries of employees there.

*Governor is without authority to negotiate open-end contracts for computer supplies for state agencies.

*Law passed last May 26 sets maximum compensation for assistant county superintendents in all counties.

*Renewal license issued by State Board of Hairdressers and Cosmetologists June 2 - August 29, 1971, expires August 31, 1972. Applicant for September 7, 1971 board examination must pay \$15 filing fee with application and additional \$5 license fee.

SB 194 of last legislature re-

peals other acts on commercial drivers' license exemptions.

MEDICINE AID SYSTEM CHANGED

On September 1 State Department of Public Welfare will begin making payments directly to pharmacists for drugs prescribed to Texas welfare recipients.

Under current system, allowance for drugs is included in monthly assistance checks. Legislature this year appropriated \$11.9 million for new vendor drug program.

Welfare authorities believe the new system will provide improved prescribed medicine coverage and delay a cut in overall welfare payments for food, clothing and shelter.

However, some complained of welfare check cuts, since drug allotments no longer will go to recipients, and a few who get only payments for drugs will be taken off welfare rolls. Latter will be interviewed by Welfare Department to determine if they should still get cash aid.

Selective Service Director Expects Draft Call To Resume in Near Future

Selective Service System Executive Secretary Mrs. Frances Starkey, who manages Local Board No. 20 at Childress, says the current Congressional impasse over extending the induction authority has created great uncertainty among draft-age men.

Mrs. Starkey continued, "Selective Service Director Curtis Tarr has recently stressed the importance of explaining to our draft-age men the high probability that draft calls will resume in the near future and that the current impasse in the Congress is not likely to affect any registrant's chance of being drafted."

"Our local board has been specifically instructed to continue to register and classify men, and to order for preinduction physical examinations those young men who may be needed to fill draft calls in the coming months," Mrs. Starkey said.

Men with lottery numbers through 125 were eligible for induction in June in order to fill draft calls. Since then, the Defense Department has asked Selective Service to draft 16,000 men in July - August. This request is being held by Selective Service headquarters pending final Congressional action on the

draft bill, which is expected within several weeks.

"Those young men with relatively low lottery numbers who are eligible for induction this year, particularly those with numbers below 175—the current processing ceiling—have a very good chance of being processed for induction after draft calls are restored," Mrs. Starkey said.

"Many young men," said Mrs. Starkey, "seem to think that the Selective Service Act has permanently expired and that they probably will never be drafted. Some of them also think that the entire system has stopped. They are wrong since it is only the induction authority that has expired. They, therefore, may be unintentionally, breaking the law by failing to register at age 18, by not keeping their local boards informed of their current address, or by failing to report, if ordered, for their preinduction physical examinations."

Mrs. Starkey also stressed that local boards are continuing to consider CO, hardship, and student deferments and to take other classification actions. "Young men who had planned to submit requests for deferments or exemptions are encouraged to do so," Mrs. Starkey said. "The expiration of the induction authority does not affect our responsibility to classify young men," Mrs. Starkey added.

AUSTIN, Tex. — July 1 turned out to be a costly day for Texans. Not only did the nearly \$1 million-a-day (\$604 million biennially) tax bill take effect, but property owners got notice of hikes of up to 25 per cent in their insurance rates. And just the day before (see below) the State Insurance Board staff recommended an average 2.8 per cent increase in private auto insurance coverage effective September 1.

Tax bill raises the general sales tax from 3.25 per cent to four per cent statewide (five per cent in many cities which also levy a local sales tax); adds three cents a pack to cigarette taxes; increases liquor tax about seven cents a fifth; raises beer tax a fraction of a cent a bottle; jumps sales tax on new cars to four per cent (bringing in car rentals) and jacks up corporate franchise levy \$1.25 per \$1,000 of capital.

A 10 per cent tax on mixed drink sales went into effect last month.

A new kind of "surtax" takes effect September 1. It will cost moving traffic violators \$2.50; other misdemeanor violators tried in county court, \$5, and those convicted of felony, \$10.

Raise in homeowners' and other kinds of property insurance came without formal announcement other than notices to local agents.

Homeowners' rates rose 25 per cent along the seacoast (hit by Hurricane Celia last August) and in tornado-struck north-northwest territory of the state. Central area

homeowners' rate jumped 22.1 per cent, too.

Extended coverage of all classes went up 25 per cent on the coast, 24.5 per cent in north-northwest and 19.7 per cent in the central area. Extended coverage for dwellings is up 25 per cent on the coast and north-northwest, 19.3 per cent in the central part of the state.

Fire insurance coverage increases 5.2 per cent—or 7.1 per cent for dwellings.

AUTO INSURANCE UP AGAIN? State Insurance Board staff recommended an average 2.8 per cent statewide passenger car insurance rate hike effective September 1.

Board heard recommendations at a public hearing here June 30 and indicated a decision will be made about mid-August.

Industry, which won a 14 per cent boost in rates January 1 after asking 27.7 per cent, is asking 9.8 per cent increase (average statewide) on passenger car coverage.

Seven state legislators and the state AFL-CIO president argued that a decline in accidents justifies lowering rather than raising rates. Since rates are fixed by territories, not statewide, some areas under Board staff recommendations would receive reductions in certain lines of coverage.

MORE WELFARE WOES LOOM A top court decision declaring needy non-citizens eligible for assistance, threat of increasing fi-

nance burdens from federal legislation and rising medical costs put the State Board of Public Welfare on red alert again last week.

Board was told the federal bill would "save" the state \$37.1 million in existing payments—but might double the number of Texans eligible for medical care benefits (which will cost \$135.7 million next year).

Supreme Court decision on aliens would add 20,000 to state welfare rolls overnight at a cost of more than \$10 million a year, Deputy Welfare Commissioner Herbert Wilson estimated.

New Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell said negotiations are under way to place limits on runaway medical care costs, while maintaining adequate services.

UNEMPLOYMENT UP Texas unemployment increased 15,500 from mid-April to mid-May to a total of 196,500, Texas Employment Commission reported.

During last year, unemployment increased 28 per cent, and number of claimants for jobless benefits jumped 42 per cent.

Seventeen of the major areas reported unemployment growth during the past month. Four had a decrease, and one remained unchanged. Unemployment rate (as percentage of work force) was 4.1 per cent compared with 3.3 per cent in May 1970 and 3.8 per cent in April.

A-B-C-D Spells Fire

That's right, anyway you look at it, A-B-C-D does spell fire because today all fires are placed in one of those four classifications.

What is a Class A Fire?

Basically, it is one involving ordinary combustibles such as wood, cloth, paper, rubber and some plastics.

What is a Class B Fire?

Such fires involve flammable or combustible liquids, flammable gases, greases and similar materials.

What is a Class C Fire?

Fires of this nature involve energized electrical equipment.

What is a Class D Fire?

Pertains to those involving certain combustible metals such as magnesium, sodium, potassium, etc.

Why classify a fire?

Because as man and his technology progressed, he began to be confronted with a variety of fires, many of which could no longer be contained by the primary extinguishing agent known as water.

What are the other extinguishing agents?

Dry Chemicals, Carbon Dioxide, Dry Powders and Foams.

What means is used to employ these agents?

Many. However, you should be concerned with the portable fire extinguisher which is often referred to as "the first line of defense" against fire.

On which fires is Water used and why?

Class A only. Because it is

a cooling, soaking and penetrating agent.

On which fires is Dry Chemical used and why?

Class B and C for a regular Dry Chemical extinguisher; however, there is a Multi-Purpose Dry Chemical with which you would be more concerned and this can be used on Class A, B and C fires. Because it is a flame interrupting and, in some cases, cooling agent.

On which fires is Carbon Dioxide used and why?

Class B and Class C. Because it cuts off air and leaves no residue.

On which fires is Foam used and why?

Class A and Class B. Because it is a smothering and blanketing agent.

On which fires is Dry Powder used and why?

Class D only. Because it is a smothering and coating agent.

How do you know which extinguisher to use?

Every one is prominently marked as to its type and the class or classes of fires upon which it can be used.



This symbol indicates the extinguisher is applicable for use on flammable or combustible liquids, flammable gases, greases or similar materials. The background of the symbol will be either Metallic or Red.



This symbol indicates the extinguisher is applicable for use on fires involving energized electrical equipment. The background of the symbol will be either Metallic or Blue.



This symbol indicates the extinguisher is applicable for use on fires involving certain combustible metals such as sodium, magnesium, potassium, etc. The background of the symbol will be either Metallic or Yellow.



This symbol indicates the extinguisher is applicable for use on ordinary combustibles such as wood, cloth, paper, rubber, etc. The background of the symbol will be either Metallic or Green.

Does Underwriters' Laboratories test extinguishers?

Yes, they are primarily tested for their ability to operate when needed, but they are also rated for their efficiency. Look for the UL label on the extinguisher.

Remember, know your extinguishers and the fires upon which they can be used. It's all on the label, so read it well before the fire strikes; there won't be time later.

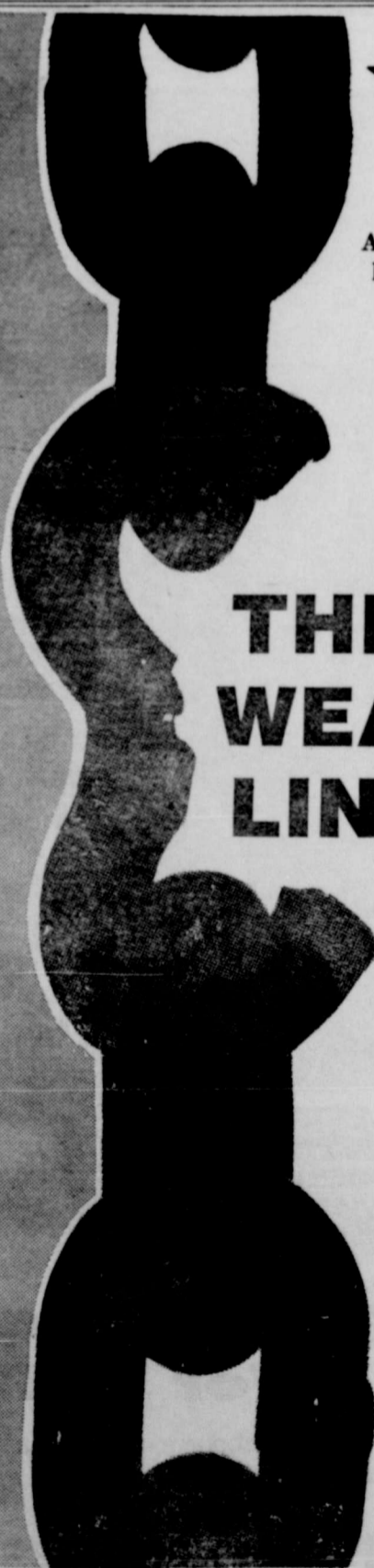

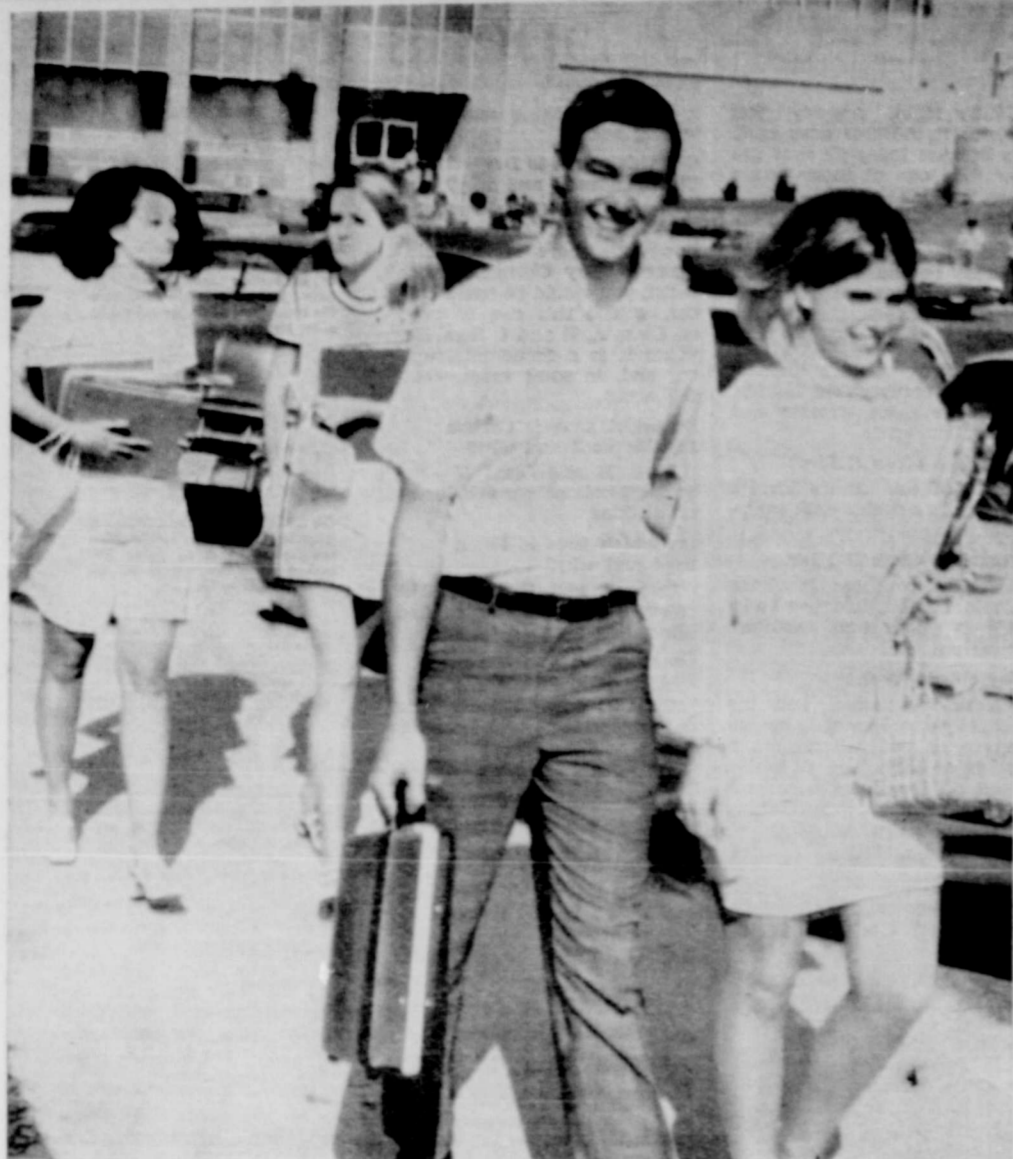

State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, Tex.— Back-to-school time isn't far off for more than two million young Texans, and State Board of Education has approved a record \$302.4 million in statewide available school fund allotment.

Board set \$121.90 as the state allocation for each pupil in public schools this year. Figure is based on the average daily attendance during 1970-71, or 2,479,400, although actual enrollment was over 2.7 million.

Local school districts may use their allocation to help pay annual operating expenses, including teacher salaries. Available school fund draws investment earnings from the \$835 million permanent school fund.

In other preparations for the upcoming school year, Board of Education also:

*Approved a \$887,500 contract with Southwest Educational Development Laboratory for a bilingual teaching program tailored for four-year-old children of Mexican-American farm workers. Ten bilingual specialists will work with 100 youngsters in McAllen and Hereford to develop an experimental project next school year and field test it in 1972-73.

*Approved a new accreditation plan to provide computer data to warn of developing weak points in school systems. Data will provide scientific analysis of information needed to decide which schools should be visited by accreditation teams. Such teams visit about 200 of more than 1,100 Texas school districts each year.

*Entered an agreement to link Texas Education Agency and U. S. Office of Education in a \$1.8 million program to evaluate new special education pilot projects expected to have national impact on the teaching of handicapped children.

*Allocated \$23.2 million to buy new textbooks.

DISEASE SPREADS

A sleeping sickness-like disease spread among horses (and in a few humans) in the South Texas-Rio Grande Valley area.

U. S. Agriculture Department which originally had scheduled an experimental vaccine against Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis in 13 counties, later released it statewide and slapped an embargo on Texas horses.

Later, a state Animal Health Commission order halted movement within state or out of state of horses not vaccinated at least 14 days earlier.

Several persons were hospitalized in Brownsville with VEE symptoms. Cases in horses increased sharply, though laboratory confirmation lagged behind discovery of symptoms.

Disease, described as "flu-like" among humans, is deadly to horses, and concern was expressed for the equine population. Emergency situation stopped all rodeos, horse shows, race meets and other activities involving horses.

TEXTBOOKS AVAILABLE FOR REVIEW

Textbooks considered for 1972-73 school adoption can be looked over by interested citizens at 20 regional education service centers over the state.

Texas Education Agency, the largest single buyer of textbooks in the world, has \$23.2 million available for the next school year. New books can be reviewed at Edinburg, Corpus Christi, Victoria, Houston, Beaumont, Huntsville, Kilgore, Mount Pleasant, Wichita Falls, Richardson, Fort Worth, Waco, Austin, Abilene, San Angelo, Amarillo, Lubbock, Midland, El Paso and San Antonio education service centers.

1.5 MILLION NEW VOTERS?

Texas may have 1.5 million new voters in 1972 largely as a result of 18-21-year-olds becoming eligible for all elections, according to a state senator's forecast.

New law goes into effect September 1 which permits registration of a Texas voter for a three year period instead of annually as at present. Registration will also be open year-around except for a 30-day cutoff before any election.

Dallas Sen. Mike McCool, author of the new registration law, sees youngsters as accounting for a large part of the 1.5 million increase in eligibility rolls and predicts they will vote as well as any age group.

AG OPINIONS

All Texas counties must adopt the jury wheel system and terminate selection of jury panels through use of commissions, Atty.

Gen. Crawford Martin has held. New state law providing for waiver of indictment in non-death-penalty cases is constitutional, Martin said in another opinion.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded: *Commissioner of Bureau of Labor Statistics has no authority to promulgate rules and regulations limiting the number of boxing and wrestling promoters in cities within certain population brackets.

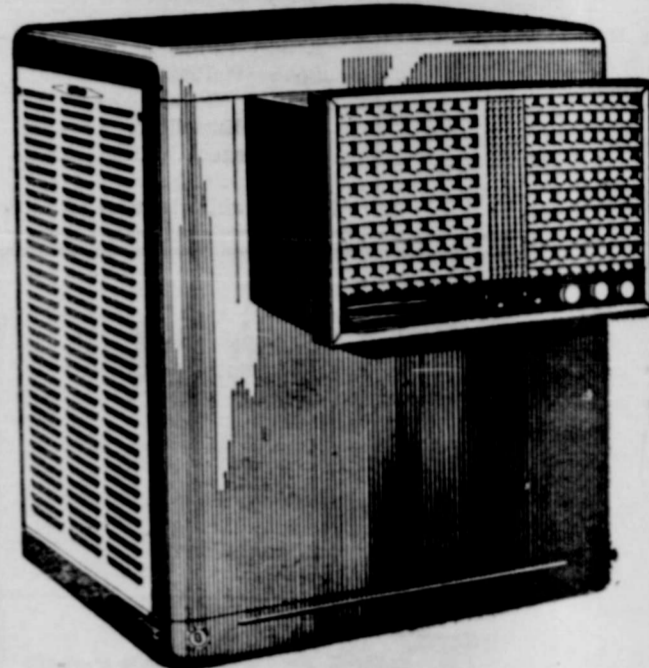
