





Lenders Work To Make Simultaneous Farm Loans

TEMPLE, Texas, Nov. 3-Texas farmers will be able to tap the largest supply of supplemental credit in history this year through the Farmers Home Administration, State Director Lynn Futch announced today.

"We project that more than \$81 million will be available to Texas farmers in fiscal year '72, as a result of cooperative efforts between the Farmers Home Administration and commercial lenders," he stat-

The cooperative effort involves having the commercial credit source and Farmers Home Administration make simultaneous loans to a borrower, with the private lender having first claim on the se-

"The farm ownership program is aimed to reach \$30 million-\$15 million of government money, with private lenders participating at a level of \$15 million," Mr. Futch continued.

"Projected figures for the farm operating loan program is \$51 million of which \$22 1/2 million-triple last year's figure-comes from regular commercial lenders."

Texas F.H.A. Loan **Volume Largest** In Nation

J. Lynn Futch, Texas State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, announced today that the agency extended credit to rural Texans in the amount of \$155,-456,817 during the 1971 fiscal year ending June 30, 1971. This credit was furnished farmers and rural residents through the many loan programs administered by the agency with rural housing leading the way with \$72,302,453. Loans for community services facilities such as rural water systems and sewer systems totaled \$24,205,192. Credit extended to individual farmers and ranchers for operating expenses, capital purchases and land purchases totaled \$58,949,172. This was the largest yearly volume of loans in the history of the organization, which has as its overall mission the development of rural areas.

Futch said that he was also pleased that there was a sizeable decrease in the percentage of loan delinquencies as compared to previous years. Due to the severe drought in the spring and early summer of this year, it is expected that the demand for emergency credit for farmers and ranchers this fall and winter will substantially increase the volume of farm loans in fiscal 1972, with all other programs also expected to be expanded. The program is administered in Texas through 144 county offices and the state office in Temple.


