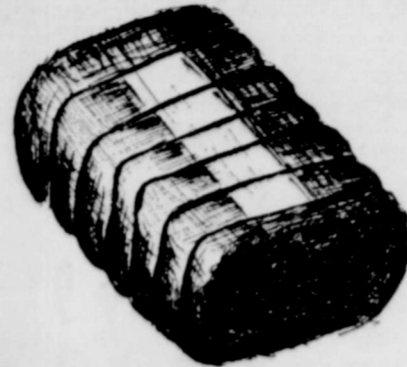

\$120,000 Pledges Received At Silverton and Floydada

Board members of Caprock Hospital District at Floydada have accepted a check for \$120,000 for the purpose of building a new clinic next to the hospital.

The gift was presented by District Attorney George Miller on behalf of the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust. Floydada rancher D. M. Cogdell, jr. had earlier presented the check and a letter of explanation to Miller.

Plans are being completed on the clinic and the board members

and Floydada doctors are working with an architect to design a clinic building which will office four doctors.

The clinic will be joined to the hospital with a sidewalk entering the east door. It will be furnished with all needed office furniture.

Hospital Board President Jay S. Hale said, "We are certainly appreciative of the Cogdell trust that makes the new clinic possible

... this is a great step in making Floydada a medical center in the

future, it insures the satisfaction of the doctors who now serve here and will certainly help us get more doctors in our community.

"This means that there will always be a doctor in or near the hospital in case of emergencies," he continued.

D. M. Cogdell, jr. expressed a sincere desire that the clinic will benefit the people of the "Caprock Country" with good medical care, a doctor available in case of emergencies, and make the Floydada

community a better place in which to live.

SILVERTON CLINIC AND AMBULANCE PLEDGE

The Briscoe County Clinic Association in Silverton has received a pledge from the Cogdell Trust for \$120,000 to be used in building a clinic and buying an ambulance for the Volunteer Ambulance Service. This pledge is subject to approval by the Internal Revenue Service.

The Martha Ann Cogdell Hospi-

tal Trust was created by the late Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Cogdell, sr., Snyder ranchers who were also in the oil business.

Martha Ann passed away at the age of 13, and the Cogdells created the Trust to honor their daughter's memory.

The Cogdell Memorial Hospital and Methodist Church at Snyder, assistance on the Scott & White Hospital at Temple, and various college grants have come from this Trust.

Born January 30, 1904, in Ben Wheeler, Van Zandt County, Texas, he was the second son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. L. McMinn. He was named Milton Travis McMinn, but the nickname of "Bud" was given him by his father, and his relatives and friends continued to use this name for the rest of his life. The McMinn family lived in Van Zandt County until 1906, and then moved to Parker County. From there they moved to Smith County, and then to Childress, and from there they went to Collingsworth County. In 1921 the McMinn family moved to Briscoe County and were engaged in farming west of Silverton until 1924.

March 15, 1925, Bud McMinn and Miss Ollie Lee Vaughan were united in marriage in Silverton. They lived in Floyd County until October, then they moved to Briscoe County and located west of Silverton. A son was born into the family January 28, 1926, and on April 27, 1931, the union was blessed with the birth of a daughter. He was engaged in farming southwest of Silverton until 1948 when the family moved into Silverton. He was a retired carpenter and had only recently retired from farming.

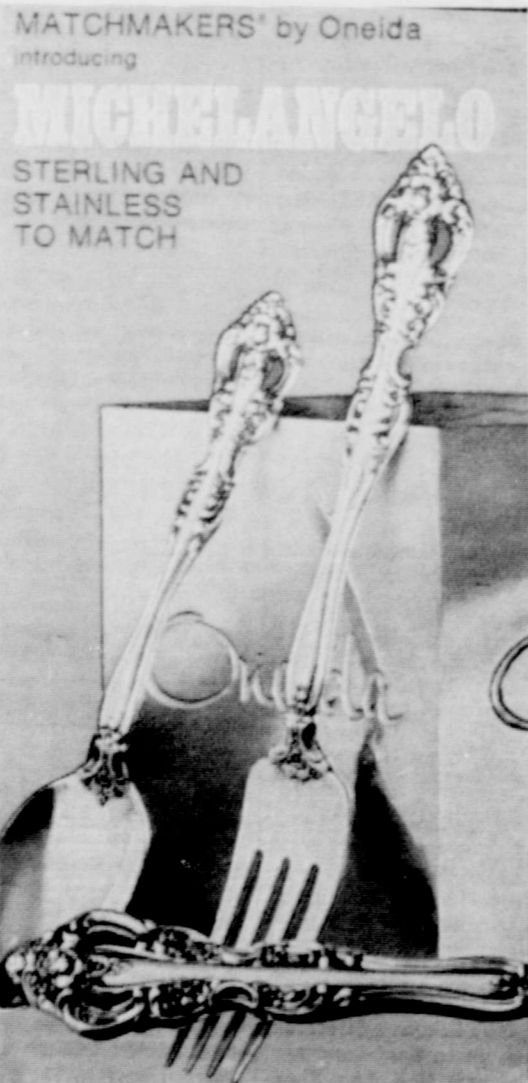

News From The Extension Service

The 1972 issue of the Farmer's Tax Guide, Internal Revenue Service Publication 225, is now available at the County Extension Office.

The new tax guide includes information on income and self-employment tax, required tax reporting dates, and an illustrated sample income tax return. Included are 17 major chapters ranging from record keeping requirements to fuel tax credit.

Sections of major importance to farmers and ranchers include farm business expenses, depreciation, capital gains, casualty and theft losses, involuntary conversions, and soil and water conservation expenses.

The new tax guide was printed by the I.R.S. before the 1971 tax changes were known and these changes will be available at a later date.

Two new chemicals, dichlorvos and trichlorfon, are available alone or in combination with other worming chemicals to broaden their spectrums of internal parasite control. They are both avail-

able as powders or granules that can be added to the horse's favorite food.

Many horse wormers or equine anthelmintics are on the market, but only those containing dichlorvos or trichlorfon will effectively get rid of bots.

Most horses will take the feed additive with no problems. However, withholding feed for 12 to 18 hours before giving the medicine with feed is suggested. If palatability is a problem, a package of strawberry Jello, some honey or molasses will often help.

Bots are the larvae or maggots of three flies that lay their eggs on the nose, lips, throat, chest and legs of horses from June until November. The eggs hatch by themselves or when the horse licks a spot where the eggs are attached to the hairs. The maggots first invade tissues in the mouth and throat but eventually move to the stomach and intestines where they attach themselves for several weeks.

Horses heavily infested with bots have rough coats and present a run-down condition, caused by digestive disturbances. In the stomach bots interfere with glandular activity, causing an inflamed ulcerous condition. They absorb food which can progressively starve the horse. Severe infestations can cause complete obstruction to the passage of food from the stomach to the intestine.

For more complete information on bots and external parasites of horses and their control, we have copies of MP-833, "Insect, Mite and Tick Parasites of Texas Horses," and MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry." Both are available at the County Extension Office.

FREE GIFT FOR CHILDREN

Five-Year Building Plan Announced By Public Service Co.

A five-year construction and improvement program which envisions an investment of more than \$144-million between now and the end of 1976 to stay ahead of the electric service needs of this area was announced today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"We see nothing but growth—in the future of our area. It is not a question of a

'created demand' for electric power, which is the current battle cry of the uninformed critics of our industry, but it is a true growth based on the development of the area's economic potential and customers' need for more electrical power. There really wouldn't be much sense in planning to invest nearly \$150 million if all you were doing was trying to make headlines.

"This region, and the nation as well, needs more electric power not only for growth, but for environmental considerations. Electricity is the cleanest of all energies at the point of consumption, and we will need more and more clean energy for sewage and water treatment, disposal of wastes and the solution of other environmental problems," Tolk said in announcing the construction plans.

Generating station additions scheduled for the five-year period will add more than 600,000 kilowatts to the company's power production capability. At the present time, the 11 major power stations produce a little more than 2,000,000 kilowatts.

The first of these capacity additions is already under construction as the second unit at Jones Station, southeast of Lubbock. A 256,000 kilowatt unit, it is scheduled to be in service for the summer of 1974. The first Jones Station generator, also a 256,000 kilowatt unit, went into service earlier this year.

The generating unit planned for 1976 operation is slated to be the company's first 350,000 kilowatt machine. However, the company has "reserved" three capabilities—250,000, 350,000 and 450,000—with the manufacturer, and the final decision will be made after all growth factors have been weighed.

"We have some interesting options with this 1976 unit. In June of 1972, we will complete an intertie between our company and the Public Service Company of Oklahoma. This is our first major interconnection with another utility. The tie line offers us the opportunity to exchange power; to sell power into power-deficient areas; to install units with larger capacity; and to locate units where fuel and water resources and load balances are most favorable. These are factors of efficiency and economy which are important to our

customers, as these factors will be combined to provide the least costly kilowatt hour for our customers," Tolk said.

Also, in its continuing efforts to conserve the resources of the region, the company plans to install a combined cycle unit at its Riverview Station, near Borger, in 1973.

The combined cycle unit is a gas turbine capable of producing 25,000 kilowatts of electric power.

The heat that remains in the gas turbine exhaust, after the electric power is produced, is used to provide a major part of the steam requirement for a steam turbine unit at the plant.

The result is that more power is generated with less fuel and water as a result of the combination than could be accomplished with the two units operating separately. So there is both fuel and water conservation.

Expanding on the intertie with Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tolk said that the 230,000 volt transmission line would run from Southwestern's Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, to Elk City, Oklahoma.

"We have been responsible for providing our own power resources since this company was formed. I'm happy to say that we have always had an adequate supply and ample reserves. This new tie will make us members of the Southwest Power Pool and will provide a market for any excess power we might have at off-peak times. It is conceivable that, by the process of transformation from one adjacent area to another, our excess off-peak capability will make it possible to help other companies meet their needs as far away as the east coast," Tolk pointed out.

Continuing on the reliability and capability to serve theme, Tolk went on to say that the company was projecting a 22% reserve margin of available power for the peak demand expected in the summer of 1972.
