The record number included 1,066 bachelor's, 192 master's and 29 doctor's degree graduates.

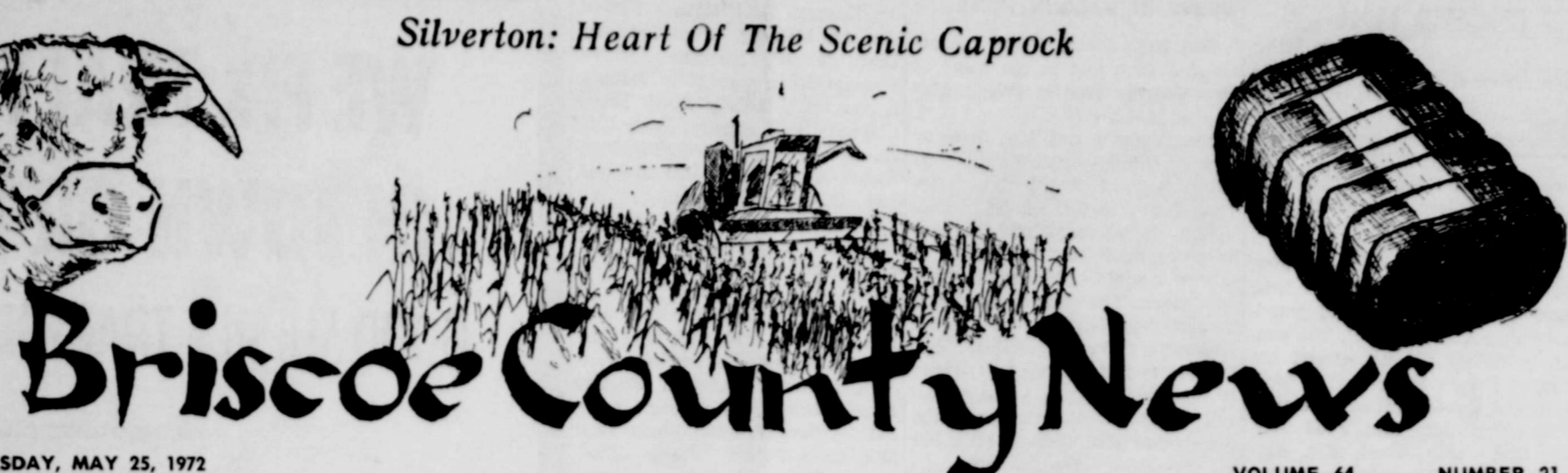
Tupin, who teaches in the Silvertown Schools, received the master's of education degree in physical education.

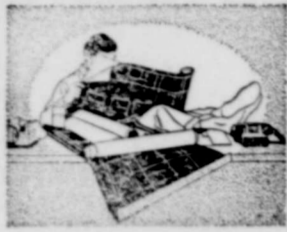

Guests were received by Mrs. Marble, the honoree and Mrs. M. M. Myers, mother of the prospective bridegroom. Cake and punch were served

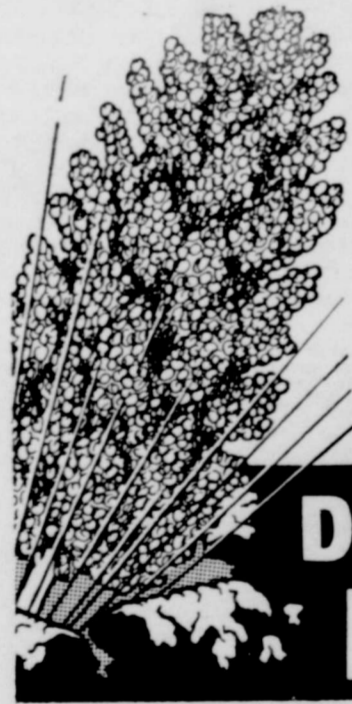
