Silverton Young Homemakers will sponsor a game night Saturday, June 24, at the Pioneer Room of the First State Bank.

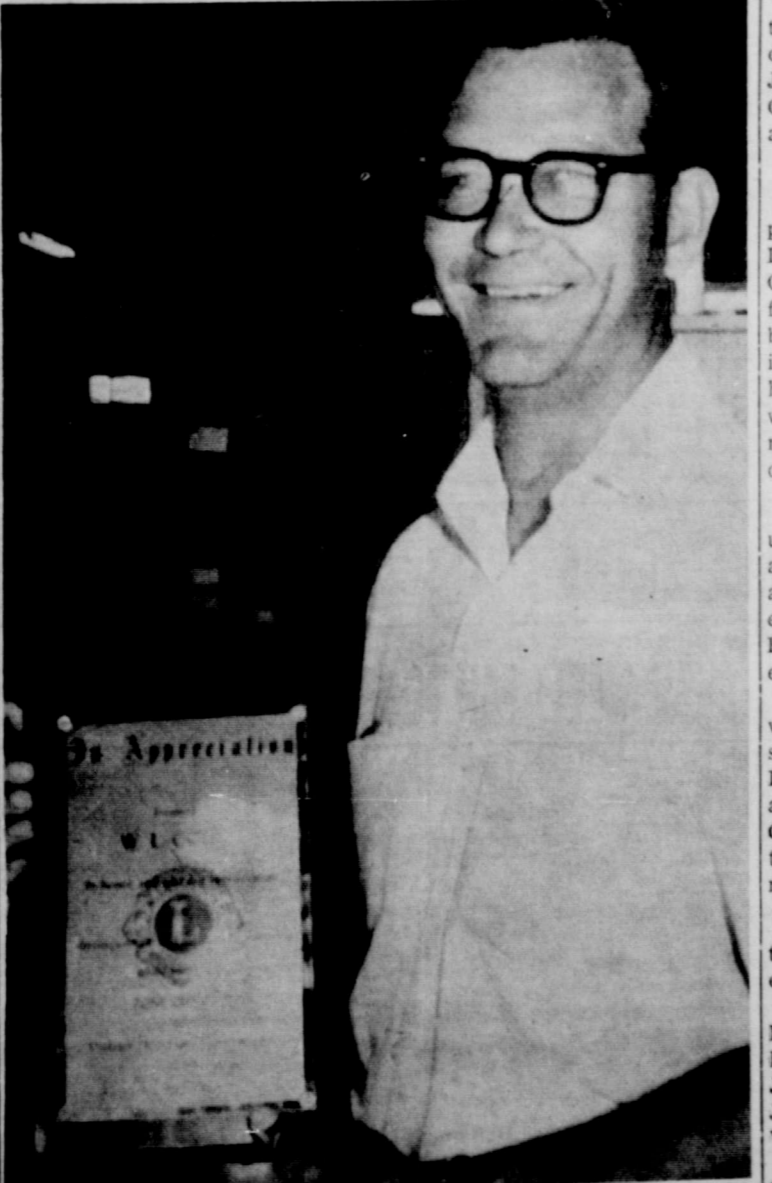

June 27 will be a red letter day for the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, when sealed bids are to be opened in the District Court Room of Swisher County Courthouse in Tulia at 2:00 p.m. It has been predicted that the session will be "short, tense and well attended."

Extensive interest in the project is expected among contractors since construction work of this nature is not booming at this time. It has been predicted by the engineering firm that there could be as many as 100 individuals from construction and affiliated trades present for the opening of bids.

Jim Nichols, a partner in the engineering firm of Freese, Nichols and Endress, estimates actual working time on the project to be 18 months, but adds that the firm which is awarded the bid may not be able to start construction for 60 days after June 27.

Queried further, he says that on similar dam projects the time span elapsing before an appreciable amount of water for usage was captured had ranged from "four months up to two years," depending on rainfall and regular flow of water through the watershed.

The Mackenzie Reservoir will be constructed seven miles northwest of Silverton.

It is to supply water, eventually, for Lockney, Floydada, Tulia and Silverton. With an average depth of over 40 feet and optimum depth of 90 feet, the lake is foreseen as having a minimal amount of evaporation loss.

All necessary land for the project has been secured.

**SCREWORM INVASION**

A "red alert" is being sounded throughout the state as screwworms continue to assault livestock and other animals. Briscoe County has recorded one case to date, and it's vital that all animals be inspected closely and regularly so that infestations can be pinpointed and treated with sterile flies.

Weather conditions were favorable for heavy screwworm build-ups last winter in northern Mexico as well as in parts of the Southwest. Some infestations were also spread by transporting infested livestock last fall, and the insect pest spent the mild winter in new quarters. This spring overall conditions were "ripe" for a massive screwworm invasion.

More than 4,200 cases have been confirmed in Texas this spring, the earliest and heaviest outbreak in the history of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

Although sterile fly production at the Mission Lab is running at its peak—200 million a week—treatment with these flies is not enough to stop the destructive, flesh-eating livestock pest. All livestock producers and owners of other animals (dogs, cats) are urged to follow certain precautions:

1. Carry out all approved preventative practices to help eliminate screwworms.
2. Inspect animals regularly and carefully and treat all wounds whether they are wormy or not.
3. Delay all surgery until cool weather this fall. Shearing, docking, castrating and dehorning only provide additional wounds for worm infestation. Studies show that almost 90% of all worm samples come from calf navels and man-made wounds.
4. Spray animals with an approved product before shipping them. This is a preventative measure against spreading the infestation.
5. Be cautious of livestock shipments coming from infested areas. If buying such animals, be sure to check them thoroughly for wormy wounds.
6. Care should be taken not to move infested livestock across state lines. Infestations resulting from this practice may bring about a quarantine and the regulated movement of livestock.
7. As soon as a wormy wound is found, send a worm sample to the Screwworm Laboratory, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572. If the case is positive, sterile flies will be dropped as soon as possible to further protect animals in the area.

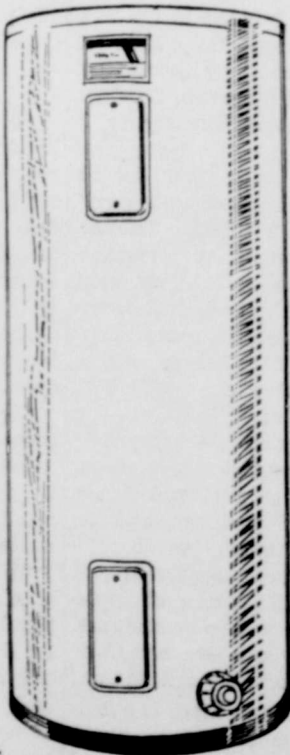

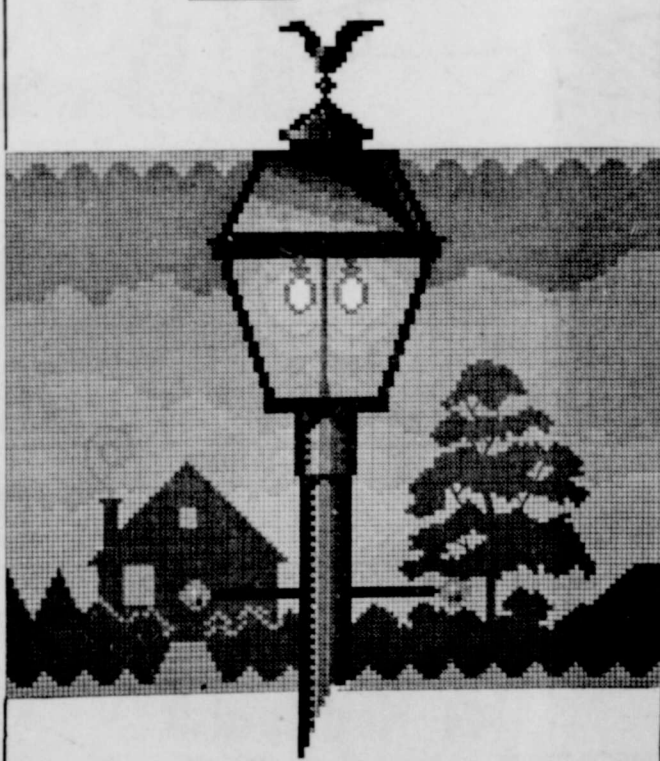
