Farmers Now Cashing Set-Aside Payments

Approximately 300 Briscoe County farmers are receiving farm set-aside program payments totaling \$375,000.00 during the first week of July, according to James E. Griffin, County Executive Director for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

By the end of the month, the total will be about \$1,000,000.00 to 500 farmers.

Nationwide, approximately 750,000 cotton, feed grain and wheat producers were mailed a total of \$850 million in expedited preliminary payments in time for the checks to arrive in producers' hands on July 1.

Payments under the set-aside programs are made to farmers who agree to set aside part of their land from production in order to meet a national objective of balancing supply and demand in certain commodities. These payments help to offset the loss of returns from cropland that otherwise would be used for income-yielding production, and on which the farmer is obliged to continue to pay taxes and apply needed conservation steps, according to officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Payments to producers are limited to \$55,000 per person

for each of three crops—feed grain, wheat and cotton—under the Agricultural Act of 1970.

Nationally total payments are expected to be about \$3.7 billion. Total 1972 farm set-aside program payments in Briscoe County are expected to be about \$2,312,337.00.

Feed grain producers in the nation ultimately will receive about \$1.9 billion, cotton producers about \$825 million, and wheat producers about \$1 billion. Preliminary payments to wheat producers are limited by law to 75% of final payments. Final wheat certificate payments will be made after December 1. Feed grain and cotton farmers may or may not get a final

payment, depending on market conditions.

The expedited farm program payments are made possible by streamlined procedures inaugurated in 1970 by ASCS. The action enabled farmers to receive the entire payment due them in the 1970 and 1971 programs six to eight weeks earlier than ever before.

These early payments help many producers reduce their need for long-term credit and cut the amount of interest paid. The flow of cash at this time will again be of major significance to rural communities and the U. S. agricultural economy, USDA officials said.

Seventeen young people and four adult workers from the Polk Street Methodist Church in Am-

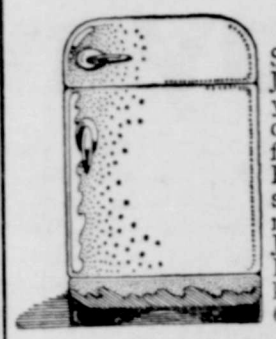

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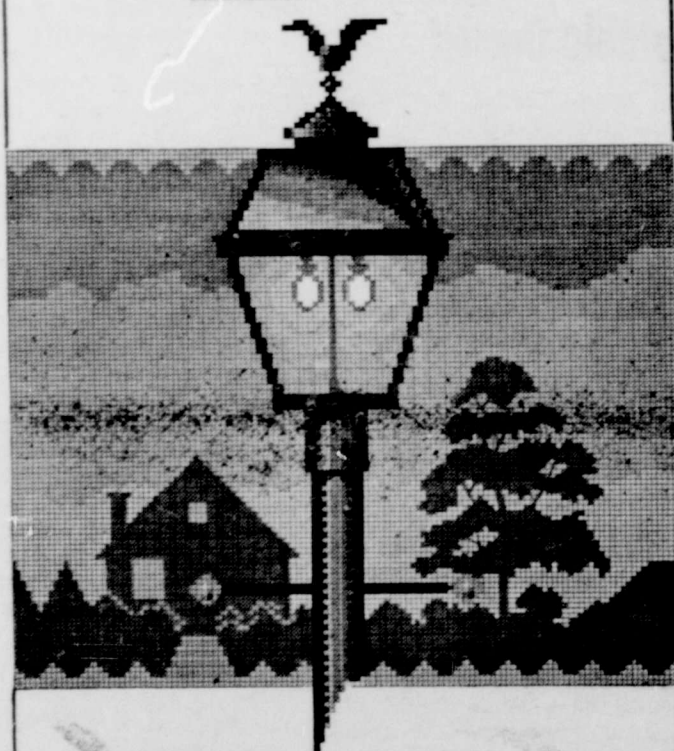
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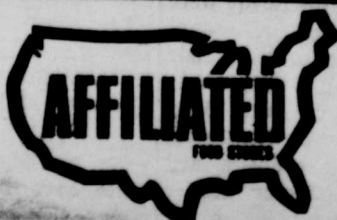

County 4-H'ers To Attend Electric Camp

Eight Briscoe County 4-H'ers will be among the approximately 120 4-H boys and girls from 14 South Plains counties who will be heading for Cloudcroft, New Mexico on Monday, July 10, for a fun-filled week of recreation and leadership training in electricity at Scott Able 4-H Camp.

The camp is sponsored annually by Southwestern Public Service Company, according to Billy C. Gunter and Mrs. Catherine B. Crawford, district agents with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which conducts the 4-H Club program.

The 4-H'ers who will attend from Briscoe County are Debbie Boling, Nanette Fitzgerald, Ty McMurtry, Christi Norheutt, Brenda Payne, Ken Sarchet, Gary Storie and Ken Wood. Jackie Johnson, County Agricultural Agent, and Mrs. Dorothy Powell, County Home Demonstration Agent, will accompany the 4-H members to the camp.

Company representatives will give instruction on lighting, house plan wiring, space age cooling and an electrical craft activity. Instructional material presented at these group sessions will be aimed toward developing method demonstrations on electricity and its use.

Organized recreation is scheduled throughout the week and a vesper service will conclude each day's activities.

This year the planning committee for the electric camp includes the 4-H Councils from Cochran, Hockley, Lamb and Bailey counties. Cochran County Extension Agents Roy McClung and Gail O'Neal are serving as agent advisors for the camp.

In addition to the district agents and agent advisors, others accompanying the group will include County Extension Agents and Adult 4-H Club Leaders from each of the participating counties. 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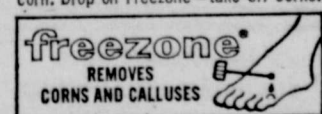

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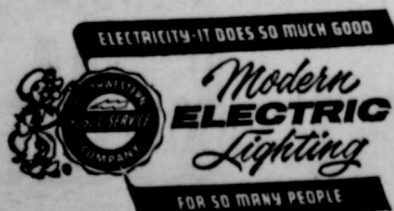

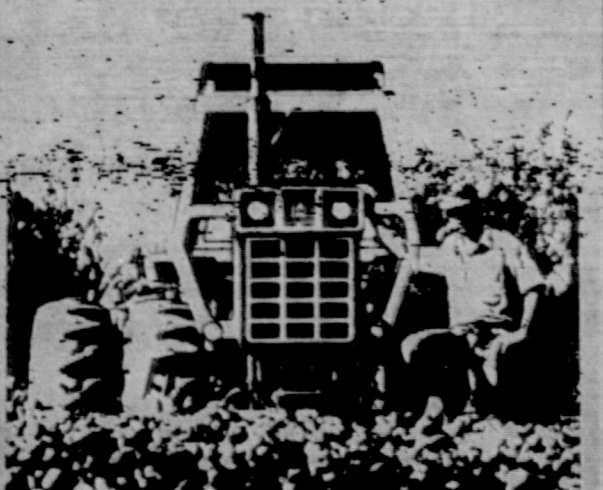
