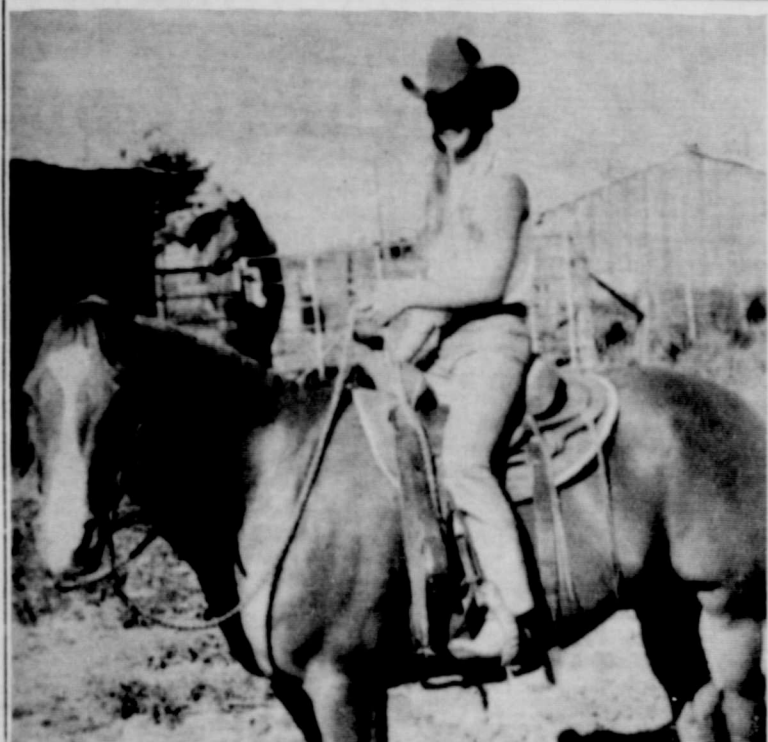

The final games of the summer baseball season will be played tonight, with the Little League winner to be decided in the game between the Blue Sox, coached by Doug Yarbrough and Bailey Loyd, and the White Sox, coached by Bud Couch. The teams presently are in a tie by virtue of losses by the White Sox to the Blue Sox and Gold Sox, and the two losses by the Blue Sox to the White Sox.

This will be the first time in a number of years that the championship will be decided in the final game of the season, and the last time this situation prevailed it was also between the White Sox and the Blue Sox.

Tuesday night the White Sox held onto their first-place tie with a 13-8 win over the Gold Sox. Pitching for the White Sox were Jacky Vaughn and Johnny Ortega. Bobby McPherson and Jimmy Wilson were the hurlers used by the Gold Sox.

The Texas Water Development Board, meeting in Corpus Christi Tuesday, approved changes in the plans for construction of the Mackenzie Water Project to be located seven miles northwest of Silvertown.

Instead of building a partial treatment plant to supply water to Silvertown, the Authority will provide Silvertown with underground water if it is needed before the project is finished.

The water group gave the Mackenzie Board authority to go ahead and build the dam and reservoir, and ground breaking for the project is expected in the near future.

Project officials will meet in Silvertown in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, July 28, to award the contract to Gilvin-Terrill, Inc. of Amarillo, which had the low bid of \$2,636,390 on June 27.

At the July 28 meeting the Authority will authorize issuance of bonds totaling \$3,000,060 and approve the 1972 tax roll.

Wheat Meeting Slated Here Monday Morning

Wheat production and management of stocker calves will be the topic of discussion at a meeting in the District Courtroom on the top floor of the Courthouse in Silvertown Monday morning, July 24, at 10:30 o'clock. This program will be held to help you with your wheat production and grazing problems.

Dr. J. R. Supak, Extension Area Agronomist, will discuss cultural practices regarding wheat production. New varieties, planting dates and rates, fertilization and irrigation will be included in the agronomic presentation.

Dr. J. C. Parrott, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, will cover management and nutrition of stocker cattle. His discussion will include treatment of incoming cattle, supplemental feeding and other management practices and problems associated with cattle grazing wheat pastures.

The specialists will be available after the meeting to answer questions and discuss specific problems.

The program, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is designed to furnish the latest information available on wheat production and stocker cattle management practices.

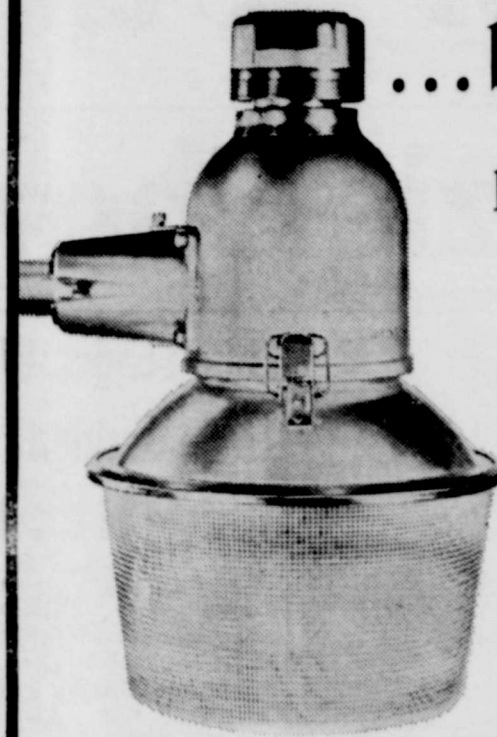

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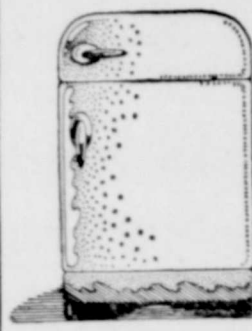

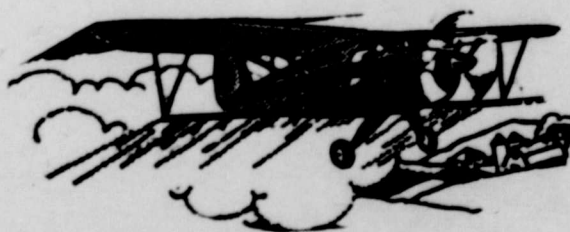

percent (1%) local sales and use
tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election
shall be held at one polling place
for all qualified voters of said
City, and the polling place and
presiding officers for said election
shall be, to-wit:

Polling Place Presiding Officers
City Hall Fern Holt
Silverton, Texas Presiding Judge
Diamond Williams
Alternate Presiding Judge
The Presiding Judge at such elec-
tion shall appoint two clerks.

Section 3. That said election
shall be held in accordance with
the Constitution and laws of the
State of Texas, and all duly qual-
ified resident electors of the City
of Silverton, Texas shall be qual-
ified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of
said election shall conform to the
requirements of Section 2, Sub-
section G, of Article 1066c, Ver-
non's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts
1967, 60th Legislature, Regular
Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and
to the requirements of Chapter 6
of the Election Code of the State
of Texas, as amended, and the
language to be printed thereon
shall include the following:

1028), which provides that a square
shall be placed beside each propo-
sition in which the voter is in-
structed to place an "X" or other
clear mark to indicate the way he
wishes to vote; but which also pro-
vides that failure of a voter to
mark his ballot in strict conform-
ity with the directions on the bal-
lot shall not invalidate the ballot,
and the ballot shall be counted if
the intention of the voter is clearly
ascertainable, except where the
law expressly prohibits the count-
ing of the ballot. It is specifically
provided that the election officers
shall not refuse to count a ballot
because of the voter's having mar-
ked his ballot by scratching out
the statement of proposition for
which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the
election hereby ordered and called
shall be given: (a) by publication
on the same day of two successive
weeks in a newspaper of general
circulation published within said
City, the date of the first publica-
tion to be at least twenty-one (21)
days prior to the date set herein
for such election; and (b) by post-
ing of such notice at the polling
place in each of the election pre-
cincts of the City not less than
twenty (20) days prior to the date
set herein for such election. It is
hereby found and determined that
the Briscoe County News is a news-
paper published within the City
of Silverton, Texas, and is a news-
paper of general circulation within
said City.

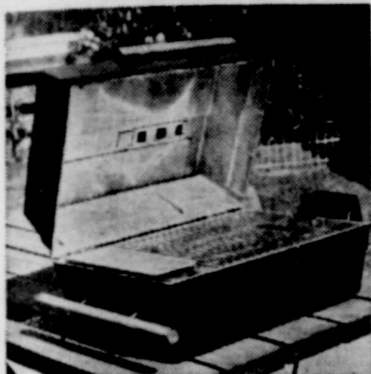
