Volunteer Firemen Attend School

Archie Ray Martin and Charlie Parker, members of the Silverton Volunteer Fire Department, attended the 43rd Annual Texas Firemen's Training School July 16-21 in College Station. The school, attended by nearly 1,500 men representing about 470 cities from approximately 20 states, was held on the Texas A&M University campus.

The key rate on fire insurance will be lowered 4% in Silverton because the two men attended this training school.

Firemen Martin and Parker were sponsored by the City of Silverton, Briscoe County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies who contributed toward their cost of the school. Since Silverton volunteer firemen are interested in attending this school to help do a better job of fire fighting and fire prevention, 80 County Farm Bureaus and the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies in the statewide program have helped sponsor 102 firemen at the school.

"The Farm Bureau Insurance Companies believe volunteer fire departments have been very effective in reducing the amount of loss involved by fire in rural areas," said President J. T. (Red) Woodson of Gober. "It is our hope that our help in sponsoring this program will help the Silverton Volunteer Fire Department to better serve the residents of Briscoe County."

The Silverton Volunteer Fire Department is in the process of raising money to pay for a new wagon which will cost \$4,000. The firemen have given up their pay so it can apply on this purchase.

CLINIC ASSOCIATION RECEIVES CHECK FROM COGDELL ESTATE

Early this week the Briscoe County Clinic Association received a check for \$120,000 from the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust to build and maintain a new clinic and to buy a new ambulance for the Volunteer Ambulance Association.

In a meeting Tuesday, the Clinic

board discussed plans for the new building. They will be meeting with an architect soon and will be selecting and purchasing a location for the new clinic.

The board decided to give the ambulance association \$10,000 with which to purchase an ambulance. The ambulance association had been looking at vehicles, and after discussing the situation with other ambulance services, it was decided to buy a heavy-type vehicle for the comfort of the patient and for handling ability due to the distance traveled to hospitals. It has been determined that a fully-equipped ambulance of this type will cost \$13,000 to \$14,000.

The ambulance association will now have to decide whether to buy a smaller and lighter-weight vehicle or to try to raise the rest of the money to buy the better ambulance.

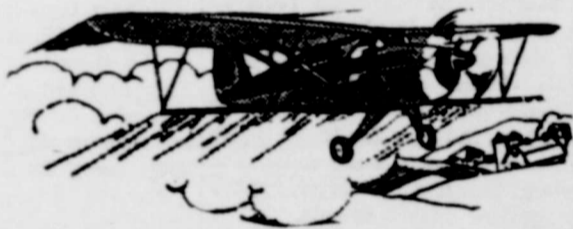
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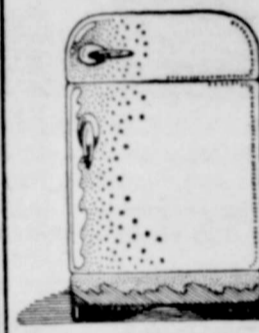

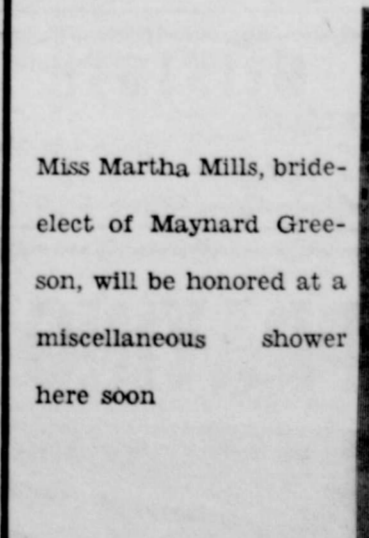
