sales tax would be used primarily for street maintenance and repair that is required in the near future. Approximately \$22,000 is needed mmediately for street repair.

Some 64 blocks of city paving is to be seal coated soon.

Councilmen also hope that residents will adopt the city sales tax to make possible the purchase of badly - needed equipment for repairing the city's streets and alleys. For years the city has been needing a grader with which to keep streets and alleys repaired without having to wait until a rain when the County Commissioners can bring a maintainer to town.

The cost of keeping up the city's streets continues to rise along with everything else. It cost the city about \$300 to repair the intersection east of the First Baptist Church-but it needed it badly, and there are several other intersections which need it also. The City Council is asking that the people of Silverton approve a 1% sales tax on August 19th. It is a fair tax, in that everyone - both property - owners and non - property - owners -- pay a small portion of this tax.


Silverton must have more money for operation. The cost of labor and equipment for essential services has been greatly increased in the past few years, while Silverton remains with the same property evaluation arrived at several years ago.

The City does not have sufficient funds for street maintenance and repair that will be required in the near future, with approximately \$22,000.00 needed immediately for street work.

A City sales tax will apply only to those items already covered by the state sales tax. Food, drugs, etc. will not be taxed. Collection and remittance of the tax will not require additional work on the part of our local merchants, as the tax will be collected and remitted to the state along with the state sales tax. Then once each quarter the State Comptroller's office will compute and remit this amount directly to the City in one check.

Talk it to your neighbors and friends, and help Silverton remain self-sufficient.





Although screwworms have been reported near the Louisiana border in far East Texas, there have not as yet been any cases confirmed this year from Louisiana or Arkansas.

The National Screwworm Production facility at Mission, Texas has been at maximum production since the first of May this year. The average sterile fly release since that time has been nearly 200 million per week, whereas prior to the first of May, the average weekly production was about 120 million per week.

It was apparent by the end of 1971 that additional funds would be necessary in order to prevent a spring buildup of screwworms in the United States and particularly in Texas, as screwworms migrate north from Mexico naturally in the spring. It was also apparent that any delay in receiving additional funds after the spring buildup began, coupled with favorable weather conditions, could very likely result in the spread of screwworms throughout most of the southwestern United States.

The spring buildup began about a month earlier than usual this year due to an exceptionally mild winter in northeastern Mexico and in south Texas. By the time additional funds became available to allow the plant at Mission to increase production of sterile flies to the maximum, screwworms had migrated north from Mexico and invaded more than half of Texas -as well as southern Arizona.

Weather conditions in northern Mexico and over most of the southwest United States have remained exceptionally favorable for screwworm propagation on into the summer. Screwworms have continued to spread into previously free areas and the southwest United States is now experiencing the worst outbreak since 1961, which was one year prior to the inception of the screwworm eradication program.

The theory of eradication of screwworms with the sterile male technique is to release a large enough number of sterile male screwworm flies over a vast area to outnumber or overwhelm the native male screwworm population in that area. Enough of the female screwworm flies, which only breed once in their lifetime, may then mate with sterile males, resulting in a significant reduction in the native fly population. As heavy as the screwworm infestation is in Texas at the present time, eradication of screwworms would take at least four to six months of weekly releases of sterile screwworm flies in sufficient numbers.


# OUR USE OF LEISURE




