According to Dr. Jack Gipson, field day chairman, visitors will have an opportunity to see, firsthand, the extensive research program that is underway to find cotton varieties more suitable for the on weed control and harvesting.

"One of the things we are looking at this year in our field plots is dryland production of narrowrow cotton," points out Dr. Levon Ray, with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, who heads up the cotton breeding research program at the Center.

Elmer Hudspeth, engineer with USDA's Agricultural Research Service, notes that dryland narrow-row cotton at the Cener is being cultivated to control weeds. Weed control has been one of the problems of this type of production system.

"We are continuing to look closely at narrow-row cotton as a means of increasing production on the Plains," say the two researchers. Narrow-rows have increased

SERVICES PROVIDED BY EASTER SEAL SOCIETY FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN, ADULTS

The Texas Easter Seal Society can provide the following services for handicapped persons who cannot afford to pay all or part of the costs involved* and who are not eligible for help from any other resource-public or private.

1. Assistance in paying for physi cal, occupational, and speech therapy when it is prescribed by a medical doctor.

2. Pay for special diagnostic ealuation (such as orthopedic, audiological, language and psychological).

3. Purchase orthopedic equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, braces, etc., when pre scribed by a medical doctor. (There is a \$200 limit placed on artificial limbs This \$200 is to be used as "seed money" and hope fully will be matched by local resources such as individuals, service clubs, sororities, foundations,

4. Help to defray transportation costs* for treatment or evaluation when the family is unable to meet these costs. This is determined by paying 30c per gallon-based on 10 miles per gallon, figured on a round trip basis-or by purchasing round trip bus tickets.

5. Assist families and individuals to reach the right person or agency to obtain help the Easter Seal Society of Texas cannot provide. People are often eligible for services from public or private agencies but do not know the person, eligibility requirements, or place to obtain the services needed. Perhaps the Texas Easter Seal Society does.

*A limit of \$150 per client per year for therapy and \$150 for transportation has been set except in unusual cases requiring special attention. This limit can be exceeded only with the permission of the Treatment and Service Committee of the State Board.

All services must be authorized before being rendered by the Treatment and Service Department of the Texas Easter Seal Society.





If ornamental plants around your home are yellowing between the leaf veins, iron deficiency in the soil is the likely problem.

Iron deficiency causes the leaves of ornamental plants to become light green, yellow or white between the veins. Iron chlorosis, as the condition is called, also causes the needles or scales of conifers to turn yellow. The more severe the deficiency, the paler the color. In extreme cases, the plant turns brown and eventually dies.

Apply iron at the first sign of deficiency. Iron-containing matersoil around the base of the plant or be dissolved in water and sprayed onto the foliage. Follow the manufacturer's directions and suggested rate of application. In severe cases, plant recovery will be slow following applications.

Soil conditions which block the availability of iron may also have similar effects on other elements. Soil that delivers less than adequate zinc may promote weak terminal growth. This "witchesbroom" type growth may be thin and short. Zinc deficiency shows flowering quince and apple trees, as well as in pyracantha.

Plants with zinc deficiency will also have light green to yellow leaves that are small, distorted or puckered. Small dead areas may appear on the leaf margins and fall out to give a jagged appear

Zinc sulfate or zinc chelate applied to the manufacturer's recommended rate will correct zinc de ficiencies. Other factors may bring on sym-

ptoms in plants similar to those of iron or zinc deficiency. Either over - watering or drought may cause yellowing of foliage of certain plant varieties. Heavy or compacted soils also cause yellowing, as do infestations of mites or leafhoppers. Insect infestations actually give a plant the appearance of iron chlorosis. For these reasons, examine the plant carefully for things that might be causing the discoloration before buying and applying either iron or zinc.

Additional moisture will especially be needed on light soils that store limited water or in areas which did not receive ample rainfall.

This cotton has used little moisture until recent growth; therefore, soil moisture conditions should be good. 




