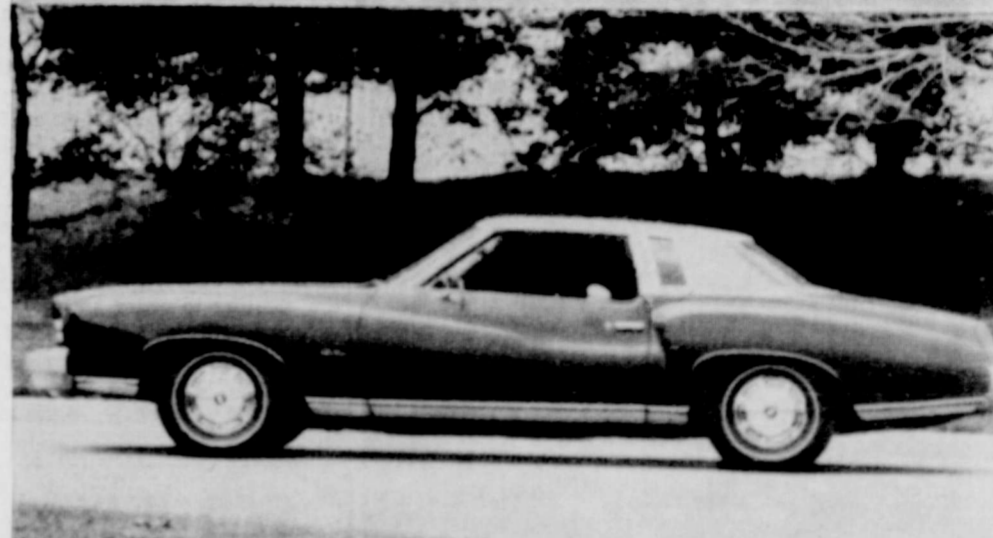

This resulted in Congress not being able to act when the situation did get out of control and forced the government to spend a half million dollars in emergency funds.
