



ORDINANCE NO. 260 CONCERNING METER CHARGES FOR THE CITY OF SILVERTON

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE CHARGES FOR AND CON-DITIONS OF A FEE TO BE PAID BEFORE A WATER TAP CAN BE MADE TO ANY CITY WATER LINE, PROVIDING EFFECTIVE DATE, CONTAINING A REPEAL NG CLAUSE AND DECLARNG AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Silverton does not now charge for making a meter tap to the city water lines: and

WHEREAS, the City's cost for making a 34 inch water tap is ap-

proximately \$80.00; and WHEREAS, it is in the pulic interest and welfare to set a fee for a person to have a water tap made; NOW THEREFORE, BE IT OR-DAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL

OF THE CITY OF SILVERTON: SECTION 1: That after October 9, 1972, no person shall tap or have tapped a City water line, without first appearing at the City Hall in Silverton, Texas, and obtaining a permit from the City of Silverton and paying all due fees therefor.

SECTION 2. A fee of \$80.00 shall be charged by the City for a 3/4 inch meter tap, and any person who requires a meter tap larger than 34 inch shall be charged an additional fee, which addition- LONGHORN LB al fee shall be the difference in the cost of making a 34 inch meter tap, and the cost of making the size meter tap requested.

SECTION 3. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions LONGHORN of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed USDA

\$200.00. SECTION 4. All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict only. USDA SECTION 5. WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government and public sa- USDA fety that requires this ordinance to become effective at once; therefore, upon the passage of this ordinance by a vote of at least five members of the Council, it shall be effective from and after the date






