PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Con-stitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 61. All district offi-cers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, ac-cording to the then last preced-ing Federal Consus, shall be compensated on a salary basis. Is all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whe-ther precinct officers shall be compensated on a sfee basis or on a salary basis, with the er-ception that it shall be manda-tory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all jus-tices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenon a salary basis, with the ex-ception that it shall be manda-tory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twen-ty thousand (20,000), accord-ing to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commis-sioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be man-datory upon the Commission-ers Courts to compensate all aheriffs, deputy sheriffs, coun-ty law enforcement officers in-



BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. The Legislature, at any regular session, or at any special session when the matter is included within the purposes for which the session is con-vened, may propose amend-ments revising the Constitu-tion, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as de-fined in the Constitution and statutes of this State. The date of the elections shall be speci-fied by the Legislature. The proposal for submission must be approved by a vote of two-thirds of all the members electbe approved by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elect-ed to each House, entered by yeas and nays on the journals. "A brief explanatory state-ment of the nature of a pro-posed amendment, together with the date of the election and the wording of the pro-position as it is to appear on the ballot, shall be published twice in each newspaper in the State which meets require-ments act by the Legislature for the publication of official notices of officers and depart-ments of the state government. The explanatory statement shall be prepared by the Secre-tary of State and shall be ap-proved by the Attorney Gen-eral. The Secretary of State shall send a full and complete copy of the proposed amendments to each ments or amendments to each and the wording of the pro-position as it is to appear on the ballot, shall be published twice in each newspaper in the State which meets require-for the publication of official notices of officers and depart-ments of the state government.
