A native of Miami, Texas, Coffee grew up on the Bar-C Ranch in the late 1890's and early 1900's just a pasture away from Adobe Walls. The Old West trading post was made famous by two Indian battles, the last one fought in 1874.

In that fight between a group of buffalo hunters, the store-keepr and the Indians, Indian scouthunter Billy Dixon won a niche for himself in Panhandle history. "I knew Billy Dixon," says Cof-

fee. "In fact. I went to school with most of his children." Dixon won fame in the battle with a shot that killed one of three Indians on a ridge a mile

from the beseiged trading post. Dixon lived in the Miami area for a number of years, before setting up a store at Plemens in

Hutchinson County, Coffee adds. Coffee and his wife, who were newly-weds in 1916, left Miami that year and moved to Dallas. They were there four years before a second move to Denver, Colorado, and then in 1924 they moved back to the Texas Panhandle and settled at Pampa.

After two years, they came to Silverton where Coffee took over as manager of a lumber yard. He later owned a hardware store and a dry goods firm.

The Coffees moved to Dumas in 1960 because "we liked the coun-






