

Don't wait to express support of MAHD clinic expansion

When was the last time you sat down and thought about where you wanted to receive your primary medical care?

When was the last time you complained about having to drive to Lubbock for something you wished... truly wished, was available in Muleshoe?

If you're like we are, the thought arises about half the time we point a vehicle down Hwy. 84.

The unfortunate truth is that not all of the medical procedures required by patients in the Muleshoe area are available here. It's not because local physicians don't care about you... or even that the Muleshoe Area Hospital District, or its rural health clinic, doesn't want your business, it's just that a decision to add services can't be made arbitrarily.

Any type of medical expansion costs money. Money for land, construction, medical equipment and personnel.

This is the issue faced by the MAHD board of directors. Expanding the hospital district's rural health clinic has great potential for the district, but while the intent of receiving a higher medicare reimbursement is a valid reason for such an expansion, the ability... and need to serve more Muleshoe area residents locally is an even better

Economic issues for medical institutions are tough, both for the care providers at the far end of the Hwy. 84 corridor, and even tougher for those at this end.

If area residents want local medical, and especially emergency medical services, in the future, they have to support the hospital district and its efforts to provide such now.

Even Johnny Appleseed couldn't plant today and expect to pick fruit tomorrow.
