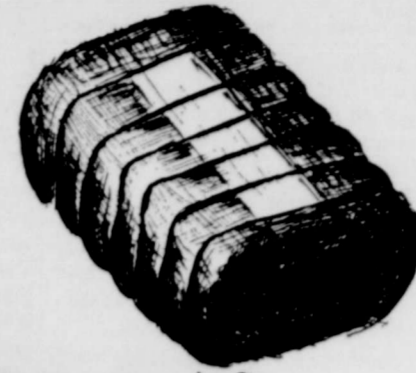
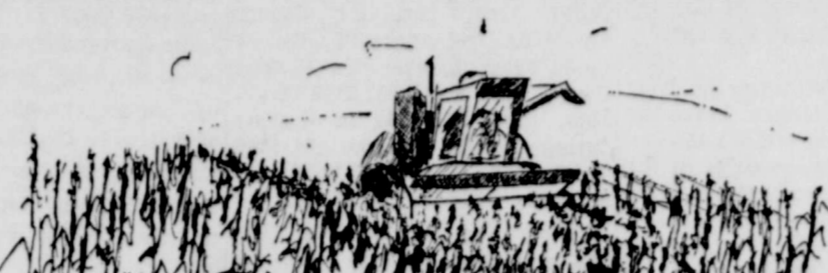

 Other survivors include a daughter, Miss Margaret Golden of Plainview and a brother, Herbert Golden of Canyon.

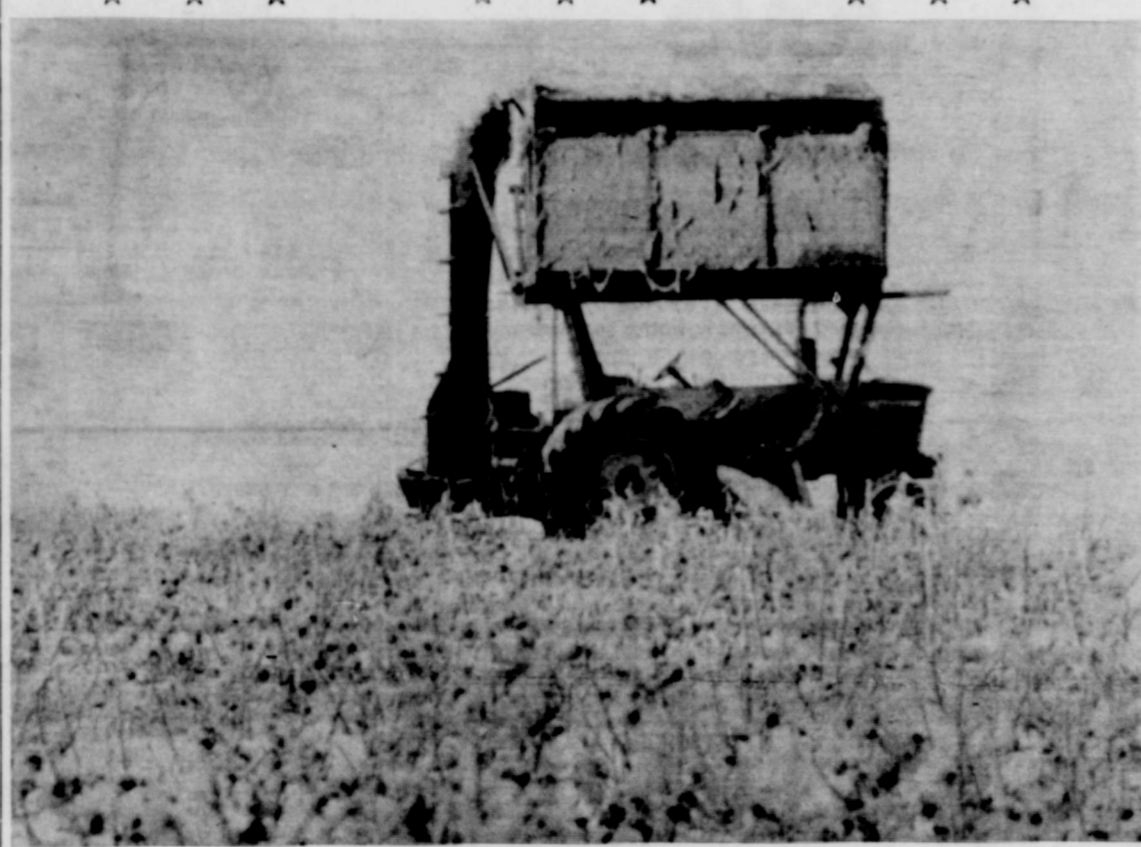

Young Farmers Host Open Meeting

Silverton Young Farmers held a breakfast meeting Friday, January 5 at the City Cafe.

Guest speaker for the meeting was James Griffin, Briscoe County ASCS office manager.

Griffin discussed the R.E.A.P. program and stated that as of December 22 the R.E.A.P. program for Briscoe County was cut \$50,000 to \$55,000. There could be a possible personal cut. A court case on President Nixon's power to cut this program is coming up in the near future. The legislature is also trying to limit the President's power over such matters.

The 1973 farm program was discussed. Griffin stated that the cotton program was cut 13%. There will be no allowance for set aside land. Payment on cotton on the price support will be 15c times yield.

On the grain sorghum program, there are two choices: (1) leave out 30% on set aside and receive 33c a bushel times yield times half of base allotment or (2) set aside 15% and draw 23c a bushel times yield times half of base allotment and be restricted on harvest. The grain sorghum program was cut 57% from 1972.

The wheat allotment is down 11% from that of last year, stated Griffin.

Waiting Period For Disability Benefits Has Been Reduced

The new social security law will reduce the six-month waiting period for disability benefits to five months, effective in January, according to Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager in Amarillo.

The first benefit will be payable for the sixth month of disability, rather than for the seventh month of disability as under present law.

"For example," Briggs said, "a worker disabled on January 15, 1973, can begin getting benefits for July 1973, with the check for July delivered in early August. Previously his benefits would begin for August with the check delivered in September."

The new provision will also affect disabled widows and dependent widowers who are eligible for benefits on the basis of disability.

In 1973, the new law will mean \$108 million in additional benefits to 950,000 disabled workers and their families, according to Briggs.

"Reducing the waiting period by one month will help to relieve some of the financial hardships faced by disabled people who have little or no savings or other resources to fall back on," Briggs said.

Social security pays monthly benefits to eligible workers and their families if the worker is severely disabled and expected to be unable to work for a year or more.

More than 1.7 million disabled workers and 1.3 million dependents get \$389 million a month in social security benefits.

The 1973 Briscoe County Livestock Show will be held Saturday, January 13th at the County Show Barn in Silverton. The judging will get underway at 10:00 a.m.

Judge for this year's show will be Doyle Warren, County Agricultural Agent from Floyd County.

The stock show is an annual event held for the 4-H and F.F.A. members in the county to exhibit their livestock projects. The show is being sponsored this year by the Caprock Soil Conservation District and the Briscoe County Livestock Show Association.

The judging schedule includes five classes of market barrows, four classes of market lambs, two classes of market steers. Champions and reserve champions will also be selected in each of the three divisions. A showmanship award will also be presented to the best showmen in each of the three divisions.

All of the lambs and barrows will arrive at the show barn on Friday afternoon. The rules require that they be entered and weighed in by 6:00 p.m. on Friday, January 12. The steers may be weighed in on Friday afternoon or may be weighed in by 8:00 a.m. Saturday. A concession stand will also be available during the show.

Everyone is invited to attend the annual livestock show.

The final Livestock Show Committee meeting is scheduled for 6:30 a.m. Thursday, January 11, at the City Cafe.

New License Plate Time Approaching

Renewal applications for 1973 auto license plates are in the mail from the Texas Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division.

The entire application may be returned by mail to the tax assessor-collector in counties of registration with an added \$1.00 fee for handling and mailing.

Highway Department representatives caution:

★Leave the three-part form intact. . . Don't separate the three cards.

★Mail it to the resident county office.

★Include money for the amount of the registration fee, plus the mail-handling fee.

Applications may be put in the mail anytime after January 1, but no license plates will be sent out before February 1. About 30 days should be allowed for return of the plates after the application is received.

April 1 is the deadline for displaying the 1973 plates. In-person registration starts at county tax offices and special substations on February 1.

The VA Insurance Office has no choice but to pay the beneficiary named in writing by the policyholder, and is obligated by law to pay the proceeds to the beneficiary of record.

Every veteran should know who is the beneficiary of his government life insurance, and all veterans with government policies are urged to check their policies and be sure that the beneficiary of record is up-to-date. Otherwise, a mother or former wife may get the money the veteran's widow expects. Any veteran who wants to change his beneficiary, or to ascertain whom he has listed as beneficiary, should contact the VA Insurance Center to which he pays his premium. The insurance numbers, as well as the veteran's full name and address should be included.

The Veterans County Service Office located at the courthouse in Tulia is available to assist veterans in this matter.

VETERANS SHOULD INFORM INSURANCE OFFICE IF BENEFICIARY TO BE CHANGED

A recent survey reveals that many beneficiaries listed on GI Insurance policies are not in line with the veteran's current wishes. In many cases, a widow who assumes she is the beneficiary, learns for the first time that the insurance does not go to her, but to her husband's mother, or former wife. In most cases, this results in a hardship for the widow and young children.

According to Henry Teubel, Veterans Service Officer for Swisher and Briscoe counties, the cause of the problem is that the veteran simply never got around to naming his wife as beneficiary. In a typical case, the veteran named his mother as beneficiary when he first took out his policy upon entering service, and when he eventually married, he forgot to inform the insurance office to change his beneficiary. When the veteran died, the policy still designated his mother to receive \$10,000 in insurance. In some cases, the name of a former wife, long divorced from the veteran, will receive the insurance instead of the widow because the veteran failed to change his beneficiary

TEXAS MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM

Participation Ordinance No. 262
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE TEXAS MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM BY THE CITY OF SILVERTON, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, the Constitution of the State of Texas was amended on November 7, 1944, by the addition of Section 51-f, Article III, which authorized the Legislature to establish a state-wide retirement and disability pension system for city employees;

WHEREAS, Chapter 75, Acts 50th Legislature (1947) as amended, established the Texas Municipal Retirement System, and authorizes the governing body of each city or town to elect, at its option, to have one or more of the city departments participate in such System; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Silvertown, Texas, finds that it will be in the public interest for the city to have its employees participate in the Texas Municipal Retirement System as hereinafter provided; Now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF SILVERTON, TEXAS:

Section 1: That, on behalf of the City of Silvertown, Texas, the City Council hereby exercises its option and elects to have the city and all of the employees of all departments now existing or hereafter established participate in the Texas Municipal Retirement System as provided in Chapter 75, Acts of the 50th Legislature, as amended, (Article 6243h of Vernon's Civil Statutes of Texas); and all of the benefits and obligations of such System are hereby accepted as to such employees.

Section 2: The Mayor is hereby directed to notify the Board of Trustees of the Texas Municipal Retirement System that the City of Silvertown, Texas, has elected to participate and have the employees of the above departments participate in said System.

Section 3: Each person who becomes an employee of any participating department on or after the effective date of participation of such department shall become a member of the Texas Municipal Retirement System as a condition of his employment. The City of Silvertown, Texas, may in the future refuse to add new departments or new employees to such System, but shall never discontinue as to any participants.

Section 4: In accordance with the provisions of the statute, the deposits to be made to the Texas Municipal Retirement System on account of current service of the employees of the several participating departments are hereby fixed at the rate of five percent (5%) of the earnings of each employee of said departments, and in determining the deposits to be made on account of such service the maximum earnings of this city is Full Salary.

Section 5: The City Secretary is hereby directed to remit to the Board of Trustees of the Texas Municipal Retirement System, at its office in Austin, Texas, the city's contributions to the System and the amounts which shall be deducted from the compensation or payroll of employees, all as required by said Board under the provisions of Chapter 75, Acts of the 50th Legislature of the State of Texas, as amended, and the said City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to ascertain and certify officially on behalf of the City of Silvertown, Texas, the prior service rendered to the said municipality by each of the employees of the participating departments, and the average prior service compensation received by each, and to make and execute all prior service certifications and all other reports and certifications which may be required of the City of Silvertown, Texas, under the provisions of Chapter 75, Acts Regular Session, 50th Legislature, as amended, or in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Trustees of the Texas Municipal Retirement System.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE SUPPLEMENTAL BENEFITS FUND OF THE TEXAS MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM BY ALL DEPARTMENTS OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT WHICH NOW PARTICIPATE IN THE TEXAS MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM; AND PROVIDING FOR PAYMENT OF THE CITY'S CONTRIBUTIONS ON ACCOUNT OF SUCH PARTICIPATION.

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Silvertown, Texas has heretofore elected to have the employees of all departments of the city government participate in the Texas Municipal Retirement System (such departments being heretofore called "participating departments"); and

WHEREAS, Chapter 312, Acts Regular Session, 56th Legislature provides for establishment in said System of a Supplemental Benefits Fund to provide for additional disability benefits for service connected disabilities, and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Silvertown, Texas finds that it will be in the public interest to provide for participation of employees of such departments in said Supplemental Benefits Fund; Now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF SILVERTON, TEXAS:

Section 1: The City of Silvertown, Texas, by its City Council hereby elects to have the employees of all participating departments of said city (as above defined) participate in and be covered by the Supplemental Benefits Fund of the Texas Municipal Retirement System, as provided by Chapter 312, Acts Regular Session, 56th Legislature; and all the benefits and obligations of participation in said Fund are hereby accepted by the city as to such employees.

Section 2: The Mayor is hereby directed to notify the Board of Trustees of the Texas Municipal Retirement System that the City of Silvertown, Texas, has elected to participate and have the employees of the above mentioned departments participate in the Supplemental Benefits Fund of said System.

Section 3: Each person who becomes an employee of any participating department on or after the effective date of participation of such department in said Fund shall as a condition of his employment be covered into the Supplemental Benefits Fund of said System. The City of Silvertown, Texas, may in the future refuse to add new departments or new employees to said Fund, but shall never discontinue as to any members who are covered into the Fund.

Section 4: The City Secretary is hereby directed to remit monthly to the Board of Trustees of the Texas Municipal Retirement System at its office in Austin, Texas, as the City's contributions to the Supplemental Benefits Fund of the Texas Municipal Retirement System, such percentage of earnings of the above-mentioned employees said City as may be fixed by the Board of Trustees of the Texas Municipal Retirement System, provided that the rate of contribution to said Fund shall not exceed one-half of one percentum (1/2%) of the earnings of the employees of said city who are covered under said Fund; and such official shall make for the City such reports as the Board of Trustees of the Texas Municipal Retirement System may prescribe.

Section 5: Participation of the above-mentioned employees in the Supplemental Benefits Fund shall be effective January 1, 1973.

Anything goes in fabrics for

winter except spots and stains. Removing spots and stains from clothing is a foremost cause of concern for many individuals, according to Mrs. Becky Culp, Texas

Agricultural Service clothing specialist. "Although today's fashion picture calls for interesting combinations of pattern on pattern, textured effects and bold colorations, the presence of a stain that meets the above requirements—and is prominently displayed on a favorite garment—is not the latest vogue," Mrs. Culp observed.

Furthermore, clothing discarded due to improper or inadequate stain removal methods means a mounting expense to consumers—

totaling a substantial drain on the clothing dollar. "Sophisticated fibers, dyes, finishes, and even stains create problems in effectively caring for clothing items," the Texas A&M University specialist noted.

Mrs. Culp recommended prompt action when a garment becomes stained. Aging makes stain removal more difficult and may permanently set the stain. For drycleanables, take the garment to a reputable cleaner. Identify the stain by location, and if possible, the exact cause of the stain. For washable items, prompt laundering procedures will remove the majority of most common stains. Stain removal charts are valuable aids for prompt attention and removal of known stains. "In caring for washable clothing of family members, the homemaker is often unsure of the nature of a stain. By following a sequence of procedures—beginning with the mildest—stains may be removed before they become permanently set or before the garment is damaged through too harsh treatments," Mrs. Culp explained.

"Next—if the stain still remains—soak the garment overnight using a laundry additive designed for presoaking," she added.

"If that is ineffective, launder in the hottest water suitable for the fabric."

Greasy stains, such as paint and asphalt, may be removed by sponging with a safe spot remover such as perchlorethylene or trichloroethane, she noted.

Use removers carefully and follow manufacturer's directions. Always test by first applying to a hidden part of the garment, such as a hem, to determine if the remover damages the fiber or changes the color or appearance of the fabric, Mrs. Culp cautioned.

As a final effort in removing a "mystery" stain, apply liquid bleach—suitable for the fabric and mixed in equal parts with water—to the stain with an eye dropper. Repeat if necessary and launder.

"Some stains are more difficult than others to remove. A procedure may need to be repeated several times if the stain is lightened the first try," the clothing specialist advised.

"Promptness, patience and perseverance are the keys to stain removal. If a garment is worth saving, it's also worth a little extra time and effort to follow stain-removal procedures that will remove the stain without permanent damage to the garment."

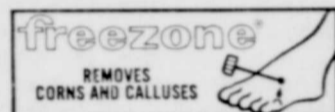
