Carl L. Tidwell, secretary-treasurer and manager of Silverton Elevators, Inc., is entitled to receive payment of a policy the Silverton Elevators bought against Republic Insurance Company.

Tidwell, who lived in a house supplied him by the firm, lost household furnishings in a tornado in 1970.

A UPI story said that Republic contended the policy issued to the grain elevator covered the house but not the household goods personally owned by Tidwell.

Trial testimony showed the Re public agent knew Tidwell's personal property was inside the residence, and that he told Tidwell it would be insured.




