School Calendar Announced for 73-74

According to a recent announcement by Silverton School Superintendent O. C. Rampley, the 1973-1974 school term will begin here on Monday, August 20. Five days of teacher in-service training will precede the school's opening, August 13-17.

The first day designated as a school holiday is Monday, September 3. November 22-23 are designated as Thanksgiving holidays; December 24-31 are set aside as Christmas vacation; January 1 is the New Year holiday, and April 25 is the Easter holiday.

Other days set aside for teacher in-service training are Friday, November 9, Friday, February 15, Friday, March 29, and May 17-18.

First semester tests are scheduled December 20-21, a second semester tests are planned May 15-16, 1974. Graduation is scheduled for May 17, 1974.

This calendar provides for a 180-day school year for the students and ten in-service days for the teachers.

Residents Awakened Early Sunday

Silverton residents were jolted out of bed about 4:30 a.m. Sunday by the take-cover tornado warning sirens.

City Marshall O. C. Maples had been watching the clouds west of town, and about the same time that he alerted the Silverton Volunteer Fire Department to man the weather warning network, word came in over his police radio that a tornado had hit the City of Plainview. In the past, tornadoes that hit Plainview have either hit or passed over or near Silverton, travelling on a fairly straight line to the northeast. Had this tornado, which was travelling on the ground at twenty miles per hour, followed its ground course rather than disappearing back into the clouds, it was thought it would probably have hit the north part of Silverton.

The last tornado that hit Plainview also hit Silverton on April 16, 1970.

Top Winners Named In 4-H Contests

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Silverton Man Wins Supreme Court Case

A Silverton man was awarded \$3,000 by the Texas Supreme Court on Wednesday of last week in a three-year-old damage suit for loss of household goods in a tornado, despite the fact that the insurance policy was not in his name.

Carl L. Tidwell, secretary-treasurer and manager of Silverton Elevators, Inc., is entitled to receive payment of a policy the Silverton Elevators bought against Republic Insurance Company.

Tidwell, who lived in a house supplied him by the firm, lost household furnishings in a tornado in 1970.

A UPI story said that Republic contended the policy issued to the grain elevator covered the house but not the household goods personally owned by Tidwell.

Trial testimony showed the Republic agent knew Tidwell's personal property was inside the residence, and that he told Tidwell it would be insured.

Mrs. Tidwell said last week that they were forced to get a loan to buy furniture after the tornado.

The high court ruled 6-3 in favor of Tidwell.

SUMMER-TIME SAVOR RECIPE No. 2
Apricot-Stuffed Pork Chops

6 pork rib chops, cut 1 inch thick
 1 can (17 oz.) apricot halves
 ¼ cup catsup
 2 tablespoons chopped onion

2 tablespoons cooking oil
 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 ½ teaspoon dry mustard

Cut pocket in each chop, cutting from fat side almost to bone edge. Drain apricots, reserving ½ cup syrup. Put two apricot halves in pocket of each chop. Cut up remaining apricots. Grill chops over medium heat 35 minutes, turning once. Meanwhile, in saucepan, combine catsup, onion, oil, lemon juice, dry mustard, reserved apricot juice and cut-up apricots. Simmer 15 minutes. Cook chops 5 minutes more, brushing often with sauce. Makes 6 servings.

Glaucoma Testing Will Be Done Free

"More than one-million Americans, thirty-five years of age and older, have Glaucoma and half of them don't know they have this eye disease, which may result in blindness unless it is diagnosed early and treated continuously," says the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness. One of every eight blind Americans is a victim of Glaucoma, or as it is commonly called, "The Sneak Thief of Sight."

The test for Glaucoma can result in saving priceless eyesight, since the disease can be controlled if detected in time but cannot be cured or lost sight restored. Symptoms are not always noticeable, especially in the early stages, and this is why many victims of this eye disease are unaware they have Glaucoma until they begin to go blind.

The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Plainview Noon Lions Club will sponsor a free Glaucoma Screening program (free tests for Glaucoma) for residents of Plainview and surrounding areas, who are thirty-five years of age and over, on Tuesday evening, April 24, 1973 at the Plainview High School Cafeteria, 1500 Smyth Street, Plainview, from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

The free test for Glaucoma will be administered by members of the Hale - Floyd - Briscoe counties Medical Society assisted by nurses from the nursing staff, Central Plains General Hospital, Plainview Clinical Nurses, Plainview Public School Nurses, Plainview - Hale County Health Nurses and the Hale County Licensed Vocational Nurses Association. Also participating in the program as a public service will be members of the Plainview Noon Lions Club and their wives.

Motorists Reminded To Stop For Buses

A reminder on the State law about motorists stopping for school buses was issued today by Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Speir said the law, which applies on city streets as well as rural highways requires motorists moving in either direction on the same roadway or street with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing top red lights on the bus are in operation.

He said the problem is becoming more serious in cities due to increased use of school buses in urban school districts.

There are only two exceptions to the law on stopping for loading or unloading a school bus: Those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway (divided by median or physical barrier) are not required to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir said the problems of school bus accidents is of concern to law enforcement officials and educators throughout Texas. Only a few weeks ago, the Travis County Grand Jury urged the news media to publicize the law about stopping and not passing a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

The grand jury noted that serious criminal charges might result if a motorist disregards this law.

Notaries Public To Be Appointed Soon

Secretary of State Mark W. White, jr. has announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1973 and ends June 1, 1975, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1973 and May 15, 1973, inclusive.

Secretary of State White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1973, should apply to the County Clerk before May 14, 1973. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

It's Centennial Time In Texas

It's centennial time in Texas. The Calendar of Texas Events, issued today by the Texas Highway Department, indicates that the year 1873 was an important one in Texas history. During the April-September period covered by the Calendar, at least eight cities, from El Paso to Texarkana, will be celebrating their 100th year.

Others reaching that milestone are Terrell, Overton, Mineola, Plano, Weimar and Schulenberg. One of the state's oldest cities, Columbus, marks its 150th birthday on May 11-20, while Yorktown takes note of its 125th anniversary in April.

The entire month of August has been set aside to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Texas Rangers, with activities centered around the Texas Rangers' Fort Fisher in Waco.

Some 800 events are listed on the Calendar in addition to the special anniversary celebrations. As befits a Texas Calendar, there are dozens of rodeos and roping contests, and rodeo fans will have no trouble finding places to follow the sport.

From flea markets to major festivals; from sand sculpture contests to displays of fine art, whatever the traveler's pleasure, he will find it some time, somewhere in Texas.
