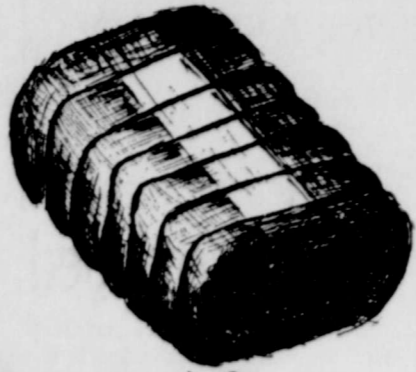

Regular Season Ended Tuesday

The regularly-scheduled season for the Pee Wee and Little League summer baseball program ended here Tuesday night. There will be a special double header Thursday night between the Blue Sox Pee Wees and a team of All-Stars from the White and Gold Sox Pee Wees and a "fun" game between the Blue Sox and Gold Sox. Following this, All-Star teams will be selected for tournament play.

The Blue Sox Pee Wees have successfully defended their championship this season, posting a won-lost record of 8-0. The team was coached this year by Ray Johnston, who was an assistant for the team last year.

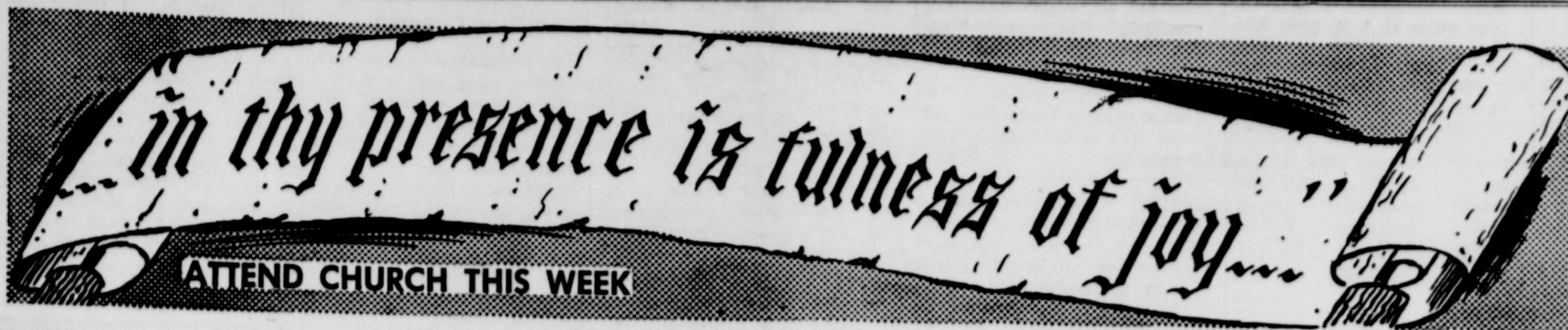
