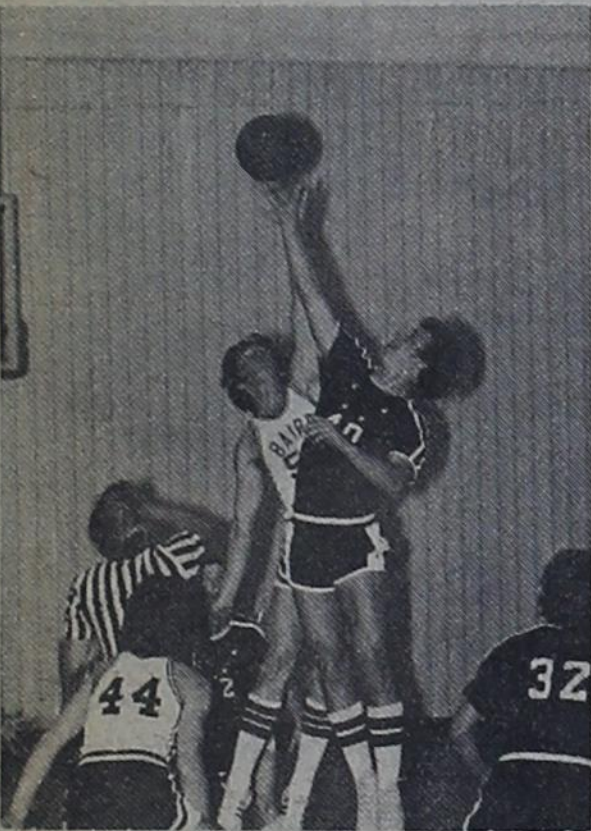

City of Baird Without Lights Last Friday

BAIRD—Beginning at 7:30 a.m. last Friday morning, local residents experienced an electrical blackout.

Power was restored in the downtown vicinity within 30 minutes. However, persons and businesses on the south circuit were without electricity until

approximately 10 a.m.

According to city secretary, A.E. Dyer, Jr., the incident was caused by a malfunction of the synchronizing meter which blew several fuses. An additional generator could not be put into operation until the meter was repaired.

Ice, Snow Paralyze Callahan Countians Once More

COUNTY—Freezing rain crept into the area early Monday morning, with snowflakes nipping at its heels.

Large, lovely flakes began falling around 6 a.m., and by noon several areas were completely enveloped by a thick blanket of snow. Varying reports over the county recorded an accumulation of 4 to 5 inches of snow.

The precipitation coupled with below-freezing temperatures to bring about a familiar sight in 1979 and virtually paralyze the area.

Department of Highway and Public Transportation workers began the slow task of trying to make roads passable for travelers early Monday morning.

DPS troopers kept busy attending to approximately 30 wrecks in the area, according to DPS trooper David Mayes.

County schools dismissed early Monday afternoon, and classes were cancelled all day Tuesday.

Late Monday afternoon after the last trickle of snow, freezing rain returned to the area to coat the accumulated precipi-

itation with a treacherous layer of ice.

Due to the added moisture, travel on county roads Tuesday morning was extremely dangerous. Highway 36 was reported to be in terrible condition Tuesday.

Although, swirling snowflakes and large icicles provide an aesthetic winter wonderland for many, the continued rash of winter storms provide a headache for others.

Farmers are busy trying to feed cattle since grazing is either scarce or completely covered with ice. About the only vehicles seen in Baird Monday, were pickups loaded with feed as they slowly crept down the empty streets.

The continued icy weather also affects the local merchants. The extremely bad weather has caused many to stay home during January, and has resulted in a very slow month business-wise.

All in all, county residents keep looking to the sky for some relief in sight. A few weeks of bright sunshine and mild temperatures could do wonders for everyone.

Meters Sealed Recently

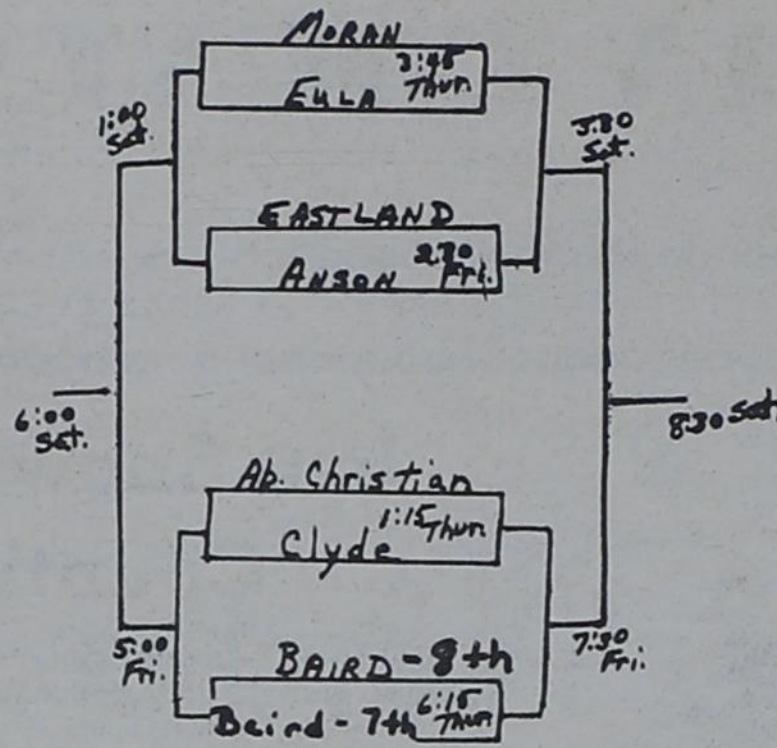
BAIRD—According to a city spokesman, the city of Baird has sealed all the electric meters in the city.

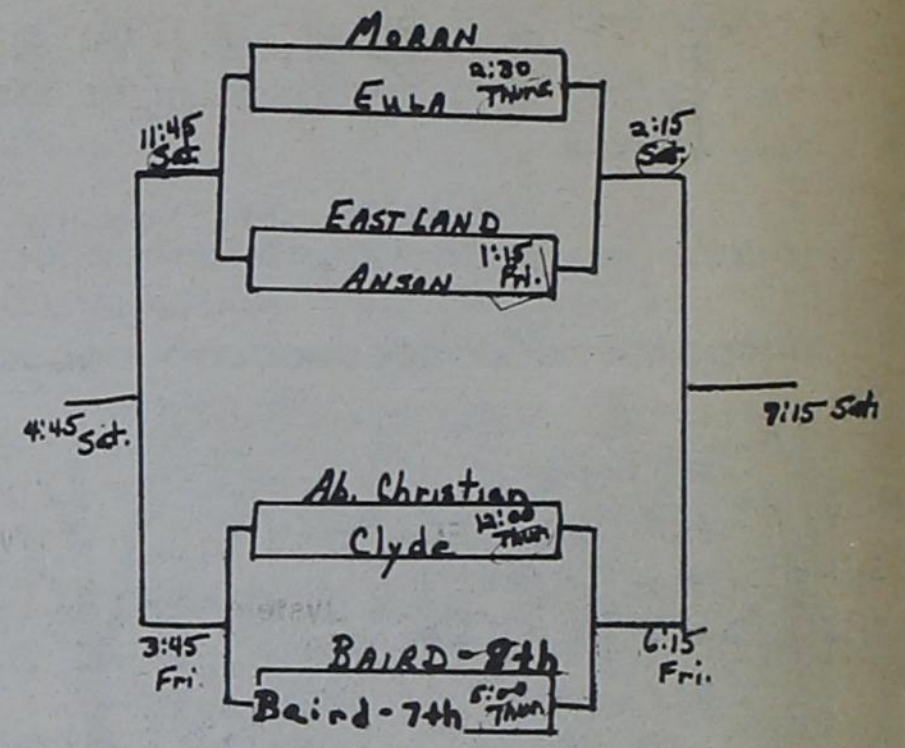

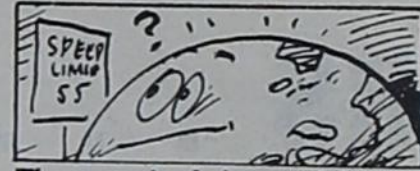
The Methodist Church was in charge of our Sunday afternoon worship service.

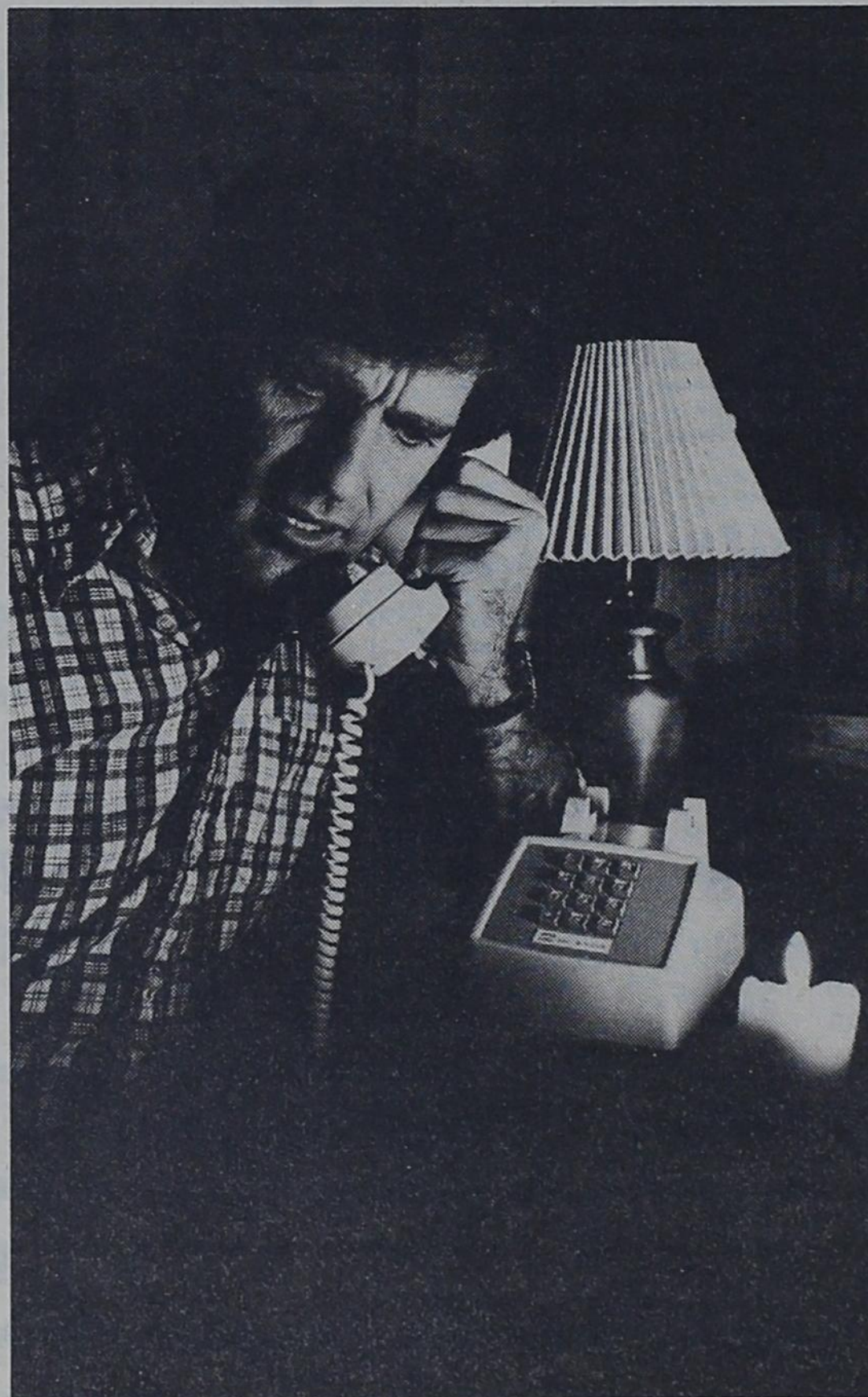

Area Students Make TSU Lists

STEPHENVILLE—Students making the A and B honor rolls and the Distinguished Students list totaled 587 for the 1978 fall semester at Tarleton State University, according to TSU registrar John Whiting.

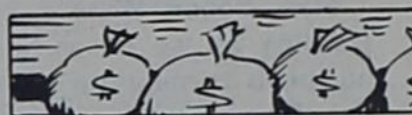
Drs. Paul Mani, Royce Pruet, and Terry Treadwell are all members of the courtesy staff.

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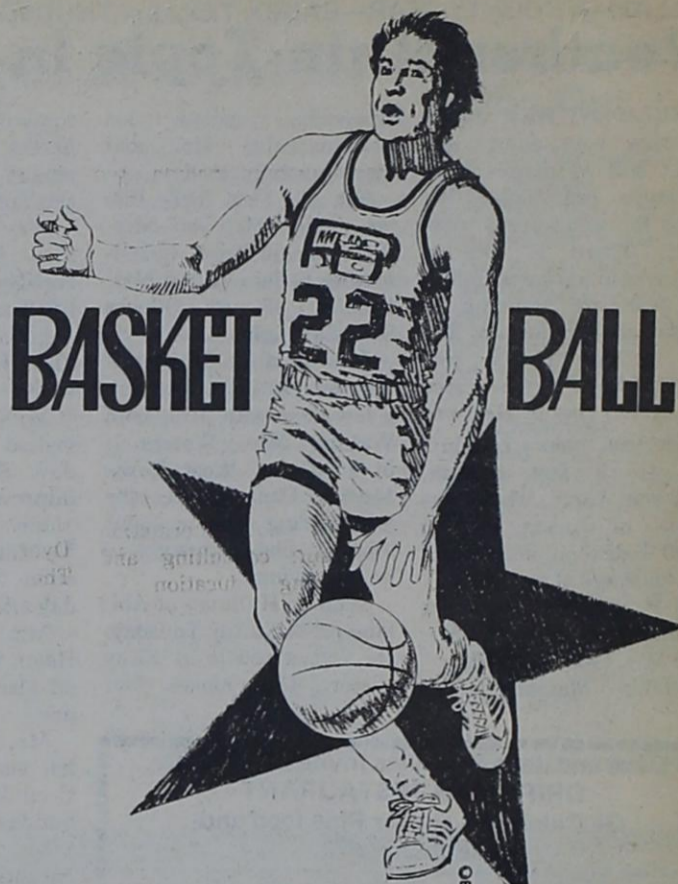

For the twelve month period from July 1977 to July 1978, there were 894 people admitted into the Callahan General Hospital. During this same period, only 29 people left the county for medical help. Also during the 1978 calendar year, Callahan General Hospital used 68 units of blood for these patients. This blood did not just appear. It had to be drawn from volunteer, healthy donors. This blood was donated freely from other communities.

If the people of Baird want to maintain the top medical care that they now receive from their own hospital, they will need to be self-supporting in their blood use. A community blood service is just that - the community must set up a volunteer donor program.

The blood drive is scheduled for February 22, 1979, Thursday, from 1:00 P.M. to 8:00 P.M. It will be held at the Community Center in Baird.
