Mackenzie Marker Moved To A Better Location

The Mackenzie historical marker commemorating the Mackenzie ground west of Silverton has been moved to a location 10.8 miles west of Silverton on SH 86. The marker was originally located on the Oscar Weeks land at a point inaccessible to the public. Weeks family donated two acres on SH 86 which Swisher County is developing into a rest area around the new location of marker. Cost to Swisher County has been about \$2,000 which was from revenue sharing funds. Green Thumbers will continue to beautify the rest area as the project progresses. It is hoped that in the future state highway department will convert the area into a roadside rest area which would make water available.

Plainview Teacher Enters Senatorial Race On GOP Ticket

A Plainview school teacher who has been active in area and state Republican Party circles for many years has announced her candidacy for nomination as the Republican candidate for state senator from the 30th Senatorial District in the May primary.

Mrs. Mary Virginia Kirchoff, who presently serves the 30th District as state committeewoman for the GOP, made the announcement in her hometown of Plainview.

Having lived in Texas 40 years, Mrs. Kirchoff is a native of Missouri and a graduate of Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, and has attended Wayland Baptist College and Texas Tech University.

Mrs. Kirchoff is an instructor in Speech and English at Coronado Junior High School in Plainview. She will take a leave of absence to campaign for the state post.

Discussing her candidacy on the Republican ticket, the 47-year-old Mrs. Kirchoff said, "I don't believe party lines really make any difference if the candidate is someone the people can trust, who has their confidence, and who is interested in our area, and who will speak out for us in Austin."

The first woman elected to serve on the board of directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, she organized and served as chairman of the Woman's Activities Committee of the WTCC, which covers 132 counties in the western half of Texas.

Mrs. Kirchoff also assisted in organizing the West Texas "Small Towns task force" for the WTCC. Her instructional material is used on the local, state and national level.

Active in District Girl Scout work, the Plainview Junior Service League and a life member of the Parent-Teacher Association, Mrs. Kirchoff also has served as president of the Plainview Classroom Teachers' Association and was elected teacher of the year for Coronado in 1972. She has served the district and state in many capacities, including advisory to the Constitutional Revision Committee.

An active member of Plainview's First Christian Church, she was among the first women to serve on the board of directors in 1953, and at various times also served as a deaconess, choir director, president of the Christian Women's Fellowship, and youth director.

A steady worker for the GOP since the early 1960's, Mrs. Kirchoff has been a delegate to the state convention six times since 1964, attended the 1964 national convention as an official guest, and served as a delegate to both the national and state Federation of Republican Women since 1971.

She also has served as campaign chairman for numerous GOP candidates, and her daughter, Karen, seems to be following in her footsteps. Karen, a sophomore at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, served as a page representing Texas in the 1971 National Federation meeting in Washington, D. C.

Her husband, John, is a farmer, stockman and investor, and her son, John E., is also a farmer and stockman.




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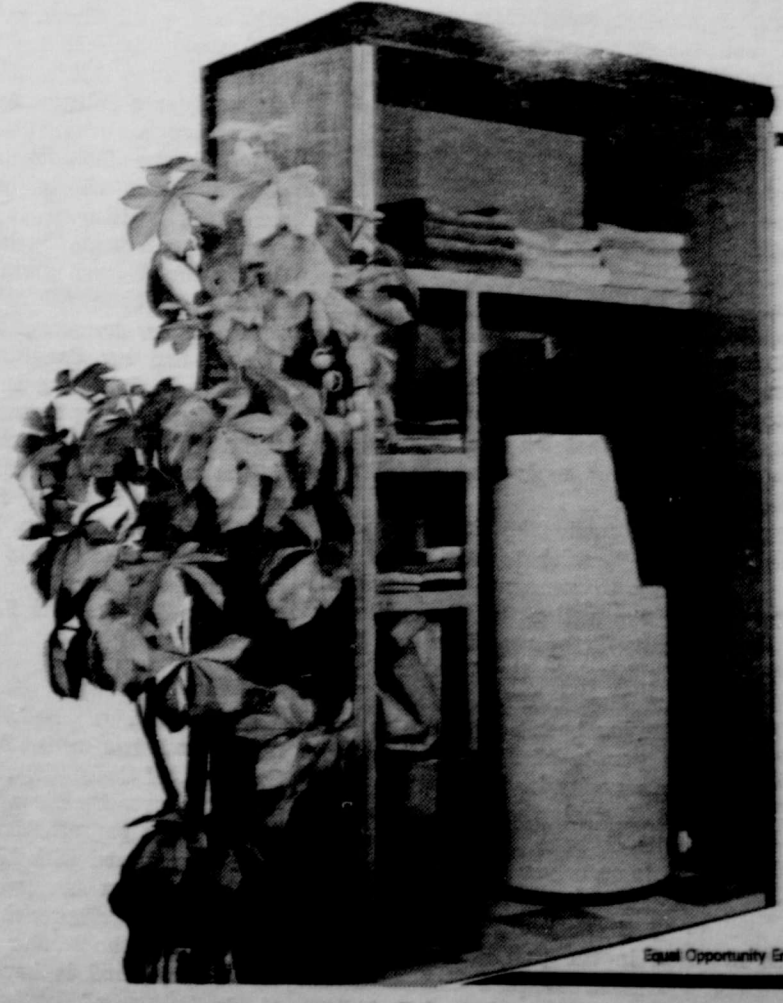
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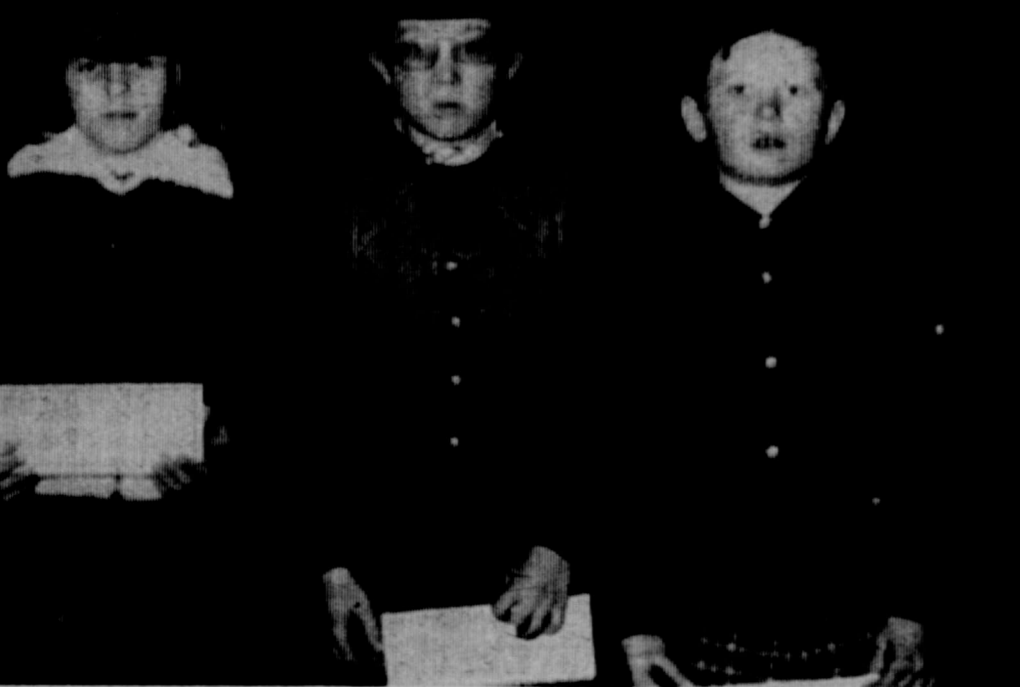

Satanism Widespread In United States., Witch Coven Possible Here

ESP, psychic phenomena and other aspects of the supernatural, the mysterious world of the occult, will be explored and explained in Silvertown Friday night by Felix Snipes of Atlanta, Georgia, a professional magician who deals with all things supernatural.
Snipes, an associate of Evangelist Wayne Bristow, will discuss "ESP, Psychic Phenomena and the Occult" during a special program following the Friday night service of the Wayne Bristow Crusade now in progress at the First Baptist Church in Silvertown.
According to Pastor Larry iWilson, the occult presentation will be open to young people from junior high through 25. Adults may attend only as observers and will be seated in the back of the auditorium. The pastor stressed that because of the unusual subject matter it will be very important for those attending to stay for the entire program.
"At one time I believed in only one aspect of the supernatural," says Snipes. "I believed in God but I could not accept the existence of Satan, demons, etc. But a few years ago I became convinced that there does exist a larger realm of the supernatural than just God himself."
Snipes, a member of the International Brotherhood of Magicians, will conduct experiments in thought projection Friday night using persons from the audience. These experiments will be similar to those done by Kreskein, who has been seen by millions on national TV. (Snipes has also appeared on television throughout the country, including an interview on CBS with Roger Mudd.)
A veteran of 15 years in an international ministry of evangelism, Snipes approaches the supernatural in a Christian context. He says, "If we accept the Bible as truth, we must accept the existence of supernatural things. There are many places in the Bible dealing with witches, astrology and corcery."
Snipes has found satanism (worship of the devil) and the practice of witchcraft to be widespread in America. "I would not be surprised to learn that there is a witches coven right here in Silvertown," he said.
"During a time when thousands of teenagers are delving into the black arts, I believe there is an urgency in dealing with the occult in a bold, frank manner," says Snipes.
The Wayne Bristow Evangelistic Team, of which Felix Snipes is a member, is being featured in special services at 7:30 each evening this week at the First Baptist Church in Silvertown.
