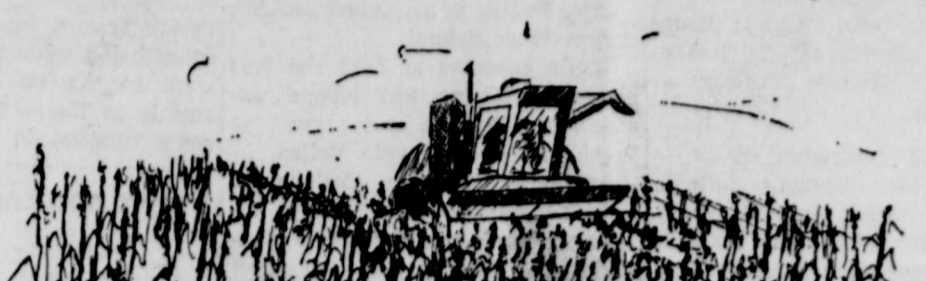

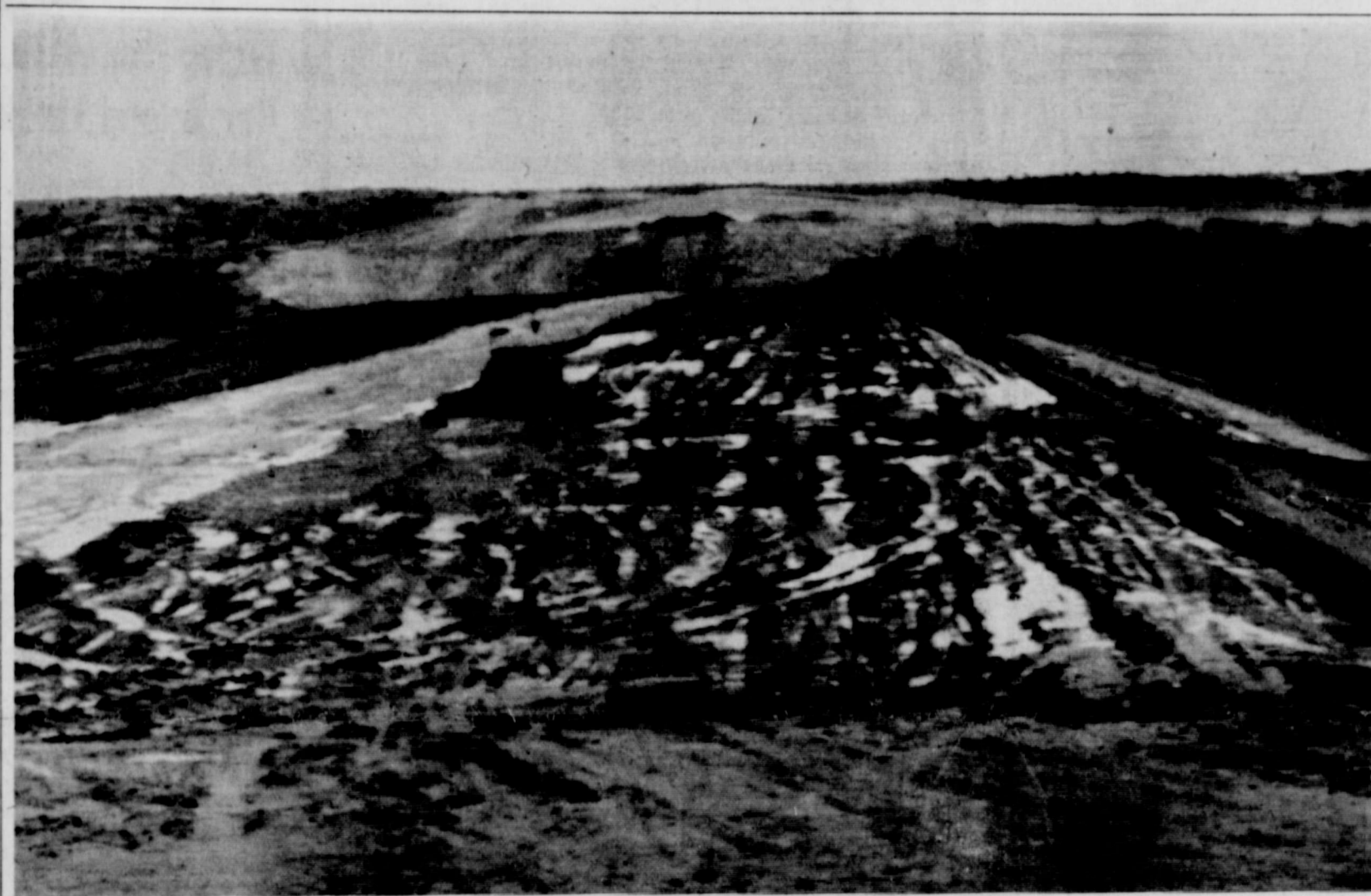

Only two of the Briscoe County races are contested in the Democratic Primary, that being for County Commissioner, Precinct 4, where incumbent Roy S. Brown is being challenged by Bryant Edleman, and for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, where Mrs. Barbara Pigg is being challenged by Johnnie Lanham. Mrs. Pigg is filling the unexpired term of Gary Hunt on an appointment by the Briscoe County Commissioners' Court.

On the Democratic Party ballot, attention should be drawn to the write-in races for Precinct Chairmen in all of the county's precincts. It is important that the people select Precinct Chairmen without any names on the ballots.

Rains Dampen Silverton Area

Officially, Silverton had received 1.48 inches of rain this week, with rain still falling at the time the final reading was given Wednesday morning by Fred A. Strange.

Many larger amounts have been recorded in the rural areas surrounding Silverton.

The breakdown on the city's rain shows that .30 of an inch fell Sunday, .98 of an inch came down on Monday, and .20 of an inch was added Tuesday and Tuesday night.

The weather has presented a peculiar situation, with those in the Eastern Panhandle receiving the rain and those in the North-Central portion getting none. The weather programs seen by Silverton residents this week have frequently been from Amarillo weathermen who were crying because none "had fallen in their back yard."

The stalled frontal system which brought the much-needed rain to Briscoe County has now moved out of the area, and a return to drier conditions is predicted.

All Around the Town

We would like to call your attention this week, as the May 4 Democratic Primary rolls around, to one candidate that the Briscoe County News would like to endorse and publicly support.

We speak of the candidacy of Jack Hightower of Vernon for the Democratic nomination for United States Congressman from this District. We think it is vitally important that we nominate and elect this man to represent us in Washington.

Too often, in these troubled times, we hear people throw a blanket of suspicion over all of our public officials by saying, "They're all crooked, so why does it matter who is elected?"

We do not believe this at all!

We know Jack Hightower personally, and have known him for a number of years. We know that he is an honest christian man. It is doubtful that you could find a man with higher principles, morals and character. He is hard working, trustworthy, and, having been reared in Memphis, Texas, is familiar with life in the small town.

Jack Hightower doesn't have a lot of money backing his candidacy with a lot of campaign advertising, but he is the kind of man we need in Washington and you can be sure that our area agricultural interests will be well represented by this man who will not allow himself to be bought by big company interests.

Jack Hightower says the only issue the voters of the 13th Congressional District will decide Saturday is "which of three Democratic candidates is best qualified for the Democratic nomination—qualified by background and experience and by proven ability to work effectively for the people."

Hightower says that he has refrained from personal attacks on his opponents and has concentrated during the campaign on bringing his record before the voters and letting them judge his qualifications.

He declared: "Over the next few years the Congress is going to make some hard decisions on what to do about crime and how to improve the criminal justice system. As a former district attorney I believe I have the background to help resolve these serious problems."

"Congress will have to take positive steps to stop inflation, to bring down excessive interest rates, to provide tax relief for wage earners, and to curb the spiral of federal spending. As a legislator I have worked diligently for the best government services at the lowest cost. I know how to trim a budget. Last year the committee I headed reduced the operating costs of the State Senate by more than \$200,000."

"Congress must be more aggressive in helping provide a supplemental water supply to water-deficient areas such as West Texas. We can't sit around waiting for the crisis to occur, as we did in the energy problem. I have worked on this critical matter for many years and will bring fresh experience to Washington."

"Congress must be alert to the need for greater production of food and fiber and a stable agricultural economy. Again, I have the proper concern and experience to contribute intelligently to these efforts."

The 47-year-old State Senator further asserted, "There is a need to restore public confidence in our government. I do not believe the people have lost faith in our political system, but I do believe they have lost patience with politicians who are more interested in winning elections than they are in giving their constituents a full day's work for a full day's pay—and doing it honestly. I believe my record of service demonstrates that I can run a Congressional office that will earn the pride and respect of the people it represents."

He added: "The Congressman from this district must have insight and experience to cope with the bureaucracy, because he can-

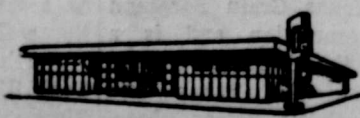
"Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

STREP THROAT DANGERS

Don't take a child's sore throat too lightly, one expert emphasized this week.

"Although not every sore throat is strep throat, medical attention can prevent complications—such as rheumatic fever and glomerulonephritis," Dr. Barbara A. Sears, health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, emphasized.

This year finds cases of strep throat and scarlet fever up from the same time period in 1973, she said.

In case of a sudden sore throat—along with certain symptoms, Dr. Sears advised seeking medical attention, especially for children. "These symptoms include throat discomfort when swallowing, swollen glands in the neck and pain when pressed gently under the angle of the jaw.

"Also if the child feels feverish—with a temperature of 101-104 degrees, which usually indicates a strep infection—or if he complains of headache or nausea, or was in contact with other children who have scarlet fever or sore throats, take him to the doctor.

"Only a physician can determine whether or not there's a strep infection. Proper medical treatment early in the course of infection usually will prevent complications, she noted.

Turning to possible complications, the specialist explained that rheumatic fever can permanently damage a child's heart. This condition known as rheumatic heart disease, is most prevalent between the ages of five and 15.

"Glomerulonephritis, on the other hand, results in an inflammation of kidney structures. Blood in the urine, swelling, high blood pressure—and in severe cases, shortness of breath, delirium, convulsions and coma—characterize this condition.

"Although exact cause is unknown, this disease often follows other infections—especially those of the upper respiratory tract," Dr. Sears added.

SORGHUM EXPORTS

ON THE INCREASE

Sorghum has come to the forefront as a major export grain, and its markets are strong and steady.

"About one-fifth of the milo crop in the United States is exported each year, making it the top sorghum exporting country," says Roland Smith, grain marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"A continuing uptrend can be expected in the long run although exports may soften some this year. Japan continues as the leading importer. Israel looks like she will continue importing along with India, Venezuela, Chile, Nicaragua, the Netherlands, Iran, Niger, Mauritania, Upper Volta and Senegal, the last four being African countries," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

The volume of sorghum moving to Japan this year should exceed the 105 million bushels imported in 1973. This was more than half of all the sorghum exported. The Japanese use the grain for chicken and cattle feed.

Israel ranks as the second most important importer with orders exceeding 20 million bushels. "India is not far behind but its market is dependent on 'human' food production. When there is enough wheat and rice to go around, Indian milo imports drop.

In times of food shortages, sorghum is consumed as a cereal grain," says Smith.

Using sorghum as basic chicken feed, the Netherlands imports about five million bushels yearly.

Some 14 million bushels of sorghum were shipped to Venezuela last year where the grain is used primarily for feeding cattle.

"Competition from other grains, mainly corn and wheat, and other producing countries exists. With substitution of one grain for another, either for human or animal consumption, grain competition has tightened. Argentina, South Africa and Thailand appear

to be the strongest competitors in the export field," the specialist notes.

Smith commends the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Association and the U. S. Feed Grain Council for their efforts in opening the export door for sorghum as a livestock and human food.
