**Terraces Help To Control Erosion**

Building terraces can help control erosion, at least for a while. But how terraces do their job depends on how they are farmed. So says Bob Rauch, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Silverton.

Unfortunately, too many farmers plow across their terraces or fail to maintain them properly, Rauch said. Gradually, the terraces lose their capacity to intercept runoff water. Then when heavy rain strikes, many terraces are broken.

Terraces that are properly maintained keep the water on the land and prevent erosion. Rauch said SCS has published a new booklet, "Farming Terraced Land," which describes ways to farm terraces so that their original capacity is maintained. The illustrated publication gives step-by-step methods for plowing terraced land with a minimum number of trips.

**Tax Incentive Could Help Rural Communities**

U. S. Rep. Bob Price of Pampa introduced legislation Monday that would encourage doctors to locate their practices in rural areas by means of special income tax deductions.

"If we are going to deal with the maldistribution of doctors," Price said, "we are going to have to offer some real incentives to encourage them to locate in shortage areas."

His bill would empower the secretary of Health, Education and Welfare to designate "physician shortage" areas in which doctors, as well as dentists and optometrists, would be offered tax incentives to locate practices. Such incentives would be federal income tax deductions for a five-year period.

**Burning Crop Residues Is Costly Practice**

Gaseous elements such as nitrogen will be completely lost by the burning. This amounts to about 30 pounds of nitrogen in a good irrigated crop which at current prices would be at least \$3.60 per acre. There would be a loss of soil organic matter, the acidic matter, as well as a source of food for the various heterotrophic bacteria which depend on this organic matter as well as a source of food for specific interest are the Azotobacter and Clostridium which fix gaseous nitrogen into available nitrogen non-symbiotically at an annual rate of about 10-50 pounds an acre.

Burning residues causes the soil structure to gradually deteriorate as the soil organic matter is reduced. The soil intake rate, aeration, and porosity are lessened. Erosion and porosity are lessened. Erosion becomes a greater hazard due to the exposure of the soil to wind and rainfall.

**VETERANS TO RECEIVE EDUCATION ASSISTANCE CHECKS THIS MONTH**

Some 55,000 school-going veterans whose GI bill eligibility was extended by two years under a law signed by the President on July 10 will receive education assistance checks by the end of July, according to Jack Coker, VA Regional Office Director.

The former eight year deadline on using school benefits expired June 30 for veterans separated from military service between January 31, 1955, and July 1, 1966, VA explained. Those veterans who happened to be in summer school at the time the new Public Law 93-337 was enacted can now be paid legally for training beyond the former expiration date of June 30.

Normally checks are delivered in advance of each month of training, Coker explained, so the Waco Regional Office prepared in advance of the new bill's enactment to process payments for summer school students as soon as legal authority to make the payments was received.

Veterans in school who were discharged less than eight years ago continued to receive their monthly checks without interruption, and they will have continuing eligibility under the new law for up to 10 years.

Agent, Jimmy Vanstory, producers should use those fertilizer rates that would eliminate deficiencies for their yield goal. This goal, he said, should be consistent with available irrigation water and management practices. While fertilizer costs are higher this year they remain a real bargain when applied at optimum rates.

Vanstory says that nitrogen is the most important plant nutrient in the production of both forage and grain because it is required in the largest amount and is the most commonly deficient of nutrients in wheat producing soils.

"Keep in mind, however, that the heavier soils can accumulate

nitrate following application rates that are above the amount removed by crops," he adds. "If you fertilized for 60 bushels of wheat last year and for some reason produced much less, chances are you have a very significant level of nitrate in the soil for the next crop. In this case, you can decrease your nitrogen rate."

Nitrate nitrogen testing in the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock has proven over the years to be very helpful in determining nitrogen need for wheat and other field crops, he says.

"Phosphorus is the second element of most concern. While much of the hardland area does not res-

pond to applications of phosphate, where soil test values are in the very low range it can be a major contributor to vigorous early growth of high quality forage and can also contribute to increased grain yields," the county Extension agent explains. "Unlike nitrogen which can be effectively applied anytime before tilling, phosphate must be applied in the seedbed if it is to be effective for the next crop."

Vanstory says that soil tests for phosphorus have been carefully correlated with yield response in field tests by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers at Lubbock over several years. These

tests afford the best indicator available to the producer for evaluation of phosphate need and likelihood of response from its application.

Information on sample collection and mailing may be obtained from the county Extension office, he suggests.

"It is important that samples be properly collected to adequately represent a soil area. Information on crop history and irrigation available together with realistic yield goals should accompany soil samples so that suggestions on rate and kind of fertilizer can be returned to the producer in a written report," Vanstory explains.



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
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
