New Extension Agent Named For Briscoe County

Patricia Lee Honea of Tenaha, Texas has been named the new Briscoe County Extension Agent (home economics). The announcement was made by Briscoe County Judge M. G. Moreland and Mrs. Catherine B. Crawford of Lubbock, district agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The new agent is a native of Caddo, Louisiana. She received the B. S. degree in home economics education from Stephen F. Austin University, and will receive the Master of Science Degree in Clothing and Textiles from Texas Tech University in August of this year. She has had one year of high school teaching experience.

During her college career, she was named to the Dean's List and also chosen for Phi Upsilon Omicron, a national home economics fraternity. While at Texas Tech, she has had a teaching assistantship and taught a course in merchandizing to senior home economics students.

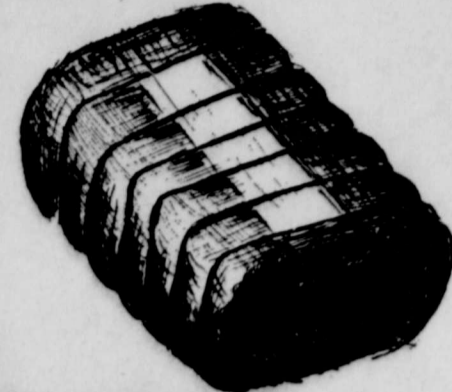

The Silverton Pool will close Saturday, August 17, due to the opening of school next Monday.

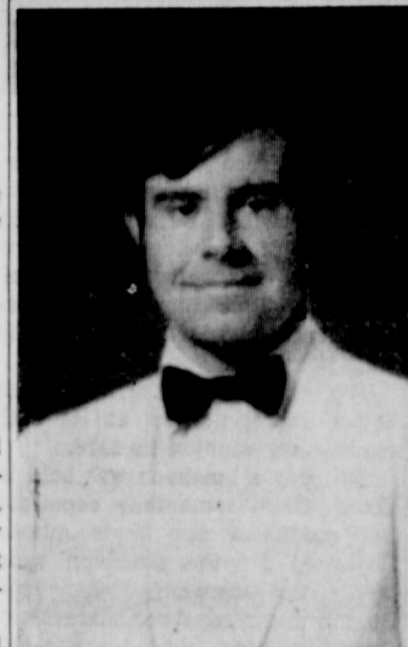
Peggy Kitchens Is Rodeo Queen

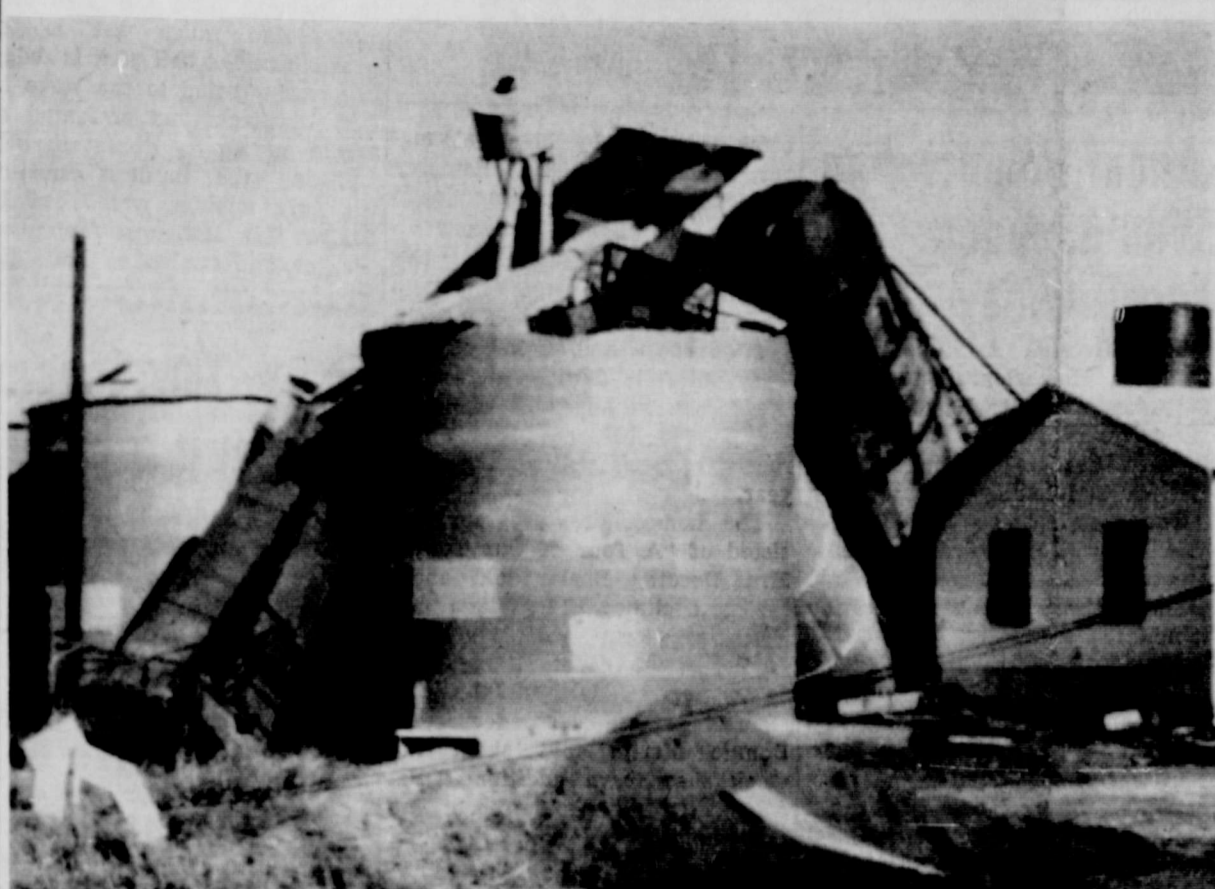
His car struck the rear of a parked truck two miles south of McDonald.

Thousands of Dollars Of Damage Done By Sunday Morning Storm Here

Thousands of dollars of damage, resulted from a windstorm that hit Silverton early Sunday morning. At Service Elevator alone the damage was estimated at \$75,000 to \$100,000 after the wind destroyed the Mackenzie Mill which was under construction.

At Grabbe-Simpson Chevrolet-Oldsmobile, several plate glass windows were blown out, one shattering over a new Vega which was sitting in the showroom and will have to be repainted.

Several small buildings flew through the air and landed at various places, including rooftops. The City Cafe sign blew off and crashed down on the car of the owner, Cecil Jones. At Jones' home a small metal building came crashing down in his backyard.

Numerous fences, television towers and trees were damaged by the wind which was estimated in excess of 75 miles per hour.

Some residents were without electricity, cable television and telephones for awhile.

Accompanying the wind was 1.90 inches of badly-needed rain. This rainfall figure varied upward to four inches at Dave Anderson's in the San Jacinto community. At Mackenzie Dam, two inches was measured on the south side and four inches on the north side. G. W. Lee also reported a heavier rain which was accompanied by hail. Farmers in the area where Glen Lindsey and Lee live have received hail from almost every cloud that has gone over this summer. No hail fell on the City of Silverton, and some rural areas reported getting no rain.

Quitaque also reported high winds early Sunday morning, but a spokesman said that no damage was reported.

Doctor Impressed With Silverton

Dr. and Mrs. Marcelino S. Silva visited in Silverton last Saturday and were overnight guests of the Jack Robertson family. They inspected the new clinic, ambulance and points of interest here.

Saturday night they attended their first rodeo at the local arena. Dr. Silva told the Briscoe County News that it was the first rodeo he had ever seen. He had seen pictures and movies of rodeo, but he had thought "it was not real" until seeing it in person. When told that many of the ropers do similar work for a living, he laughed and said he thought it was a hard way to earn a living.

Dr. Silva is a personable young doctor, and the thing that seems to stand between him and his coming to Silverton is the acquisition of a license to practice. He has taken the exam for foreign medical school graduates and he expects the results of this test in early September. If he passes the test, he will then be able to apply for the state examination for a license to practice in Texas.

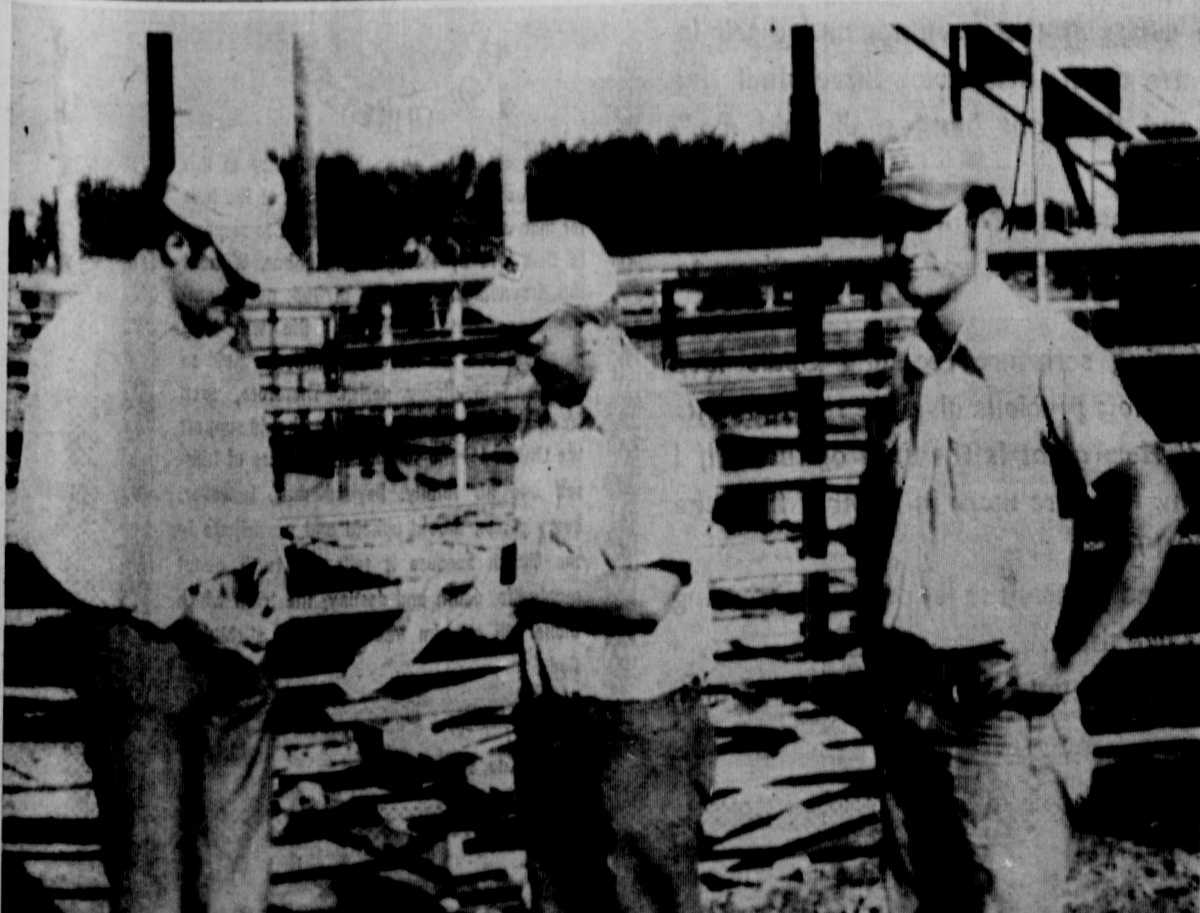
He says that there are four doctors from the Philippines who are planning to re-locate, and indicates that perhaps the first to get his license will come to Silverton. One other of the doctors would probably come here with him, as the second doctor could practice under his supervision.

Dr. Silva stated that one of the other doctors has done a lot of work in emergency rooms and would probably be interested in conducting classes for the ambulance drivers should he come here. The four doctors want to practice two-and-two in two towns in the same general area.

Lake Mackenzie Gets New Water

There really isn't very much water in Lake Mackenzie, but workmen there told the Briscoe County News Monday morning that the water rose three to four feet following the rains of Sunday which dropped about two inches on the lake's south side and about four inches in the watershed on the north side. Only about .25 of an inch fell on the southwest end of the watershed.

The water is almost up to the foot of the drawdown tower on the dam.

Work on the dam is almost finished, with workmen busy "painting" the backside of the dam with an oil material to help retard erosion until cover is established. Some roadwork is also being done.

The Texas Highway Department was working just south of the dam in an area where a large rock and mud slide closed the southbound lane of the highway following the heavy rain on Sunday.

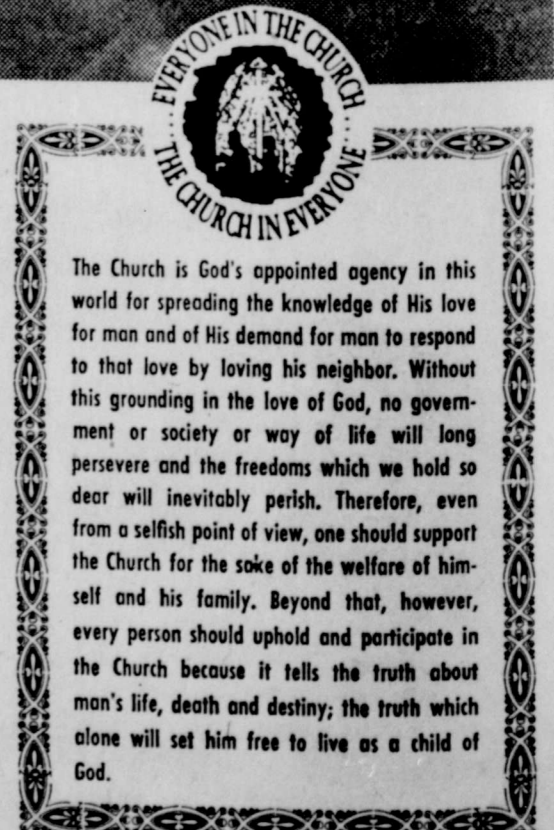

Bullock Here To Say "Thank You"

Bob Bullock, Democratic nominee for State Comptroller, was in Silverton Tuesday afternoon to say "thank you" to the voters of Briscoe County who gave him a 75.7 per cent majority in the May primary.

Bullock has won the Democratic nomination with the largest percentage vote of any contested statewide race. He carried all but one of Texas' 254 counties.

Visiting every county in Texas during the primary, Bullock said he "prefers to talk to the people personally instead of hiding behind words and gimmicks ground out by clever public relations people."

The size of his victory shows the people support improvements and reforms he recommends for the Comptroller's Office, Bullock said.

Bullock, 45, gained statewide acclaim as Secretary of State. He also has served as Assistant Attorney General and a member of the House of Representatives. He is a veteran of the Korean Conflict and lives in Austin with his wife, Amelia, and son, Bobby.

During the campaign Bullock has called for an end to faulty collection methods which he says cost the state millions of dollars a year by "fly-by-night" operators.

Bullock also has promised to cut down the amount of red tape facing businessmen in handling and paying state taxes. Other reforms urged by Bullock have included quicker processing of city sales taxes by the state.

"I'm fully confident that the people are more than anxious to see that their hard-earned tax dollars are carefully collected and wisely spent," Bullock said.

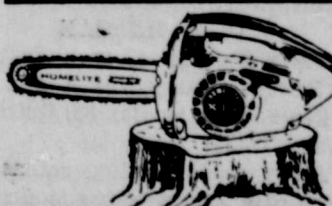
