Junior High Takes 14-6 Win At McLean

The Junior High and Junior Varsity Owls split a pair of games at McLean last Thursday night, the Junior Owls earning a 14-6 victory, and the Junior Varsity playing hard to come out on the short end of their 12-8 score.

The Junior High Owls battled the Tiger Cubs through a scoreless first quarter and started clicking on the first play of the second. Kirk Durham pitched out to Doug McJimsey, and he went 20 yards for a touchdown. The PAT run by Dave Francis failed.

Thomas Perkins saved a McLean touchdown when he stopped the Cub ballcarrier on the 30-yard line.

In the third quarter, Durham pitched out to Francis on the McLean 35, and he went all the way for another counter for the Owls. Doug McJimsey carried on the successful PAT run, and the visitors held a 14-0 lead.

In the last two minutes of the third quarter, the Cubs scored from the 20 and failed on the PAT.

The fourth quarter was "battle four downs, give up the ball." The Owls were deep in their own territory once before Greg Hill saved them with a 50-yard kick.

The offensive line for the Junior High Owls has been doing a great job this year. It is made up of James Alan Patton, Earl Jarrett, guards; Mike Cornett, Gregg Hill, tackles; Randy Gilmore, center; Kyle Bean, Zane Reagan and Rodney Bullock, alternating at end.

JUNIOR VARSITY

Tommy Lacy received the ball and returned it 80 yards for the Junior Varsity Owls, but even with this great return by the 168-pound sophomore, the Owls failed to convert it into six points. The ball went over to the Tigers on their own one-foot line, and on their first play, when McLean attempted to run through the four hole the ball carrier was met by Jim Wilson and went down behind their goal line for a two-point safety.

In the second quarter, with two minutes remaining to be played, McLean scored and their PAT run failed. Later David Strange intercepted a Tiger pass and made a good run, but the Owls were forced to give up the ball again. The defense forced the Tigers to give it up on downs, and an Owl pass was intercepted and carried for another McLean score. The PAT run failed.

The Owls penetrated to the Tiger-10 on a good run by Brad Ziegler in the third quarter, but again the Owls were forced to give up the ball. In the fourth quarter, the JV Owls fought to the McLean-20, from where Brad Ziegler carried across the double stripe for a score. Ziegler's PAT run failed.

The rest of the game the Owls played hard but were unable to overcome their 12-8 deficit and suffered their first defeat of the season.



Owls Defeat Tigers

A large crowd was present here last Friday night to see the Owls hand the McLean Tigers a 26-6 defeat in the first District 2-A game for both teams. The ladies were wearing football mums and a festive spirit was in the air for the annual homecoming game.

By winning, the Owls evened their season record at 2-2, while the injury-riddled Tigers are still looking for a win.

In a pre-game ceremony, Lesa Francis, sophomore and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Francis, was crowned as Football Queen for 1974. Tri-Captains Ken Wood, Mikel Griffin and Tommy Bullock, presented her with the traditional helmet crown, a bouquet of red roses and Captain Wood presented the queen with a congratulatory kiss.

The other candidates were Christi Northcutt, senior; Kerri Arnold, junior, and Kim Hutsell, freshman.

It was a nice night for football, with a breeze from the south giving a slight field advantage to the team going north. After taking the initial touchdown on their own 20, the Owls had a shaky start with the quarterback being tripped by one of his linemen, he fumbled and McLean recovered on the Silverton-16. On first down, a McLean fumble was recovered by Owl Halfback Brent Bean. Runs by Fullback Zane Mayfield and Halfback Dean Ziegler failed to net a first down, and the Owls punted.

The Tigers made one first down before their drive stalled, and McLean's Eddie Estes attempted a field goal from the Owl-34, which was blocked by Owl Tri-Captain Tommy Bullock.

On first down, Halfback Scott Hutsell took off on a 20-yard run for the Owls' first first down on the Tiger-29. Silverton made another first down at the 17 on runs by Zane Mayfield and Dean Ziegler. Wood moved it to the 12, and after third down called time out. Preparations were made for a field goal attempt by Zane Mayfield, with Mayfield making a big production of changing to a kicking shoe, but it was a fake and Wood, who was down to hold for the kick, passed to Dean Ziegler for a touchdown with 2:30 remaining on the first quarter clock. Zane Mayfield's PAT kick failed, and the Owls held a 6-0 lead.

The Owls gave McLean a first down on their next possession by roughing the kicker, but three incomplete passes followed and McLean punted to the Owls.

Quarterback Wood picked up a first down to the Silverton-39, but a broken play lost a lot on first down and a pass was incomplete from Wood to Tri-Captain Mikel Griffin. The Owls punted, the Tigers ran three plays and punted. Silverton fumbled the punt, and McLean recovered at midfield.

The Big Red defense held, and the Tigers punted to the Owl-20. On first down, Dean Ziegler took the handoff and went all the way, 80 yards, evading tacklers for another Owl score. With 8:05 remaining in the second quarter, Brett Gill kicked the PAT, and the Owls had extended their lead to 13-0.

On McLean's next possession, a personal foul set them back and they were forced to punt to the Owl-35. Silverton picked up one first down, and on first down Owl Tri-Captain Wood passed to End Mikel Griffin for another touchdown. There was 3:53 remaining in the first half as Brett Gill successfully kicked the extra point.

McLean mounted a drive to the Silverton-35, where the Tigers attempted a field goal with one second remaining in the first half. The attempt failed, the Owls were penalized for roughing the kicker,

giving McLean a free first down and the time having expired on the score clock, McLean made another unsuccessful field goal attempt. The first half ended with the Owls owning a 20-0 lead.

Silverton got a couple of penalties on the first series of downs in the third quarter and punted to McLean. The Owl defense played tough, and McLean failed on another field goal attempt.

Quarterback Wood passed complete to Griffin, the Tigers were penalized for piling on, and on the next series of downs, Dean Ziegler carried to the Tiger-7. Runs by Halfbacks Brent Bean and Carl Gallington and Fullback Zane Mayfield moved the ball to the one-foot mark, from where Mayfield carried behind the blocking of the right guard and tackle into the end zone. The snap was bobbed, Brett Gill picked up the ball and ran, getting close but failing on the PAT try.

After the kickoff, on first down, McLean pulled the old "sneak-a-roo" play—a quick opener—and before the Owls knew what was going on, Halfback Curtis Simpson was gone on a 50-yard touchdown scamper. With 5:11 remaining in the period, Estes faked a conversion kick, the holder ran with the ball and failed on the PAT. At this point the Owls held their 26-6 lead.

There was a lot of action left in the game but the scoring was finished and the Tigers were running the ball for very short gains every play, looking for all the world like a team running out the clock. Several of the varsity Owls rested on the sideline during the fourth period, and Ken Wood, who had played very hard at quarterback, was rested while Zane Mayfield called the signals during part of the quarter. Wood came back and completed a pass to Brent Bean, and as the game ended, the Owls were driving for another score.

The Owls made 15 first downs in the game, as compared with 10 (three were on 15 yard penalties against the Owls) for the Tigers. McLean was penalized 35 yards, while the Owls had 55 yards stepped off against them.

The Owls travel to Claude Friday night for the second conference game of the season against the Mustangs at 8:00 p.m. The Owls, coming off their victory against McLean, will be trying hard for a win. They need your support at the game.

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

YF Hear Program On Parasites

Silvertown Young Farmers met Thursday night in the Pioneer Room at the First State Bank at 8:00 p.m. to hear Jim Meggs, jr., a representative of American Cyanamid Company of Plainview. Meggs' topic was "Internal and External Parasites of Livestock." He stated that worms cause from three to ten dollars a head on gains. Methods used to control parasites were discussed, along with their life cycles and symptoms.

Farmers U. Calling For Amendment

Farmers Union cotton state representatives called for an emergency amendment to the 1973 Farm Bill providing for a mandatory increase in the cotton support price to 50 cents a pound on the 1974 crop. The action was taken at a meeting in Dallas all day Tuesday. States represented were New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Texas.

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco, reporting from the Dallas meeting, stated that an immediate increase in the 1974 cotton loan rate is essential to enable southwestern cotton producers to pay off their production loans and finance next year's crop.

"High costs, a poor crop, and below the cost of production prices spell disaster to cotton producers. Congress must take emergency action to increase the loan rate to a minimum of 50 cents a pound strict low middling 1-1/16", average location. This action would move the textile industry and shippers into the competitive market. They are now sitting back expecting farmers to bear the total responsibility of financing the crop until the trade needs it," Naman said.

The Texas Farmers Union leader explained that unless the government takes emergency action, the farmers surviving the economic "wringer" will abandon cotton production in 1975 and instead expand feedgrain production substantially. This could create cotton shortages in the years to come and at the same time cause a feed-grain price bust.

The Dallas meeting of Farmers Union cotton leaders called upon National Farmers Union to urge Congress to take the steps necessary to "save the cotton industry." The state Farmers Union organizations will send urgent appeals directly to state congressional delegations soliciting support for an increase in the loan price.

"The action to save cotton farmers must be immediate. The production problems including high costs and unfavorable weather conditions have created serious enough problems, but we are now faced with the situation where we can't sell our crop for near the cost of production. Anything less than a substantial increase in the loan rate provided for by special legislation, will spell economic ruin to thousands of southwestern cotton producers," Naman said.

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
