Miss Martin Is Finalist In FFA District Contest



Aoudad Sheep Hunt Figures Reported

In the recent open season on the aoudad sheep in the Palo Duro Basin of Texas, 72 were killed, and 33 of these were bagged in Briscoe County. A total of 203 permits were issued, and the hunters spent a total of 937 hours making their kill.

The hunter who came the furthest for the hunt lives in Tennessee. The rams killed averaged 140 pounds field dressed.

In Briscoe County, there were 23 rams and 10 ewes killed. There were 17 rams and six ewes killed in Armsong County. In Floyd County, there were three rams and two ewes killed.

The aoudad with the largest horn measurement (32½ inches) was brought down on the Owens Ranch in Randall County, where 17 rams and six ewes were killed.

Both the rams and ewes have horns and both are legal game.

The City of Silverton and Briscoe County initiated the Green Thumb Program Tuesday morning in a meeting in the office of County Judge M. G. Moreland.

Judge and Mrs. C. L. Abernethy of Plainview met with the group and explained the benefits of the government work program.

The Green Thumb Program is set up for people 55 years of age and older, a single person not making over \$2,000 a year and a married couple not having more than \$3,000 a year income. Men will work three days a week, Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays, in a beautification program for the City and County. The hiring of five men and possibly one woman has been approved under this program for Silverton, and those employed will be paid for their work.

The City and County furnish the materials and equipment for the jobs undertaken, and salaries and transportation to and from the places of employment is provided by government funds. The program can benefit school, city or county improvement projects, clean-up, painting, clearing of unsightly debris or any other general beautification including landscaping.

Anyone interested in applying for work under the Green Thumb Program may contact City Secretary Jerry Patton or Judge Moreland.

The City of Quitaque has already initiated this program.

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Tips For Farm And Home

COOKING GRASS-FED BEEF

Grass-fed and grain-fed beef provide approximately the same nutrition, but there is some difference when it comes to cooking them, one expert contended this week.

She's Patricia Honea, Briscoe County Extension Agent.

Grass-fed beef is leaner and the reduced marbling may affect tenderness, juiciness and flavor, she said.

Moist-heat cooking such as braising works well for the less tender cuts. Loin, leg and shoulder cuts can be roasted in a 325° F. oven, but need to be brushed with fat during roasting to prevent drying, the agent advised.

Tender steaks from the rib and loin sections—rib, sirloin, T-bone and Porterhouse—can be broiled if they are to be done rare or medium. Well-done steaks should be braised, she said.

Marinades such as a mixture of soy sauce and lemon juice or vinegar enhance the mild flavor of grass-fed beef.

NOTES TO CONSUMERS

(1) You can lengthen a mini skirt for this season's longer length fashions by using woven-edge ribbon, braiding, or seam binding. Stitch several strips together and back with hem facing or a fusible for stability. Ruffled edging can be attached in the same manner, but doesn't require a facing, Miss Honea advises.

(2) Food poisoning from bacteria in food frequently results from lack of sanitation, insufficient cooking and improper storage.

When roasting the holiday turkey, make sure the stuffing is done also. Keep it hot until served. Remove stuffing immediately after the meal and refrigerate. Remove meat from bones and refrigerate it. It should be used within two to three days, and heated before serving, she reminds.

(3) If you are a retiree living alone, consider having a household pet, Miss Honea suggests. It will bring life and love into your home, and may even lead you to make new friends. But when choosing a pet, weigh all possible pros and cons regarding cost, care and time involved, she says.

(4) Purchase meat by weight, not by the size of the package. Look for even-weight packages. It's easier to figure cost per ounce when weights are even—not
