COMMENCEMENT SER- MON AT TABERNACLE

Dr. Ingram Delivers Practical Discourse In Honor of High School Graduates

An immense congregation attended services Sunday at the Baptist Tabernacle to hear the commencement sermon for the Snyder High School, preached by Rev. A. B. Ingram. It was an occasion in which all the people felt and manifested commendable interest. The graduating class, consisting of six—two young ladies and four young men—occupied seats assigned for them. The large choir rendered specially prepared songs, making this a very delightful part of the service. The morning services at all the churches had been cancelled and all the people worshiped together. A rendition by a male quartette was a pleasing feature.

Dr. Ingram congratulated the class upon having finished the High School course. He referred to the fact that as a rule a greater percentage of girls than of boys, persevere to graduation in our schools, but he was glad to see that the majority of the Snyder class of 1911 are boys who have had the ambition to press on to the finish.

The subject of the discourse was, "The Value of a High Ideal." The text was taken from St. Paul's writing to the church at Phillippi, "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain."

The preacher drew from this text the great lesson that loyalty to God and right is the highest type of life to which we may ever attain. A correct ideal is necessary to success. Whatever one may adopt as standard or goal, such is apt to be the heights of his efforts and achievement. A low aim will result in ignoble attainment. A man without an ideal will be a sluggard. "A man to be worth while must choose a high ideal and press ever toward it. Christ was Paul's ideal of a man, and nothing would satisfy him but to know that he would be like him when raised to everlasting life. Great ideals will spur men on and up to be men of the highest type of usefulness. There are kings who waste their energies because they have no purposes in life. The purposeless man drifts with the tide and in time will pass away and leave nothing to bless the age in which he lived. Other men, though robbed of opportunity and cramped by circumstances, but by reason of purpose and determination press on to success and build monuments of deeds to perpetuate their memory. Purpose and will break down barriers and open the way to accomplishment. Firmness of purpose is invincible in building character. It mounts on wings of opportunity and over comes apparent impossibilities.

The building of Solomon's Temple could not have been accomplished, had not God put into the hearts of His servants a purpose to carry out this great plan. Young persons often choose some person as a model of life ideal. In doing so, let that ideal be a character whose life is upright, whose conduct is honoring to God and of service to mankind.

The preacher illustrated the value of steadfastness of purpose with incidents in the lives of statesmen, ministers and soldiers known in modern and mediæval and ancient history.

Let your ideals mount above

the sordid things of earth and strive to heights that will glorify God and bless the world. What is it worth if a man's ideal is to get wealth. All is lost at the grave. What is fame, but disappointment of soul? Here the preacher referred forcibly to the stories of political and social corruption, as results of choosing as ideals the acquirement of money and political preferment. The conquering hero on the battlefield may gain renown and the crafty politician may win applause but I say to you graduates, there is more, vastly more beyond if your ideals are wisely chosen.

This is but the vestibule of life in which to prepare for greater things to come. Strive to higher heights, and like Paul, choose Christ as the greatest of all ideals. Men may disappoint you, but Christ will never deceive or forsake you.

The train last night made the insurgents strategem noiseless and unheeded even by the federals. Arrangements for a new armistice to cover the entire country is expected today.

Will Resign When Peace is Re- stored Says the Mexican Ruler

Washington, May 8.—(Special to the Signal)—Official Washington has received confirmation of the intention of President Diaz to resign when peace is restored in Mexico. This information was received at the Mexican Embassy in a telegram from Minister De La Barra today.

All of which is perfectly right and proper—the speed maniacs who endanger the lives of others should be put in jail and the railroads should be forced to take all possible measures for the protection of human life.

But—! In nearly every city, town and village we permit to go without molestation or hindrance by city law or uniformed officer an agent of death who gathers in a single month more victims than are killed and injured in a year by all of the railroad and automobiles in the country. Not only are we lax in our laws against him, but many of us even invite him into our homes and make him welcome to dwell on our premises, and raise a numerous family on our property.

This powerful agent of death and disease is the common house fly.

Since it has become commonly accepted that the mosquito is responsible for yellow fever and that malaria is likewise due in a large measure to the same pest, nearly all cities make more or less effort to rid themselves of mosquito breeding grounds; in many places the death rate has been very materially reduced by such sanitary measures. But comparatively few cities and towns, as yet, have done much to rid themselves of house flies. Tulsa, Okla., is one of the towns where the fight against flies is being earnestly waged. The health board of Tulsa has had printed and distributed among the school children a fly catechism containing such significant questions as the following:

Where is the fly born? In filth.
Where does the fly live? In filth.

Where does he go? Into the kitchen and dining room. He walks on the bread, fruit and vegetables; he wipes his feet on the butter and bathes in the buttermilk.

Does the fly visit the patient sick with consumption, typhoid fever and cholera infantum? He does—and may call on you next.

What disease does the fly carry? He carries typhoid fever, tuberculosis and summer complaint.
How? On his wings and hairy feet.

What is his correct name? The Typhoid fly.

The measures to be taken against flies are not costly or difficult, but the work of an active community may be largely nullified by a few individuals who persistently refuse to keep their premises clean.
